TUs warn CPA against accord with SSA

From Staff Correspondent CHITTAGONG, July 11: The Chattagram Dock Bandar Sramik Karmachari Parishad, a group of 22 trade union bodies related to Chittagong Port, demanded cancellation of permission given to the Stevedoring Service of America (SSA) (BD) Ltd to build a container port at Patenga.

Addressing a press conference today held at the Chittagong Press Club, Joint Coordinator of the Parishad Mahfuzur Rahman urged the port authority not to sign any agreement with SSA (BD) Lid on leasing out of any portion of

land belonging to the port.
"If any deadlock is created following any such agreement. the Chittagong Port Authority will have to shoulder the responsibility," said Rahman. He said that if the private container port is allowed to be set up, 50,000 workers and employees involved with the port will lose their job, as all container vessels will be handled by that

"We cannot stop trade union activity but what kind of trade union (we want is important)," said Ports and Shipping Minister A S M Abdur Rob.

Chittagong Chamber chief and head of the Port Users Forum Kamaluddin Ahmed and BGMEA vice president Nurul Huq Sikder recounted stories of how exports and imports suffered at the hands of the port workers.

"In 1997, the Chittagong Port was closed for 26 days for no reasons without any notice whatsoever," said Sikder. "Trade unions should be banned in ports," he demanded. "they recklessly use their union strength ... they should be dealt with properly.

PARIS, July 11: The stage is set for tomorrow's final of World Cup '98 albeit without the razmataz befitting the focus of global fervour.


Although the toast of Paris. the Stade de France, is ever dressed for the occasion, the city wears a sombre mood and Parisians in general are indifferent to football's biggest show.
