Onus on Stoichkov

SOFIA, Aug 25 (Reuters/ Internet): Striker Hristo Stoichkov is to play a key role in Bulgaria's new-look squad for their first European championship qualifier against Poland as they seek to put their disappointing World Cup finals behind them.

Bulgaria coach Hristo Boney, who has named a provisional 21-man squad for the match in the Black Sea port of Bourgas on September 6, said Stoichkov was "an experienced and respected player" on whom he would rely "in difficult moments".

The 32-year-old Stoichkov, sacked by Barcelona in March. joined Japanese club Kashiwa Reysol after the World Cup finals in which Bulgaria finished bottom of their opening round group after losing twice and drawing the other game.

Bonev left out nine of Bulgaria's old guard, including midfielder Krassimir Balakov, who had already said he would not play for the national team after the World Cup as he wanted to concentrate on his form for VfB Stuttgart.

Other leading Bulgarian players dropped are strikers Lyuboslav Penev from Spanish Celta Vigo and midfielder Zlatko Yankov from Turkey's Besiktas, Emil Kostadinov and Trifon Ivanov, who both played for CSKA Sofia last season.

Ivailo Yordanov from Sporting Lisbon kept his place in the team, but the majority are young, six of them between 21 and 23.

Four who might make their international debut include 22year-old goalkeeper Dimitar Ivankov and 21-year-old defender Zahari Sirakov, both

C'wealth squad by ministerial order

Late but welcome decision

Good sense seems to have finally prevailed on our sports organisers. The Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) deserves kudos for taking the decision, belated though it may be, to drastically cut the size of the Bangladesh squad for the forthcoming 16th Commonwealth Games. The BOA actually endorsed the decision of the State Minister for Youth and Sports Obaidul Qader. It seems that the BOA has also been able to decide where our potentialities lie.

The BOA yesterday in a meeting, chaired by its president Lt. Gen (Retd) Mahabubur Rahman, welcomed the state Minister's desire to only send the cricket and shooting teams for the Kuala Lumpur Games. This was in a bid to cut down on the expenses in view of the grave flood situation prevailing in the country.

Besides, the president and his secretary general Golam **Quddus** Chowdhury have also volunteered not to join the revised 39-member Bangladesh team so that some more public money can be saved. But the noble gesture only came to the fore following a surprise meeting of Mr Qader with the general secretaries of seven sports federation on Monday.

In a sensational twist of events on Monday, the State Minister, who had earlier approved of a 73-member Bangladesh contingent for the Kuala Lumpur Games, declared that the government can only afford to send to the Games the cricket and shooting teams apart from a few delegates and four sports journalists.

The surprise but welcome decision at the eleventh hour came as a shocking revelation for the athletics, swimming hockey, boxing and weightlifting teams. It was learnt that the hockey players in the national camp heard the news while they were assembling for the morning training session yesterday. If one has to feel sorry, perhaps the hockey players need to be consoled for their disappoint-

The NSC has since ordered the camps of the five excluded disciplines to closes down, but not before it has incurred an expenditure of nearly taka 50 lakh in the last couple of months for the purpose.

The untimely move however left the BOA in a state of confusion, leaving its secretary-general to hurriedly send faxed messages to the Games organisers in Malaysia as well as to the Commonwealth headquarters in London seeking apology for the late change.

With the Games beginning from September 11, the BOA may face heavy fines for the late withdrawal.

"But we are hopeful of skipping any punitive measures since we have withdrawn from some events because of the prevailing situation. It is more of a humanitarian case", said Golam Quddus Chowdhury at his office vesterday.

The BOA secretary-general also said that the shooting team is likely to leave the capital on September 1 while the cricket team will depart for Kuala Lumpur on September 5.

LONDON, Aug 25: Sri Lankan middle-order batsman Chandika Hathurusingha made his claim

for a place in the Test team to face England at The Oval with an unbeaten century against Hampshire on Monday, reports

Hathurusingha made 108 not out and Mehela Jayawardena hit 90 as the Sri Lankans reached their target of 309 with 17 balls to spare and by five wickets. Hampshire declared at their

overnight 347 for eight, made on the first day after the second was washed out by rain.

With the Sri Lankans anxious for batting practice they declared their first innings at 39 for four.

Along the way they lost Test contenders Sanath Javashuriya, Russel Arnold, Jayawardena and Hashhan Tillaekeratne to Hampshire's inexperienced pair Alex Morris

and Simon Francis. Hampshire captain Robin Smith forfeited his side's second innings, leaving the Sri Lankans 82 overs to reach the

For another Test contender, opening batsman Arnold, the day was a personal disaster. He was out twice without scoring in the space of 75 minutes and

nine balls. - Arnold faced four balls in the first innings and five in the second, out both times to Mor-

The Sri Lankans soon recovered with Jayasuriya at last finding form in a fluent 40 which included eight fours. But the major partnership of

the innings was provided by Jayawardena and Hathurusingha who put on 108 for the third wicket in 28 overs.

Jayawardena seemed certain to reach his first century of the tour but after making 90 in just under three hours he edged Francis to first slip where Raj Marua clutched the catch.

Francis later removed Tillekaratne at 246 but by then Hathurusingha was in command and it was he who hit the winning runs off leg-spinner Giles White. White had claimed his first

wicket of the season in his previous over when he had Upal Chandana caught on the boundary at mid-wicket for 34. In total Hathurusingha hit 13 boundaries off 184 balls at it proved crucial in the Sri Lankans, who recorded the second win of their five matches in



Divorce papers were first filed a year ago but the couple appeared to be trying for a reconciliation in June when the distraught Gascoigne was sensationally thrown out of the England squad on the eve of the World Cup soccer tournament in France.

They then spent a holiday in Florida with their two-year-old son, Regan, but friends later said the attempt to save the marriage had failed.

Flamboyant and outspoken, Gascoigne was once regarded as England's most talented soccer player. But widely-publicised bouts of drinking and partying as well as injury have taken their toll on his health and popularity.


