# Hingis, Davenport in final



BEACH, Aug 16: A red-faced Martina Hingis huffed and puffed chasing

Sanchez-Vicario's shots in a hard-fought 6-4, 6-4 semifinal victory Saturday in the Acura Classic, reports AP.

Hingis blew a 3-0 lead in the first set, then rebounded from a 1-3 deficit in the second. The Swiss teenager broke Sanchez-Vicario twice in winning the match's final three games.

"After I won the first set, I was kind of relaxed, but she was always there," Hingis said. "Against her, you can't give up any points otherwise then she makes you run. I gave my lead up too easy.

No 2 seed Lindsay Davenport beat fourth-seeded Monica Seles 6-4, 6-2 in 59 minutes Saturday night to reach her third final in as many weeks. Davenport won titles at Standford and San Diego, where she notched her first career victory over Seles, also in the semifinals. Davenport brings an 11-

match winning streak into Sunday's final at Manhattan Country Club.

Hingis, the world's topranked player, has lost in the semifinals of her last three tournaments. She hasn't won a title since the Italian Open in

May. -I can't believe I'm in the finals again," said Hingis, who also reached the doubles final

with Natasha Zvereva. "I didn't know how it feels anymore."

Hingis does know how to play the Spaniard, having beaten her seven times in a row. But Sanchez Vicario who won the first time they played in 1996, isn't discouraged. Their two previous meetings went three sets.

I know that I'm getting closer and if I do go for my shots like I did today, I can beat her proba-bly next time," she said. "I know I'm at the same level as her and I can compete.

"She was just missing a lot of balls tonight and I didn't feel like I did anything totally spectacular to win, but she was overhitting and missing more than she normally does," Davenport said.

# Sampras-Rafter showdown

Rafter served an impressively high first serve percentage of 70 per cent and was only taken to deuce once in the 12th game of the first set.

After a closely contested first set, in which Rafter scored the one service break in the 11th game, Kafelnikov failed to show up for the second set of the 64-minute match.

JOHANNESBURG, Aug 16: Former Dutch international star Ruud Gullit is among sixcoaches shortlisted to succeed Frenchman Philippe Troussier as coach of South Africa, reports AFP.

Troussier's contract was not renewed after Bafana Bafana were eliminated in the first round of the 1998 World Cup following a heavy loss to eventual champions France and draws with Denmark and Saudi Arabia.



# Women hold centrestage



BUDAPEST, Aug 16 (AP): The biggest star of this week's European Championships might be 800-me

tre world record-holder Wilson Kipketer of Denmark, and he was born in Kenya. The quadrennial champi-

onships open Tuesday at a time when European track and field seems to be in a slump. That's particularly true for the men. where the sprints this season have been owned by Americans, and every other distance by Africans.

Even Kipketer is beatable. Indomitable for several seasons, he was hit with an attack of malaria in February, didn't resume training until late May, and was beaten last week in the Weltklasse Grand Prix in Zurich — his first loss in three years — by Kenyan Japheth Kimutai.

It's a different story for the European women, who have world-class athletes in almost every event and lead many of the field events.

The six-day championships in the Hungarian capital are sandwiched between last week's Weltklasse, the fourth of the Golden League meets, and the fifth meet in the series Aug 28 in Brussels. About the only sanctuary for



After opening a strong hand, North jumped to 2NT showing a balanced hand, and more than the minimum for the Club opening in their bidding system Instead of showing his Heart suit, South jumped to 4NT asking for Aces. When North showed three, South became ambitious for a grand slam and therefore, checked the Kings. This time also North showed three. South had no loser in any side suit but he did not like so many Kings with the partner because in that case he might not have the Queen of Hearts. One of the Kings might be unnecessary because on the fourth Club (if partner had 4-card Club suit) a Spade or Diamond loser could have been slapped. He therefore resisted the temptation of a grand slam and bid 6NT.

### THE PLAY

East led the Queen of Diamond which was won with the King by the declarer. He could see thirteen tricks provided the Jueen of Hearts were with the East. He therefore played the Ace of Hearts it I then finessed the Jack of Hearts which was lost to the Queen in the West hand. He could have made thirteen tricks by playing the Jack of Hearts initially. But his first instinct was correct not to bid the Grand Slam as the Queen of Hearts might have been missing.
