

The sources said that the price of Sangu gas during the June-August quarter was fixed at 2.25 dollar per unit as the international price of Heavy Sulphur Fuel Oil (HSFO). which is the basis for calculating Sangu's gas price, has fallen. The gas price in the previous quarter was fixed at 2.6 dollar per unit. As the local price of gas is only 1.1 dollar per unit Petrobangla has to incur a

heavy loss in purchasing Sangu's gas. Sangu is supplying 60 million cubic feet of gas per day (mmcfd) to the national grid. Cairn is pressurising the government and big gas consumers like KAFCO to purchase

more gas from Sangu. The sources said that the government was buying 60 mmcfd of gas by reducing productions in its own gas fields. The country has gas supply shortfall, but due to lack of in-

frastructure and planning, it can not properly consume what is being produced now.

ranks, says the promotions cannot take retrospective effect under the existing rule. The long-drawn battle between the two groups of officers starting in various courts of law has now gone into the corridors

of political power. Either way. the government now stands to lose sympathy of one side. The lawyer representing the affected officers told the home minister last week that the ministry order was a "direct and deliberate disregard of the law laid down by the Appellate

Division of the Honourable Supreme Court". The lawyer, Abdur Rab Chaudhury, also advised the minister "to consult law officers of the Government before taking any further action in this matter which is now sub

judice". The warning seems to have fallen on deaf ears as the Departmental Promotion Committee (DPC) meets today to dispose of the promotions of 32 "officiating" officers.

The problem began some 10

many as 317 police inspectors were made "officiating" ASPs to

fill in the many new posts. That was a clear violation of the rule as the Public Service Commission was not consulted. It was also a violation of permitted proportion of department officers as ASPs. A 1973 rule says departmental officers cannot exceed 33 per cent of the total number of ASPs, the starting point for a BCS (police) cadre officer.

In 1995, the total number of allotted posts for ASPs was 432 of which not more than 144 should have been filled in from among the departmental promotees. But, according to the PSC, the number of departmen-

tal officers stood at 368. Not until 2002, according to government estimates, will the quota rules be fulfilled by increased direct recruits through BCS examinations every year.

Based on PSC recommendations, a total of 51 officiating ASPs were regularised from February 12, 1990, March 28, 1990 and March 18, 1991. In 1995, these 51 and an-

A quick and out-of-the-way response came from the home ministry, which on March 2, 1998 ordered regularisation of

faulty ACRs.

the 60 officers with effect from March 20, 1991, in a clear violation of the PSC rule and

Supreme Court verdict.

The Supreme Court had ruled that the officiating ASPs "were thus not members of the Bangladesh Civil Service (Enforcement: Police) prior to 12.2.90 and 8.3.91 until their officiating appointment was regularised on the recommendation of the PSC and they cannot claim seniority in the cadre service before that date".

The home ministry played a trick by giving effect to the regularisation from March 20 1991 The law ministry in its opinion said the Supreme Court ruling would be applicable to the 135 officers. Also, the PSC did not recommend their regularisation from that date.

The March 2, 1998 notification has irked the directly recruited officers who stand to lose their seniority and promotion. They filed a writ challenging the home ministry order The rule nisi issued by the High Court is awaiting a response from the ministry.

Disregarding the High Court rule nisi, on June 22, 1998, a home ministry circular confirmed 45 officers out of the 60. To compound the problem further, a list of 32 officers out

of these 45 was sent to the DPC for their promotion as additional superintendent of police. If 32 get through the DPC at today's meeting, a total of 99 officers directly recruited through civil service examina-

tions will be affected.
