Magurchhara disaster

Damage to eco-system estimated at Tk 600 cr

The overall damage to the eco-system caused by the explosion at Magurchhara gasfield in Moulvibazar last year has been estimated at Tk 600 crore, according to the findings of a government-appointed expert

committee. The explosion in an exploratory well on June 15 last year sent balls of fire leaping up to 800 feet, forcing the US oil company, Occidental, to abandon the well. The fire caused massive damage to the surrounding forests. animals and birds living in those human habitats, the en-

vironment and the eco-system

as a whole. The flame, however,

was doused off six months later.

"Re-generation of a stable eco-system generally requires a period exceeding over 100 years," said a member of the expert committee.

"But in our conservative estimate, we calculated that the damages to nature in Magurchhara could be brought to a sustainable level in 50 years", he added. The four-member expert

committee submitted its report to the Ministry of Forest and Environment on July 1. Committee members visited the site twice for preparing the report. sources said.

The committee comprised officials from the Department of Environment, Department of Forest and representatives of Bangladesh Environmental Lawyers Association and Bangladesh Centre for Advanced Studies.

Environment ministry officials said they will study the report before forwarding it to the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources to claim compensation from Occidental for the damage.

At least 87.5 acres of reserved forest belonging to the Forest Department were damaged. The experts quantified the damage as - severe damage to 20 acres of forest partial damage to 26 acres and minor damage to 41.5 acres.

The decision to send the high-level delegation was taken at a meeting with Finance Minister SAMS Kibria in the chair recently after a letter was received from the Bank of England saying that it may take drastic steps regarding Sonali Bank's operations in the UK.

Flood situation grave: 17 dists hit, 11 more die

The flood situation in the country deteriorated further yesterday with the inundation of fresh areas in different districts leaving 11 people dead.

Water levels of most major rivers continued to rise aggravating the flood situation in 17 districts.

"The flood situation may experience further deterioration following general rising trend in water levels in the major rivers and significant rainfall in the upstreams," the Flood Forecasting and Warning Centre said yesterday.

The Flood Information Centre said major rivers in the four basins were still flowing above their danger marks. The Brahmaputra was flowing 32 cm above the danger level at Bahadurabad, 10 cm at Sirajganj and 46 cm at Aricha. The Old Brahmaputra at

Jamalpur, the Lakhya at Narayanhat, the Ganges at Goalundo and Bhagyakul, the Khowai in Habiganj, the Gumti at Comilla, the Muhuri at Parshuram and the Halda at Narayanhat were flowing above their danger marks. The affected districts are:

Rajbari, Gaibandha, Chittagong, Cox's Bazar, Pabna, Kushtia, Sherpur, Sirajganj, Bogra, Jamalpur, Mymensingh, Kishoreganj, Faridpur, Kurigram, Lalmonirhat, Rangpur and Comilla. Our correspondents reported


The developing nations also want mandatory transfers of technology from multinational corporations when investments are made in local markets, the statement said.

India hosted the meeting of government officials, industry leaders and voluntary groups with the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development to discuss international investment arrangements.

"The discussions brought out clearly the complexities in-



Earlier, Additional Attorney General Abdul Wadud Bhuiyan, who had been discharging responsibilities as acting AG, submitted his resignation at about 1:30 pm yesterday.

Bhuiyan was made the Acting AG following KS Nabi's resignation from the post of the Attorney General on May 29. Nabi, while attending an international conference in UK, came to know that his tour had not been approved by the prime minister. He returned immedi-

ately and submitted "voluntary resignation on personal grounds.' Nabi, the former law secretary of the Awami League, was made AG on July 31, 1996, fol-

lowing the party's return to power. Abdul Wadud Bhuiyan told The Daily Star that he also had resigned on 'personal grounds. "I want to return to my private practice," said Bhuiyan
