Davis Cup USA-Italy semi at Wisconsin

MILWAUKEE, July 23: The Davis Cup semifinal between the United States and Italy will be played at Wisconsin Centre Arena in downtown Milwaukee, officials said Wednesday, reports AP.

"It is probably the most exciting thing that's ever happened to Wisconsin tennis, said Charles Mulcahy, a lawyer who helped establish Marquette's annual tournament 23

years ago. The semifinal will be held September 25-27. Milwaukee beat out Detroit, San Diego and Richmond, Virginia, as the

semifinal site. Davis Cup representatives visited Milwaukee last week to consider the availability of mo-

tel and hotel rooms. A reason for choosing the city "was the excitement that I

felt from all of the people we met," said Russ Cline, whose Kansas City firm helps organize the tournament The choice needed the ap-

proval of the London-based International Tennis Federation and the United States Tennis Federation, Cline said.

The pair return to pre-season training on August 2 — just a week before the Charity Shield and 15 days before Arsenal's first Premiership game against Nottingham Forest.


Dutch duo Dennis Bergkamp and Marc Overmars will also have had just three weeks off from football when they report back on August 1.

Ma falling out of favour

The Chinese Athletics Association is angry because Ma's 'new army' has shunned domestic events

"No, they cannot take part in the Asian Games," said association secretary general Shang Xiutang.

"Athletes must take part in four domestic events in China to be eligible for the Asian Games apart from the qualifying competition in September, and they didn't take part in any of them." he added.

Shang said Ma's athletes did not go to the Asian championships, which ended Wednesday, because some competed in the Goodwill Games in New York, while the others were to compete in France this week. China was also missing Li

Uxemei, the Asian 100m and 200m men's record holder, who is also in Europe, but China still dominated the championships winning 26 gold medals, far ahead of Japan's six, Qatar's three, and the two golds each for Kazakhstan and

The absence of Ma and his new star runner Jiang Bo will be a blow to the drawing power of the Asian Games athletics. Ma rose to fame in 1993

Ma astounded the world with claims that he gave runners a daily potion which included blood from a freshly killed tur-

demned by Chinese sports officials and Ma was beset by serious illness and also involved in a car crash.

But he retains enormous public support in China and Ma made a spectacular return at the Chinese national games last October when Jiang and Dong Yanemi both smashed the 5,000m world record.

Ma promised "miracles" for the 2000 Olympics. But the Chinese Athletics Association secretary general said Ma would still have to agree to qualify like other runners.

"It's the same for the Sydney Olympics. If the athletes of 'Ma's army' want to be eligible for the Olympics, of course, they have to take part in all of the qualifying events," said Shang. "And if they do not want to take part in the qualifying

Jayasinghe cleared

COLOMBO, July 23: Asia's fastest woman athlete has been cleared of charges that she took a banned performance-enhancing drug at the World Track Championships last year, sports officials said Thursday, reports AP.

Susantika Jayasinghe, who finished ahead of Merlene Ottey at the Athens meet, was not immediately available for comment, but a family member said she was thrilled by the de-

"She has gone to the temple to pray and express gratitude,' said the family member who did not give her name when reached by telephone.

The vote was 2-1 in her favour by a panel of experts, the sports officials said.

Jayasinghe, 23, tested posi-tive for Nadralon-19 when a random sample was taken after she sprinted to victory. She claimed she had taken a drug to control her menstrual cycle, but not Nadralon-19.

Jayasinghe accused Sri Lankan officials of tampering with the bottles that were used to collect urine samples, saying some of them were angry be-cause she had rebuffed their advances.

Two of the 3-member panel. Wijeyadasa Rajapakse and Rajah Dep, ruled that there was not enough evidence to prove the charges. But the third member, Ravindra Fernando, professor of forensic medicine and head of the National Poisons Information Center, said it was proved beyond reasonable doubt that Jayasinghe had committed a doping offense.

Jayasinghe tested positive for Nandralone-19 once before, at the 1995 Asian Championship. She was banned from further participation. Subsequently, the International Amateur Athletic Federation lifted the ban following medical evidence that a drug taken by women to delay the menstrual cycle has similar organic compounds as Nandralone-19.

Daum Vogts' choice

BONN, July 23: German national soccer coach Berti Vogts has said Bayer Leverkusen's Christophe Daum is his likely successor — but not for a while, reports Reuters.

"Otto Rehhagel and Ottmar Hitzfeld have no chance of becoming national coach. The German Soccer Federation (DFB) is of the opinion that Daum should be my successor. Vogts said in today's mass-circulation Bild newspaper.

Previous media reports had tipped both Kaiserslautern coach Rehhagel and Borussia Dortmund sports director Hitzfeld as potential successors

Last Friday German soccer bosses held a so-called "crisis meeting" to discuss the future of the national side after a disappointing performance in the World Cup in France. Germany lost 3-0 to Croatia in the quarterfinals.

There was speculation after the defeat that Vogts' job could be in danger, but a DFB announcement made after the meeting said the federation had full confidence in Vogts and that he would continue to head the national team until at least the 2000 European Championships.

STUTTGART, Germany, July 23: Former French Open champions Yevgeny Kafelnikov and Thomas Muster both crashed out as they suffered secondround upset losses Wednesday at the million-dollar Mercedes Cup, reports AFP.

Kafelnikov, seeded fourth, became the highest-ranked player to fall so far at the Weissenhof Club, losing to Czech Bohdan Ulihrach 6-3, 3-6, 6-3. Tenth seed Muster, who won




