Coincidence?

ROME, Aug 31: Italian food baron Sergio Cragnotti is facing claims that Rome citizens are paying more for their milk because his football team Lazio have just spent 30 million dollars on Christian Vieri, reports

A busy weekend saw Cragnotti's food empire Cirio increase the price of milk by 100 lira a litre, and his club pay 50 billion lira for the Atletico Madrid ace.

AS Roma fans have not been slow to make a connection.

The capital's two clubs are sworn enemies and Cragnotti was soon accused of paying for his new centre forward with the 'cappucino' coffees of Rome's

"It's under rubbish," fumed the multi-millionaire businessman. "I don't need to sell more cappucinos to build up Lazio's team.

"Unfortunately, it's a national trait for people in our country to attack any powerful group which they don't belong

Cragnotti was also stung by a parallel with Italy's other footballing millionaires - TV and film mogul Silvio Berlusconi. who owns AC Milan, and the Agnelli family who control Fiat and Juventus.

"Nobody dared to say that the price of a Fiat car went up because they bought Michel Platini or that Berlusconi needed mediaset to sell more of their films to strengthen AC Milan. he said.

Cragnotti, whose club is now listed on the Italian stock exchange, insisted: "The 'centrale del latte' has a separate set of accounts from Lazio.

"Anyone who claims that money is being channelled from one company to another doesn't know about the rules of the stock exchange.

The arrival of Vieri may not be the end of Lazio's extensive transfer dealings this summer, according to the club's backer.

Marcel Desailly, who won the World Cup with France and the European Super Cup with Chelsea on Saturday night, could be making an early return to the Serie A.

Desailly, who has just left AC Milan after five years, has apparently already been the subject of a bid by Lazio.

Cragnotti told the Corriere Dello Sport: "I'm trying to get him, but they don't want to give him to me. However, let's see what happens over the next few days."

FORT LAUDERDALE, Florida, Aug 31: (AP): Diego Serna scored three goals on assists from Carlos Valderrama as the Miami Fusion solidified their hold on a playoff spot with a 3-2 win Sunday over the New England Revolution.

In the second half, the Revolution struck back, making it 2-1 in the 56th minute when midfielder Edwin Gorter scored on a shot from 28 yards. Gorter's shot deflected off Miami defender Kris Kelderman, right past rookie goalkeeper Matt Napoleon.

Revolution forward Raul Diaz Arce stunned the Lockhart Stadium crowd of 6,127 in the 74th minute when he firsttimed a left-footed volley just inside Napoleon's post to tie it at 2-2. The goal was Diaz Arce's 18th this season.


