Draft resolution adopted: Summit opens today

NAM's call to reinforce fight against terrorism

DURBAN, South Africa, Sept 1: The Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) summit last night adopted a draft resolution condemning terrorism, but remained divided on key issues including the war-torn Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC).

The resolution, tabled by Lebanon, called for reinforcement of the "international fight against terrorism" and "condemns any act, method or recourse to terrorise," according to a text obtained by AFP.

Experts from the member nations were to finalise the draft, which will be put to a vote of the heads of state and government tomorrow. The two-day summit will

discuss the proliferation of nuclear weapons, conflicts in the Gulf and Middle East and the Asian economic crisis. The draft also supported "the principle of a definition of ter-

rorism distinct from the legit-

60,000 sq km flooded

Duration longest, crop d'amages worse than '88

Duration of flood this year has c rossed all previous records and damage of crops by this flood is feared to be at least three times more than that caused by the 1988 floods, one of the worst calamities in the recent past, experts in the Meteorologi cal Department told The Daily Sitar yesterday.

The land area flooded this time is, however, less compared to the 1988 floods, the experts said. A total of 60,000 sq km area has been submerged by floods this year compared to 90,000 aq km in 1988.

This year, the flood water has beer I above the danger level for about a month and a half since July 10. In 1988, it was only for 1 5 days.

The three major rivers -Brahmap utra, Ganges and Meghna -- have been flowing above the ir respective danger marks since July 10 this year. The three rivers crossed their red marks on September 1 in 1988, they added.

Though the flood water has started receding, the rate of recession is very slow and the process may take another 10 days to be faster. "By that time, peasants are going to miss the proper timing to cultivate the transplanted Aman."

An expert observed that crop loss may stand at 30 lakh MT this time compared to some 10 lakh MT in 1988. He said, about 60 per cent of the Aman crop has been affected by the flood "But there is a consolation that some major Aman producing districts — Dinajpur, Rangpur and Bogra — are least affected by floods this year," the expert

In 1988, except some lowlying areas, Aman crops withstood the flood water because of its late advent and short duration. "But this year the flood hit early and peasants in most of the areas even could not plant Aman seedlings. Seed beds have also been damaged."
