

Chelsea owe Poyet one



Chelsea's underdogs beat Real the European Su-

per Cup here on Friday night, thanks to a late strike from Uruguayan supersub Gustavo Poyet, reports AFP.

Chelsea, the European Cup Winners' Cup holders, made a shaky start against the European champions, but grew in confidence in the second half before Povet delivered his knockout blow in the 82nd minute.

The Uruguayan striker, who was voted man-of-the-match, rounded off a perfect night for the Chelsea contingent among an 8,000 crowd at this millionaires' paradise.

Real were left to count the cost of their missed chances, a lack of bite in the second half and some bad luck which saw them hit the woodwork with the Blues' defence beaten.

In a scrappy opening, Chelsea were ragged in defence and woefully short of ideas moving forward, while the Spaniards' cool assurance and superior ball skills gave them a clear edge.

Spanish favourite Raul skied an early opportunity but only a couple of last-minute interceptions by a superb Frank Leboeuf and a solid Michael

Duberry kept the European

champions out. Chelsea's first scoring Madrid 1-0 to lift chance came in the 17th lied and in the 62nd minute minute, when Gianfranco Zola drilled in a cross from the right. Pierluigi Casiraghi failed to connect and the onrushing Celestine Babyaro somehow managed to skew his volley 90 degrees off-target.

Leboeuf kept up the spoiling tactics at the back, but Real came literally an inch from scoring in the 35th minute when defender Fernando Hierro drove a superb 25-yard freekick over the Chelsea wall.

The curling shot beat goalkeeper Ed de Goey but cracked against the inside of the left hand post and flashed back across the undefended goal. Chelsea's luck held again minutes later, when Brazil's

The Spanish giants soon ral-Raul twisted his way past Graeme Le Saux before firing in a stinging opportunity when he headed Zola's powerful low cross up and over instead of down and in, while Hierro nodded a Clarence Seedorf corner narrowly wide.

The match was now evenly balanced and Chelsea were clearly gaining in confidence. Poyet deftly teed himself up a deflected shot and Le Saux sent a daisycutter across the face of the Spanish goal as Gianluca Vialli's men went looking for a late winner.

And Chelsea, who beat Real Madrid in the 1971 European Cup Winners' Cup final, found it just eight minutes from the whistle.

Poyet led a counter-attack down the middle before feeding the ball out to Zola. The Sardinian tried to jink his way through the Real defence but eventually settled for returning it to the unmarked Poyet who smacked it first time into the right-hand corner of the net.

The strike sealed the latest in a series of trophies for the west London club, and should do much to settle the nerves of a side who have made a difficult start to the Premiership season.






