

City areas flooded

Mymensingh Diarrhoea has broken out in several flood affected areas. Severe crisis of pure drinking water were reported from many flood-hit districts, according to our correspondents and news

agencies. In Narayanganj, the flood situation worsened further after the Shitalakhya river crossed the danger level.

The badly affected thanas of the district include Narayanganj Sadar, Aaraihazar, Sonargaon, Bandar and Roopgonj. But with the rise of water levels, fresh areas under Fatullah thana have also been inundated

From Page 1 Chittagong Port or new ports in private sector, he added.

He reassured the leaders of the trade unions at the port that they would lose their jobs if the private terminal starts operating from 2001-2. Rather it would create more jobs.

The deputy minister also said a guideline for operating private equipment at Chittagong Port is also being prepared.

Later, the trade union leaders including CBA President Mahfuzur Rahman, who is an audit assistant told the journalist that they were sticking to their programme of agitations against the private sector container terminal. Mahfuzur Rahman said "We do not care even if the country's biggest foreign investment offer of about 500 million dollars is lost. We want to save jobs," he asserted. In the same breath, he said "We want foreign investment but would not agree that if the SSA,B, postpones its project, it would scare away other potential foreign investors."

But Mahfuzur Rahman's alliance of 22 trade union organisations is facing cracks as Dock Sramik leaders Abdul Khaleg Chowdhury and Jahangir Alam Chowdhury disassociated themselves from the movement against the new terminal in private sector.

Talking to the same group of journalists later, president of Chittagong Chamber of Commerce and Convenor of the Port Users Forum Kamaluddin Ahmed expressed his resentment at the slow handling, corruption, impediments in the way of allowing private operators to work freely at the port and even procuring an ADB loan for more equipment.

He also said, "They are not opposed to the private terminal but wants a guideline on the new port, its user facilities and tariff etc."

According to a UNB report from Sirajganj, incessant rain and onrush of flood water aggravated the flood situation in

the district yesterday.

Two more people — Romisa
Khatun, 35, of Ghargram and Monir (5) of Solapara village in Taras thana died — one from snake-bite and the other of diarrhoea.

A Natore report says, about 600 people, mostly children, in the flood affected areas were attacked by diarrhoea as the flood situation in the district worsened further.

In Naogaon, diarrhoea broke out in the flood affected areas of Atrai, Manda, Raninagar and Sadar thanas due to lack of

drinking water. Nearly 500 diarrhoea af fected people were reported to have taken treatment from thana health complexes including the district Sadar Hospital

in the last few days. In Pabna, flood situation deteriorated in nine thanas. Diarrhoea broke out in many areas claiming three lives.

The dead were identified as Rubi(8) of Charmachpara village in Sadar thana, Rubel (3) of Dhalarchar village in Bera thana and Solaiman (2) of Tumli village in Faridpur thana

The affected thanas are Sadar, Bera, Suzanagar, Sathia. Faridpur, Bhangura, Chatmohar, Ishwardi and Atgharia.

A Kushtia report says: The flood engulfed fresh areas of 15 unions in Daulatpur, Bheramara, Mirpur and Kumarkhali thanas and low-lying areas of Kushtia Sadar and Khoksha

Meanwhile, a court in Calcutta stopped the Indian authorities from deporting three people to Bangladesh, AP quot-ing an official said today.

High Court Judge Samaresh Banerjee issued the orders yesterday on a petition filed by the three in Calcutta. They claimed that they were residents of West Bengal state and had taken up jobs in Mumbai. The three were among a

group of 34 people who were arrested by police earlier this week in Mumbai.

Buddhadev Bhattacharya said today investigation showed that some of those arrested were registered voters of the state.

The state government will file a petition in the court next week seeking to stop deporta-tions from the Maharashtra state. "Even if some of them are found to be illegal migrants. this is not the way to deal with them," Bhattacharya said.

"Officials in the other 28 cadres feel that the new guidelines have marginalised their chances of promotion to policymaking levels, as 75 per cent posts in the rank of deputy secretary has been reserved for a particular cadre. The guidelines are biased towards the former secretariat cadre and the BCS administration cadre," one source alleged.

In the new guidelines, the rank of deputy secretary has been made the entry point for moving to higher levels of the administration, with minimum five years of service in the

Promotion to the rank of deputy secretary and above should be open to members of all the cadres to ensure fair and good governance. The entry could be made through a competitive examination on the basis of a common syllabus, some officials maintained.

"A senior policy pool was created to ensure equal entry of all the cadres in the late 70s and early 80s, but it was never implemented," an official noted.

The gazetted guidelines will not only create rivalry between the administration cadre and the other 28 cadres but also among the 28 cadres, he felt.

There are about 50,000 officials in the 28 cadres and about 5,000 in the secretariat cadre and BCS administration cadre, sources said.

Some lawmakers of the party hinted at a fresh debate when the issue will be raised at a BNPPP meeting, the party leader said. "But submission of resigna-

tion letters to the Speaker is unlikely to take place soon. It will largely depend on the government's treatment to BNP and its steps to address the opposition party's grievances", commented a member of the party's Standing Committee. Till the submission, the party MPs would continue to attend the parliament session, he added.

It has been planned that resignation letters will be kept ready for submission (to the Speaker) to keep the government under pressure as well as to check desertion by the party lawmakers to join the government, he said adding, the move also "aims at intensifying the planned agitation for a midterm election."

The party hope to intensify its planned agitation for a midterm election after the rainy reason and the floods are over. Those who masterminded the plan for resignation think that it would also help the party check any possible split among its MPs on the question of quitting the parliament in future. On several occasions in the past, when the party boycotted the parliament session, the party lawmakers were

sharply divided on the issue.

But the MPs disliking the strategy argued that they would feel "mentally disturbed" and "be undermined" by their electorate if they keep their resignation letters ready for submission. There was a storming debate at the Standing Committee

meeting over the issue. A good

number of party heavyweights

opposed the move for collection

of resignation letters. Begum

Khaleda Zia sided with those

who favoured the move, sources
