2 killed in Kishoreganj road accident

KISHOREGANJ, Aug 2: Two girls were killed and two other children injured seriously in an accident near Ghaital Nayapara in the town on Kishoreganj-Mymensingh road on Thurs-

day, reports UNB. According to witnesses, the mishap occurred at noon when a rice laden tractor ran over the victims and skidded off the road after hitting a roadside wall in front of Habib Villa. Of the dead, Lipa, 10, of Ghaital Nayapara in Sadar thana died on the spot and Nargis, 9, of Kaliakatra village in Pakundia thana suc-cumbed to her injuries at Zahurul Islam Medical College Hospital on Saturday night. The injured Billal, 4, and Ripa, 3, were also sent to the Zahurul Islam Medical College Hospital in a critical condition. The operator of the tractor fled the scene after the accident. A case was filed with the police.

Diarrhoea spreading fast in Chandpur areas

Seven lakh affected by Sherpur flood

SHERPUR, Aug 2: A total number of 2,11,137 people of the district were directly afflicted by flood in all five thanas of the district, Sherpur DC Md Naofel Mia disclosed .

But according to unofficial sources more than seven lakh people in 52 unions and two pourasavas in five thanas have been affected directly or indirectly by flood. The DC told The Daily Star. 44,072 families in five thanas have been affected by flood directly. As many as 30,460 families in Sherpur sadar, 9,044 families in Srebordi thana 2,443 in Nalitabari thana, 1,195 in Jhenaigati thana and 960 families in

Nakla thana have been affected. A total number of 7,193 houses have been destroyed either completely or partially, the DC added. He said about 74 educational institutions have been inundated, 36 kilometres road completely and 372 kilometres roads partially dam-aged. The 12- kilometre flood control embankment has been damaged completely and 42 kilometre area of the embankment damaged partially.

More than 8 people were killed due to flood. As many as 46 cattleheads were killed and over 3,000 have been attacked by waterborne diseases. A total number of 18 bridges and culverts damaged completely and

152 others damaged partially. In the agriculture sector standing crops on 16773 acres of land were completely or par-tially damaged. But according to local people, there is a far difference between the official record and unofficial record.

Standing crops on over 28,000 thousand acres and 95 per cent seed-beds were damaged. Flood destroyed Transplanted Aman seedlings in different areas of 51 unions in the district. For more than 18 days flood waters remained in various part of the district. So far the government sanctioned 175 metric tons of rice, Taka 2 lakh in cash, 500 old clothes, 4,971 pieces of sarees and other essential supports. These were distributed through public rep-

resentatives. Meanwhile, flood situation in four thanas improved since the last week. But the situation in sadar thana is static. The sadar thana MP, Md Atiur Rahman Atique visited the

While visiting the flood affected areas in sadar thana along with Md Eliusuddin. Chairmen of Charpukkhinary Union Parisad, The Daily Star correspondent found the flood victims took shelter on the flood control embankment. Over 300 victims were residing in their temporary sheds. They are mainly day labourers and landless peasants. The affected people told, most of the shelterless families have been experiencing worst sufferings in absence of proper shelter, food and clothings. Many families have been facing semi-starvation since they have no source

Taka 80-crore Chandpur Irrigation Project is also threatened by the erosion of the river Meghna at Haimchar, Char Bhairali and Nilkamal points. 1,000 tubewells in Kushtia need immediate repairing

KUSHTIA, Aug 2: The Public Health Engineering Department (PHED) has failed to ensure supply of safe drinking water despite loss of many lives caused by diarrhoeal diseases in the district every year.

The department is responsible for installing, repairing and maintenance of tubewells in the rural areas. But it is alleged, the officials

hardly visit rural areas to inspect the operation of tubewells and take effective measures to stop rampant stealling of spare parts. As a result, the number of disordered tubewells in the areas are increasing causing untold sufferings to the people.

At present more than 1,000 tubewells remained out of order in the areas. Most of the rural people are forced to take water from ponds, rivers and canals. They become easy prey to various intestinal diseases includ-

ing diarrhoea and dysentery. The villagers urged the concerned authorities to look into into the matter and take immediate steps to ensure smooth supply of pure water in the rural areas, particularly the flood affected areas. Meawnhile, kutcha latrines have been posing a threat to public health in the district headquarters for quite a long time.

Human excreta are reportedly seen polluting the environment. Flies, mosquitoes and other isnects carry germs spreading various diseases among the town dwellers. Many kutcha latrines have been set up beside the roads, rivers and When contacted, the district Public Health Engineering Department officials said they had adequate stocks of rings and slabs for setting up low cost sanitary latrines.



Natural calamities part of life for people in S-region

BARISAL, Aug 2: Nearly five crore people of the southern region including the vast coastal areas of the country became victims of cyclone, hurricane and tidal surge for hundreds of years.

For this reason Bangladesh is known as the land of cyclone, tidal bore and natural calami-

Disastrous tidal surge, cyclonic storm, tornado and hurricane claimed lives of millions of people leaving a widespread trail of devastation in the southern region, particularly the coast line along the Bay of Bengal for so many years. According to different sources, the cyclonic storm including the tidal surge of 1584 battered the coastal belt in the southern region which claimed lives of 70 per cent people of the area. More than two lakh people were killed by the disaster. Almost the same incidents occurred in 1737 and 1762.

Tremor was also followed by the natural calamity. As a result the entire coast line was turned into a barren land. The next disasters hit the southern areas of the country in 1769, 1770, 1784 and 1787. The havocs were less disastrous than the previous ones, records re-

vealed. A cyclone along with tidal bore hit the southern areas of the country on June 6. 1822 which was very tremendous. It lasted for one week. More than one lakh people were killed and wealth including crops worth Taka 15 lakh were destroyed in the incident.

The next calamities were recorded in 1825, 1831, 1855 and 1864.

Embankment of the Kirtonkhola river along Barisal town developed huge cracks in the tidal surge of 1869. The tidal surge and cyclone of October 31 in 1876 in the 19th Century caused a heavy damage in the southern region including the port city of Chittagong. The havoc happened in full moon with high tide. As a result the casualty and damage were very high. Several thousand people. livestock, cattleheads were swept away with 12 to 15 feet high tide.

In 1897 a hurricane hit Chittagong region that killed 14,000 people. Later on 18,000 more people died of various diseases which broke out in an epidemic form. After this, no record was viturally available. Nearly 50 cyclones lashed over this areas till 1940 which left

nearly 50,000 people killed. In 1941 a tornado lashed Bhola, the biggest delta island of the country which killed nearly 100 people. The cyclonic storm in 1954 in the Barisal region damaged property worth Taka 10 lakh taka and killed more than 200 people. The cyclone rendered nearly 1,000 people homeless. Two other such calamities

swept over the greater Barisal region in 1957 and 1958. But the damage was less than the previous years'. In 1960, a 22-hour long cyclonic storm and tidal bore hit Barisal, Bhola and the vast coastal belt of Barguna which claimed lives of at least 5,000 people. The Sundarbans was also battered very badly. Nearly 9,000 people were killed in the tornado and tidal surge of May 9, 1961 along the coast line of Bhola and Chittagong.

In May, 1963 a devastating cyclone hit Noakhali and Chittagong and the offshore islands which left at least 15,000 people dead including many poultry birds and cattlheads which were swept away in 10 to 15ft. high tidal bore. On May 11 and 12 in 1965 a cyclonic storm with a wind speed of more than 100 miles per hour (MPH) hit

the off shore islands of Bhola and Patuakhali. More than 10,000 people were killed. The 15 to 20 ft. tidal surge washed away the coastal areas on November 1 in 1966.

On April 4, 1969 a tornado with maximum wind speed of nearly 400 kilometres per hour hit Demra in Dhaka. The tornado killed 1,000 people. The most horrifying and unforgettable cyclonic storm and tidal surge with 15 to 20 ft. high waves battered the southern region and the coastal belt particularly Bhola on November 12 in 1970. It left a widespread trail of death and destruction.

More thana five lakh people were killed, according to official records but the figure is double, according to unofficial sources. Wealth of several corers of taka were damaged and lost during this natural havoc. Several thousands poultry birds and cattleheads were also lost. Due to this natural calamity the first and last general elections were postponed.

The tornado of 'Urirchar' happened on May 25 and 26 in 1985 which claimed lives of at least 10,000 people. It rendered several thousand families home and shelterless. A total of 906 square miles area of six dis-

tricts were battered severely during that tornado of November 9 in 1986. Nearly 100 people were killed in another cyclonic storm that lashed over Patharghata in Barguna dis-

On April 26, 1989 more than 600 people were killed in Manikanj in a cyclonic storm. Nearly one lakh people were killed and missing in Chittagong region in a cyclone and tidal surge on 29 April, 1991.

The tidal bore was nearly 20 feet high. Crops of three thousand square miles area were damaged, 133 people were killed in a cyclone in Cox's Bazar in 1992. Nearly 200 people were killed, according to official sources, in the cyclone of May 19 last year. It has been revealed, due to lowtide during the cyclone and precautionary measures taken earlier from the government. Red crescent and other non-governmental organisations the death figures did not increase. But weather experts opined, due to shortage of necessary cyclone shelters deaths were higher.

After the Urirchar natural havoc 1,5000 cyclone shelters were constructed, but those were

not enough to combat the situation. But even after these cyclonic centres the government as well as different non -governmental organisations are puzzled to think how many more cyclone shelters are needed to save lives of scores of people living in the southern region including the vast coastal belt along the Bay of Bengal. This question arose after the natural havoc that happened on September 27 last year when many of the deaths were recorded 'due to absence of nearby cyclone shelters'. The cyclonic storm of September 26 in 1997 also left a trail of destruction particularly in seven thana areas of Bhola district including Laxmipur, Hatiya. Noakhali, Patuakhali and some nearby districts. According to experts and in-

formed sources, continued cyclonic storms over the coastal districts caused huge damage to crops, houses and embankments along the riverside. The cyclonic storms also caused missing of fishing boats trawlers and fishermen on board. More than 100 fishermen died at different places of the cyclone battered coastal districts.
