The Dhaka Stock Exchange (DSE) yesterday failed to carry out its regular full trading session on the first day under the automated screen-based system. The day also witnessed suspension of trading of some 10

securities. The day's trading on DSE began at 10:30 am and continued till 3:30 pm without the scheduled 30-minute postclosing session. DSE officials said that the post-closing session was suspended due to technical reasons.

Trading of Beximco Pharma, a blue chip and one of the most liquid stocks, started at 10:30 am and ran till 12:51 pm before being suspended due to technical reasons. AMCL Pran, another blue chip, was traded till 12:31 pm before it was suspended on the same ground. Trading of the issue again resumed at 12:49 pm, but only to be suspended again at 12:55

The other issues, which remained suspended on the day, are Alltex Industries, Karnaphuli Insurance, Lexco Ltd. Beximco Synthetics Ltd (Deb) and Aftab Automobiles Ltd. Names of other four issues which faced trading suspension could not be confirmed imme-Due to some foul entry by

some brokers, the memory of these issues got blocked. Things are being taken care of and everything will be back on track by tomorrow," DSE Chief Executive Officer GQ Chowdhury But a key market operator at

The overall flood situation in the country is likely to improve further if there are no heavy showers in the coming days, according to a senior meteorologist.

"Pressure of water in the mafor rivers would be on the wane from today following the full moon", Sajedur Rahman told The Daily Star last night.

So far the water had been moving down the Gages delta to the Bay of Bengal slowly because of the interaction of the lunar cycle, influencing the tidal flow, he said.

Sajedur Rahman said there had been no heavy rainfall in the past fortnight which contributed to the improvement of

the flood situation. The floods sweeping 37 out of 64 districts affecting nearly two million people are likely to roll on and off until middle of

September. There are chances of heavy rainfall because of one or two monsoon depressions, forming in the Bay, a long range forecast for August by the Meteorology

Department said last week. It said there are possibilities of 'more than normal rainfall' in August. The flood situation, now improving, may deteriorate later, it said

Sajedur Rahman said, during June there had been 'less than normal rainfall'. But in July, there were 'more than normal' precipitation, breaking

as an outdoor patient under Assistant Professor Atiqul Huq. He is suffering from diabetes, said a doctor, adding that his condition is improving. The CID will seek further

remand for Akram when the three-day remand expires today, sources said. CID interrogated Akram

from 6 pm to 11 pm Sunday night, following which Akram went to bed. Before he fell sick yesterday afternoon, he was interrogated for an hour, CID officials said. "I have been interrogating

Akram then went to bed and was awakened for lunch at about 2:30 pm. He then went to the bathroom attached to the 10's room and while coming out complained that he was feeling uncomfortable, sources said. CID officials then called

Drug cos form oligopoly, fix price at much higher rate

Taking advantage of a weak regulatory body, a number of pharmaceutical companies have formed an oligopoly, fixing the price of a raw material for an essential drug at a much higher level than the internaional rate. The biggest beneficiary of

the situation is Beximco Pharmaceuticals, being the largest producer of the raw material. Others who also manufacture the same are Square Pharmaceuticals. Ganashastha and Drug International. But the losers are the patients who could buy the drug at a much reduced price if the regulatory body. Drug Administration Authority (DAA), had functioned properly.

According to sources, the DAA had last fixed the price of Amoxycillin, which is purchased by drug companies for conversion into capsules for final consumption, in 1992 at Tk

3950 per kg. The rate was fixed upon an invoice quotation by Beximco Pharmaceuticals, which showed the international price of 6 APA, the immediate earlier stage of the raw material Amoxycillin, at 65.5 US dollar per kg. Since then, prices of 6 APA

companies have imported 6 APA at rates ranging between 51 dollars and 43.4 dollars. But the DAA did not refix price of Amoxycillin to reflect the dropping international

price of 6 APA. Pharmaceutical companies which depend on these four companies for procurement of Amoxycillin, have several times brought the matter to the notice of DAA. But no action

had been taken. However, on August 2, DAA sent letters to the four manufacturers saying that prices of most of the 'starting materials' (raw materials) have gone down in the international market. As such, the companies should also reduce prices of their mate-However, this letter has

raised eye brows from the people concerned. They say that DAA should have refixed the price of Amoxycillin first and then this would have a binding effect on the manufacturers. According to industry

sources, finished Amoxycillin if imported, would cost between 48 dollars and 53 dollars per kg. In taka terms this comes to between Tk 2259 and Tk 2500 including duties. In contrast, local price of finished Amoxycillin is between Tk 3500 and Tk 3300 per kg excluding VAT.

BJP move to amend India's secular constitution

NEW DELHI, Aug 10: India's Hindu nationalist-led government will set up a commission soon to amend the country's secular constitution, home minister Lal Krishna Advani

said on Sunday, reports AFP. The nationalists, who came to power in March, have been accused by the opposition of plotting to re-tailor the Constitution and turn the world's largest democracy into a Hindu Theocracy.

The Home Minister is widely seen as one of the most hardline leaders in his Hindu-revivalist Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). Advani told reporters in the central Indian city of Bhopal that the state-sponsored panel

was likely to begin its work be-

fore parliament resumed its fi-

nal session of the year in Octo-

"Although I cannot set any deadline for the setting up of the commission on the constitution. I hope that it will be formed before the winter session of parliament," the Press Trust of India quoted him as

"The commission will give suggestions about changes and amendments in the Constitution in the light of experience since (India's 1947) independence," Advani said without

elaborating. National political groups including the main opposition Congress Party have accused the BJP of harbouring ambitions of destroying India's secular credentials.

The BJP, which has grown rapidly since the early 1980s, in its election manifesto had campaigned for uniform civil laws covering marriage, divorce and inheritance - a policy vehemently opposed by India's 125 million Muslims, who comprise around 13 per cent of the 960 million population.

It had also struggled for a Hindu temple on the rubbles of a historic mosque razed by Hindu zealots in December 1992. Around 2,000 died in en-

suring riots. The BJP emerged from the January-March national elections as the largest party but had to invite marginal groups into its fold to cobble together a parliamentary majority.
