

Japanese soccer gets new chief

TOKYO, July 20 (AFP/Internet)— Japan picked a new football chief Monday with a vow to play better in the next World Cup tournament on home turf.

The Japan Football Association (JFA) named Shunichiro Okano, a member of the International Olympic Committee, to replace Ken Naganuma who was resigning at the end of his second two-year term.

"To make the 2002 World Cup a success, it is necessary for the hosts to perform well," Okano, 66, one of the JFA vice presidents, said after the association's general assembly elected him as president.

Japan will co-host the 2002 finals with South Korea.

Okano handpicked former ace striker Kunishige Kamamoto, Japan's record international scorer with 73 goals from 78 matches, as a JFA vice president in charge of technical development.

Kamamoto, now a member of the Japanese Senate, said Japanese players should be pulled out from their "greenhouse" into a tougher footballing environment to boost their physical and mental strength.

Okano was the preferred successor of Naganuma, 67, who piloted Japan to the football bronze at the 1968 Mexico City Olympics.

He said on Sunday that he had decided to quit now with Japan having laid the foundations for co-hosting the 2002 World Cup finals and completed their journey to their debut Cup finals in France last month.

Takeshi Okada, 41, quit as national coach after Japan lost all three of their first round games to Argentina, Croatia and Jamaica.

Velappan stresses on professionalism

HONG KONG, July 20— The Asian Football Confederation (AFC) is renewing its campaign to force an under-23 rule on the soccer tournament at this year's Asian Games, reports AFP.

Peter Velappan, the AFC general secretary, said he wanted the event to be a showcase for the continent's young talent. The governing body is also concerned that the Games could take attention from its tournaments.

"The AFC is recommending that countries view this as an under-23 competition but the final decision rests with them," Velappan said.

"It is the choice of the associations which players they send. The AFC would like the Asian Games to be an under-23 tournament but the Olympic council of Asia are not comfortable with that."

"This is an opportunity for countries to develop their sides for the Olympics in Sydney (which will be primarily for players under 23)."

"Countries in the region should be concentrating on AFC tournaments and using events like the South East Asian Games, East Asian Games and Asian Games to build for the future," he said.

Only a sprinkling of Asian players involved in France '98 competed in the 1994 Asian in Hiroshima which was won by Uzbekistan. One of them was Korean captain Yoo Sang-Chul who scored the equaliser against Belgium in their final World Cup group game in

by the four Asian teams competing in France '98.

"The AFC would like Asian teams to play more South American sides and also those from Africa and Europe to build mental strength and confidence."

Talented individual players must reach out for success by seeking out opportunities to play in Europe," he said.

"The World Cup is for the hardcore professional players as well demonstrated by the European and South American teams. The players on these two continents have been developed and matured by the professional leagues first."

"Asia's own leagues must have the means of producing quality players through the efforts of professional coaches and professional management. A part time or semi-professional scenario will no longer assist in the long term growth of our football."

"Japan, Iran, China, Korea and Saudi Arabia, with reasonably well established professional leagues will have a better chance of success compare to other countries where football is still striving to move ahead."

These countries must learn from the lessons of France '98 and begin work immediately to produce strong teams for World Cup 2002.

Pele felt the same

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 20— Brazilian legend Pele admitted Sunday that he almost did a Ronaldo when he suffered an attack of nerves before the 1970 World Cup final against Italy in Mexico City, reports AFP.

Referring to Ronaldo's convulsive spasms just before last Sunday's final against France, which almost resulted in his missing the 3-0 defeat, Pele said that he had felt sick just minutes before the Italy game but managed to recover his composure.

"Just thinking about the fact that it was my last World Cup and about how we had failed in England in 1966, I was crying my eyes out when the bus took us to the stadium. So what happened to Ronaldo doesn't surprise me," Pele told the Jornal do Brasil.

"I just couldn't stop crying. When I got onto the pitch and saw all the Brazilian flags I said to myself: 'I am going to kill these Italians. Nobody in the world is going to take this one away from us.'"

"And that day we don't our third world title, and I started crying again only this time tears of happiness."

In that game, Pele headed a superb opener in what turned into a glorious 4-1 victory by the greatest team of all time.

But as he has done in the past, Pele cautioned that Ronaldo was being put under far too much pressure.

"And in the end he just couldn't fulfill his dream."

He advised the young strike not put France '98 behind him and look forward to the new season at Inter Milan.

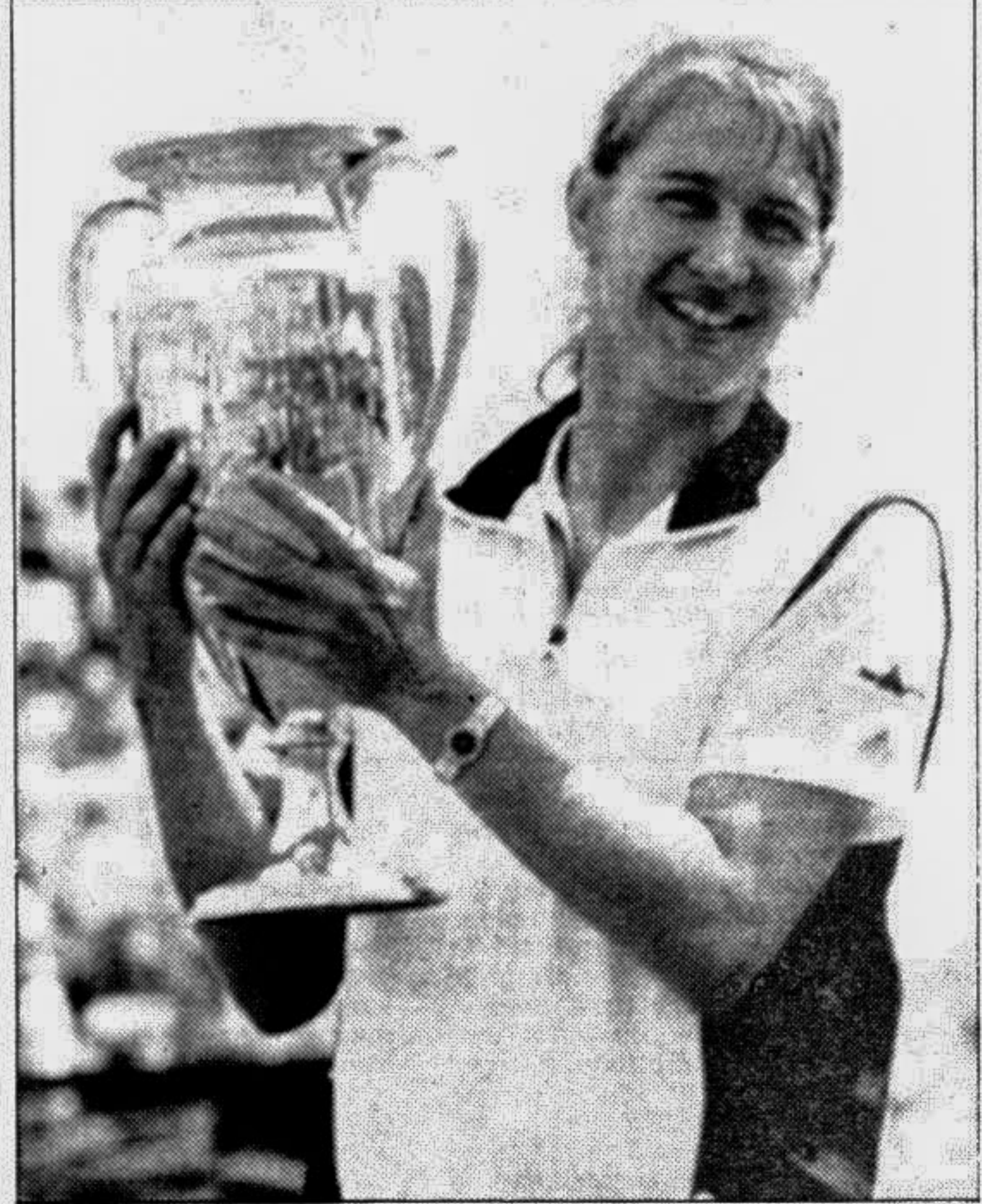
Graf gets her bearings

Sino dopers punished

BEIJING, July 20— Chinese sports authorities have banned two athletes from competition for one year and their coaches for an official newspaper said Monday, reports AP.

Authorities also handed warnings to two other athletes for stimulant use, annulled their competition results, and banned their coaches for three months, the Guangming Daily said.

Stung by a series of doping scandals in recent years, Chinese sports officials have vowed to take tough measures against drug cheats and their coaches. As part of stepped-up anti-drug measures, the Chinese Swimming Association plans to impose life bans on first-time steroid offenders.

The two athletes suspended for two years were Li Yi from eastern Jiangsu province, and Zhou Jing from northern Hebei. The Guangming Daily did not say what their sports were, although it said the punishments were handed down by the Chinese Track and Field Association.

Zhou tested positive for steroid use, the newspaper said. Aside from being banned for a year, their two coaches also had to pay a 5,000 yuan (600 dollars) fine, the newspaper said.

Arsenal want to play at Wembley

LONDON, July 20— Arsenal are hoping to play their European Champions League games in the new season at Wembley, the home of the English national team, reports Reuters.

A Wembley spokesman said today that the London club had asked if they could move the matches from Highbury to the national ground which has a larger capacity and better facilities.

Both stadiums are in north London and it would not be a problem or Arsenal fans to travel across to Wembley which hosts England's international games as well as the FA Cup final.

Wembley said that Arsenal needed the permission of European governing body UEFA and the English Football Association before they could go ahead.

British newspapers reported today that UEFA had already given its support but a spokeswoman at the European body in Switzerland was unable to confirm the reports immediately.

Arsenal coach Arsene Wenger backs the proposal. "It looks pretty good for us," he said. "We would like to go."

Davis Cup's final four

UNDATED, July 20 (AP/Reuters)— Unruffled by a raucous crowd, Jonas Bjorkman picked up right where he left off last year in the Davis Cup.

He beat Nicolas Kiefer in five sets Sunday to send defending champion Sweden past Germany and into the semifinals of the Davis Cup.

In another quarterfinal, Spain ousted Switzerland and will play the Swedes in one semifinal. The United States and Italy will meet in the other. Both semifinals are Sept. 25-27.

Bjorkman won 6-3, 4-6, 6-2, 5-7, 6-4 to give Sweden a 3-1 lead in the first of two matches, with a crowd of 10,200 jeering every call that went against the German.

"I had doubts a lot of times I wouldn't play well, but I never gave up."

Kiefer failed twice to break Bjorkman at 4-4, in the final set, then was broken on his next serve to end a wild match.

"Bjorkman's hard to beat, but Kiefer had his chances," German captain Carl-Uwe Steeb said.

In a final singles reduced to three sets, Germany's Tommy Haas defeated Magnus Larsson 6-7 (4-7), 7-5, 6-2.

Bjorkman, ranked No. 9 in the world, won three singles and went undefeated in doubles in Sweden's title run last year.

One of the world's top doubles players, Bjorkman teamed with Nicklas Kult on Saturday to give Sweden a 2-1 lead by beating Boris Becker and David Prinosil.

The United States won on its home soil for the 18th consecutive time and will play Italy in the semifinals on September 25-27. The tie will be in the United States at a site to be determined.

Todd Martin spoiled Xavier Malisse's 18th birthday Sunday but Belgium avoided a sweep when Jim Courier retired with an arm injury.

Courier was leading Christophe Van Garste, 6-3, 1-4, when he left the court. In Sunday's opening match at the Indianapolis Tennis Center, Martin beat Malisse, 7-6 (7-1), 6-3.

Sunday's matches were restricted to best-of-three sets since the Americans had clinched by winning the opening three matches.

Belgium made a switch with 18-year-old Malisse making his Davis Cup singles debut as a replacement for Dewulf.

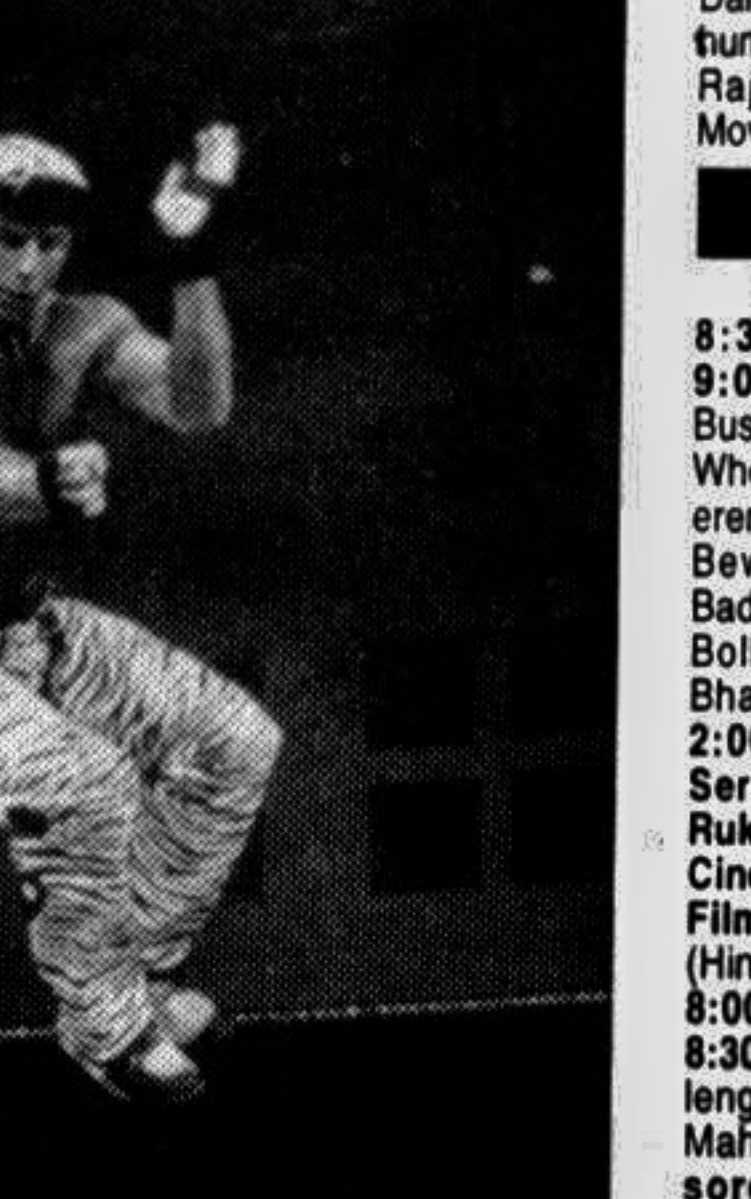

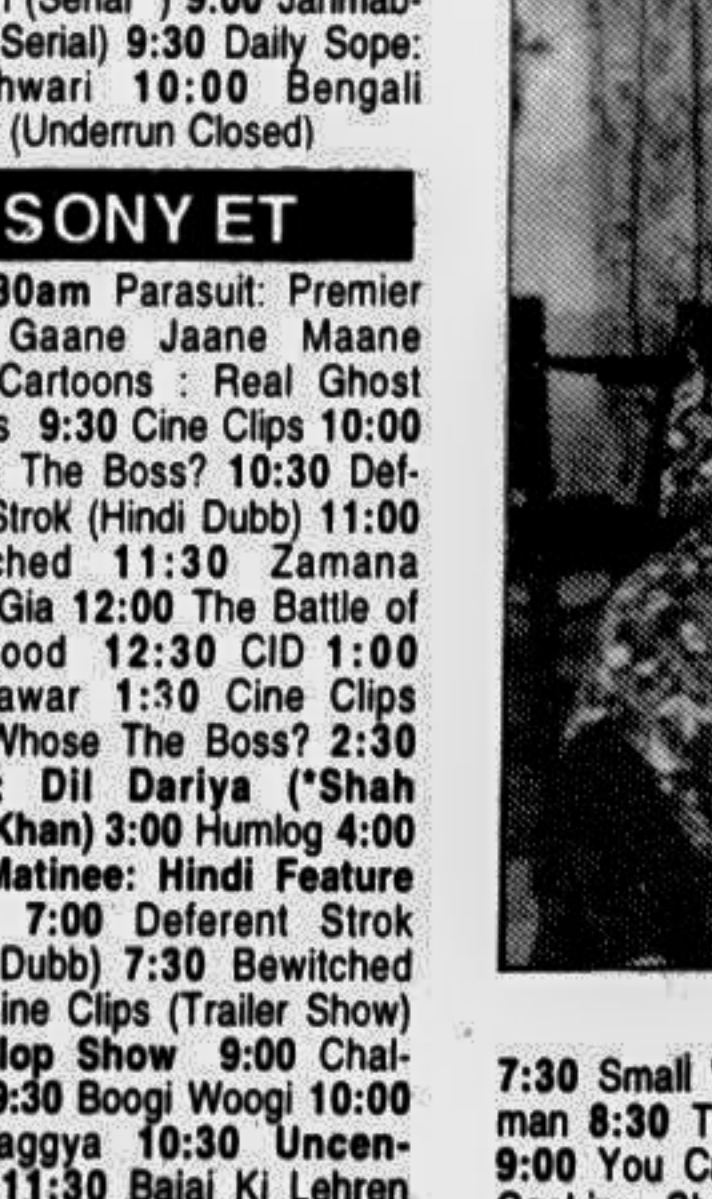
