Army should be deployed in ports, if needed: **FBCCI**

The Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) has suggested deployment of army in the ports to restore discipline for boosting export, reports

In a set of recommendations submitted to the Prime Minister recently, the apex body of the business community also urged the government to stop labour union activities to free the ports from continuous labour unrest and programmes like hartal and blockade, sources concerned said.

"To bring back discipline, if necessary, army should be entrusted with the total control of the ports," the FBCCI said in one recommendation.

An unhealthy situation is prevailing in the ports due to frequent labour unrest on even trivial issues creating obstacles to normal export-import activi-

It also urged for privatising all port-related services. The labour unions at the ports are opposing the setting up of a private container terminal near the Chittagong Port. They fear that many will lose See Page 12 Col 2

Flood situation deteriorates in 16 districts

The flood situation in 16 districts, mostly in northern part of the country, deteriorated yesterday with the inundation of

fresh areas, reports UNB. Two more persons died in the flood raising the official death toll to 50. The unofficial figure is much higher with one more death yesterday in Sylhet where four persons of village Lohajhari were also reported missing.

The situation in southern districts has slightly improved while it remained unchanged in six other affected districts, offi-

cials said. The forecast by the Flood Information Centre said the flood

situation in the central part of the country within the Meghna basin may further aggravate.

Fresh areas submerged yesterday were in the districts of Madaripur, Jamalpur, Manikganj, Narayanganj, Chapainawabganj, Nilphamari, Naogaon, Bagura, Munshiganj Gaibandha, Rangpur, Faridpur, Feni, Comilla, Kurigram and Chandpur.

According to the Flood Control Centre, 6481,597 people in 172 thanas of 32 districts have been affected by the flood.



731 persons, 312 cos pay 56 pc income & corporate taxes

Concerted action needed to reduce revenue leakage: WB

Evasion of income tax and corporate tax remains high as only 731 individuals and 312 companies account for 56 per cent of total personal income

tax and corporate tax collected.

Quoting this official statistics, the World Bank in an analysis of the national budget for fiscal 1998-99 said the government should announce a concerted programme of action aimed at reducing revenue leakages.

The Bank in its Periodic Economic Update of July 1998, said the targeted revenue growth of 10.6 per cent in the budget is achievable, but very conservative.

The target could be achieved without much improvement in tax administration but increasing the revenue effort is of cru-
