#### Free trade area Dhaka needs more time, Hasina tells Chandrika

COLOMBO, July 28: Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today sought Sri Lankan support to delay the transition of SAPTA to SAFTA

due by 2001, reports UNB. Hasina sought the support during bilateral talks with Sri Lankan President Chandrika Bandarnaike Kumaratunga at the President's office in the

"Bangladesh is not yet prepared for the transition and we need longer time for the proposed free trade area," Hasina told Chandrika.

Briefing newsmen after the talks. Foreign Secretary Mustafizur Rahman said that Sri Lankan President appreciated Bangladesh's position and said the transition to SAFTA could be "delayed" but the process of formulating the legislation and other necessary steps could be initiated.

## Tenth SAARC summit in Colombo

# All eyes on today's Indo-Pak dialogue

COLOMBO, July 28: The three-day 10th summit of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) will begin amidst tight security

here tomorrow, report agencies. Heads of state and government of seven members of the SAARC that groups Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, the Maldives Nepal. Pakistan and host Sri Lanka are already in the capital for the summit.

"The theme of the conference is economy. It will focus on the impact of global economic situation. WTO, SAPTA and SAFTA," Sri Lankan Foreign Minister Lakhsman Kadirgamar said.

The opening ceremony of the summit will be held at Bandarnaike Memorial International Conference Hall at 10 am when all the heads of government will make deliberations.

The flood, now sweeping the country, claimed 29 more lives vesterday, raising the death toll to 140, agencies quoting, offi-

cials said. They said the flood situation in most of the districts deteriorated further with the rise of water levels in major rivers. Nearly 1.50 crore people of

37 districts were affected by the flood as more areas were submerged by the on-rush of waters from across the border. Of the 29 new victims, five

died in Sirajganj. Four deaths were reported from Kurigram. four from Shariatpur, one from Madaripur, four from Manikgani, three from Munshiganj, one from Dhaka, two from Comilla, one from Brahmanbaria, one from Mymensingh and three from Sunamganj.

The officials said most of the deaths were caused by drowning, snakebite and house col-

## Letters of intent issued to 9 foreign oil & gas cos

The government has issued letters of intent (LOI) to nine foreign companies awarding them five blocks for oil and gas exploration in the country under the Second Round Block Bidding, sources said. In these letters, signed on pared to visit Dhaka at a short

July 26, the government also congratulated the companies and asked them to be ready for signing Production Sharing Contracts. These letters were sent to

Enron-Okland (awarding blocks 3 and 6), Shell-Cairn (Block 5), Unocal-Triton (Block 7) and Pangaea-OMV (Block 8). The letters further mentioned that the schedule for dis-

cussion between the government and the foreign companies would be announced soon. Finally, the letters mentioned that representatives of the companies should be available at a short notice for negolow Oil saying that the company should be ready for final ising partnership negotiations with Chevron-Texaco in Block 9 and with Mobil-Petronas in Block 11. Tullow Oil officials have also been asked to be pre-

Meanwhile, different oil companies have reacted to the results of the Second Round Block Bidding.

Shell-Cairn and Chevron-Texaco have reacted negatively. saying that the results were "very frustrating", sources said. Chevron-Texaco also noted that the government was non-committal and they "can not be ex-

The reaction of Mobil-Petronas was also "somewhat negative" as they felt that there was "no promise" for them in the decision. However Mobil-Petronas will be following a "wait-and-see" policy, sources

ding negotiations in November-December last year, have been refused one of the two blocks. These companies, at a meeting with Petrobangla, reacted negatively and said that they were disappointed at the bidding re-

Sources said that Shell-Cairn might go to the extreme o walking out from the bidding procedure which they found "very opaque" and "contradic-

Between January and July, when the bidding procedure came to a virtual halt, Shell-Cairn had submitted a number of additional proposals for Block 10 aiming at integrated development. They did it as they sensed

## Death toll 3, three still unconscious

Satkhira clash over Jalmahal

KHULNA, July 28: The bodies of two children, killed during clashes between landless people and police over the possession of a jalmahal in Satkhira, was recovered from a canal in Kaliganj thana today. With these deaths, the number of people killed in the inci-

dent stands at three. Three other persons admitted to Khulna Hospital with bullet wounds on Monday night. were yet to regain consciousness, hospital sources said. Abdus Sabur, 35. Noor Mohammad, 30, and Islam, 36, are all landless farmers of the Baburabad jalmahal area.

Earlier on Monday morning a woman, Zaheda Khatoon, 32, died as bullets pierced through her ribs during the fierce clash between police and hundreds of landless people over the possession of the Baburabad

The Deputy Commissioner of Satkhira Deb Dutta Khisha, told this correspondent today that he was not sure as yet if the two children were killed in police firing. "But I am quite sure that po-

lice and government officials came under severe attack from hundreds of people of Baburabad and in self-defence there was no other way but to go into action during retreat", the DC said. The Police Super of Satkhira

said, "I did not count how many rounds of gunshots were fired when unruly people attacked with arrows and brickbats at my forces who were called in to maintain law and order during demarcation of the jalmahal." Leaders of 'The Bhumihin Uchched Protirodh Committee'

## Ctg court bldg may collapse any time

CHITTAGONG, July 28: Chittagong court building, built over one hundred years ago, is yet to be renovated or replaced, although being declared 'condemned' about 11 years ago, according to court officials.

The worn-out court building, at the city's Parir Pahar, may collapse any time, said an offi-

Talking to The Daily Star, Chittagong District Judge Zahurul Haque said three court rooms used by a sub-judge, an additional judge and a senior assistant judge were closed after those found to be 'risky'. The office of the three judges

have been shifted to elsewhere to run the court functions alternately, the district judge informed.

"As a result, it has become difficult to run judicial and other court functions in this worn-out building," he said adding. "We fear that the building might collapse at any time." Haque pointed out that a


