President's

appeal to face flood unitedly

RAJSHAHI, Sept 5: President Shahabuddin Ahmed today appealed to all, irrespective of party affiliation, to face the devastating flood unitedly, reports UNB

After a day-long visit to flood affected areas in Bhuapur, Chapainawabganj and Ra-jshahi, the President was speaking at a briefing session at the Rajshahi Circuit House. The meeting was attended by the elite and political leaders of Rajshahi, including City Mayor Mizanur Rahman Minu and Nadim Mostafa, MP.

Rajshahi Divisional Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner briefed the President on the flood situation and distribution of relief materials in the division and the district.

President Shahabuddin first visited the Bhuapur-Tarakandi embankment. He saw the damaged spots of the embankment at Palshia, about five kilometres from Bhuapur thana.

The embankment was threatened by the flood waters of the river Jamuna. The president was told that army took appropriate action to save the embankment and now it is under control.

Aman is gone, support to Rabi crop will be crucial: Economists

As the ongoing flood is making a big dent in the country's poverty alleviation prospect, economists view that the challenge before the government will be to ensure a large-scale credit intervention in the agriculture sector.

They also say that to stop the asset liquidation process by the

poor to sustain the impact of the flood, the government should make a careful sequencing of food import and safety net programmes. The main strategy should be to make food and jobs available in the right

"The country's prospect for graduation from poverty is certainly going to be affected by the flood and this will be a major setback for Bangladesh. A major portion of the poor will again slide back below the poverty line because of income erosion," says Dr Hossain Zillur Rahman of Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies (BIDS).

The Brahmaputra, coming back from a retreat, has continued to unleash its fury in tango with the Ganges and threatened to worsen the country's flood situation further in the next few days, experts said.

Officials reported 29 more deaths from 24 districts that saw flooding take a more serious turn yesterday. The death toll now stood at 522.

In all, 47 districts have so far been affected. At least 13 of them had their situation worsened by Friday night due to the Brahmaputra surge.

The rise in the Brahmaputra synchronising with the Ganges, both already above the red mark, pushed water levels up in other rivers, including the Buriganga and the Shitalakhya, worsening the situation in and around the Dhaka

The Faripdur district administration called in the Army to help save the town protection embankment, threat-

ened by flood waters yesterday. In Chandpur, the situation deteriorated for the third time in two months as the town went under three to four feet of water.

Rushing water from swollen Ganges down the Gorai, the flood protection embank-ment at Talbaria in Mirpur thana of Kushtia, inundating homes of at least 3,000 fami-

The Ganges looked menacing for the town protection embankment at Rajshahi, reports from our correspondents and other sources said.

"The Brahmaputra, rising by metre during the past three days, is going to worsen the situation in central Bangladesh. including the Dhaka city and its adjoining areas, further today," an official at Flood Forecasting and Warning Centre (FFWC) said last night.

The official said the situation in the capital and its suburbs, already reeling under the worst floods in decades, is going to decline further, adding to the miseries of the people trapped since the middle of July.

Reports received by FFWC from India said the Brahmaputra continued its rising trend at Dhubri and Goalpara. At Farakka, the Ganges remained steady, suggesting the worsening trend downstream, the FFWC official said. See Page 12 Col 3

UN appeal for \$223m emergency flood relief The UN system in Bangla-The United Nations Friday

issued a flash appeal for US dollar 223 million for emergency relief and rehabilitation work in flood-ravaged Bangladesh. reports UNB.

The appeal, however, did not detail other obvious rehabilitation needs estimated by the Bangladesh government at over US dollar 400 million which will be the subject to a second appeal with waters recede, said a UN press release in the city vesterday.

The total budget breakdown by area for this joint UN appeal is as follows: Health - \$ 8.76 million. Food (immediate relief) - \$ 58.35 million, Food (protracted relief) - \$ 50 million. Shelter - \$ 25 million Water and Sanitation - \$ 10 million, Education — \$ 34 million and Agriculture - \$ 36.60 million.

The purpose of the international appeal by the UN is to solicit contributions for emergency relief and initial rehabilitation to the people affected by protracted flood from July to September.

The appeal concentrates on providing emergency relief to the most vulnerable - children and women — particularly the homeless and landless, over the next three to four months.

The appeal covers the needs for emergency relief such as food, medicine and shelter, and initial rehabilitation like agriculture, shelter materials, water supply repairs and learning and teaching materials.

ADB considers spl fund for post-flood rehabilitation The Asian Development

Bank (ADB) is considering a special fund for the post-flood rehabilitation programme in Bangladesh in addition to its annual funding of US dollar 300 million, reports UNB.

"We will try to find additional fund and concentrate our help for the rehabilitation of infrastructure damaged by flood," Francesco Pittore, the leader of a delegation of ADB Board of Directors, told a press conference at the ADB office in the city yesterday.

Pittore said a technical mission will be in Dhaka next week to assess the extent of damage and identify the priority projects where ADB can extend its

A police constable was caught by local people for allegedly snatching a gold chain from a female passenger of an auto-rickshaw at the Nabisco Crossing in Tejgaon yesterday afternoon.

Police said, the alleged snatcher was identified as Rokon Uddin, a constable of Razarbagh Police Line.

The incident took place when the passenger, Anwara Begum, was going to Nakhalpara from Tongi on the autorickshaw at about 5:30 pm. The constable in plain-

clothes snatched the gold chain when the auto-rickshaw was stuck in a traffic jam. Local people chased Rokon when Anwara screamed for help. At one stage, they caught

Rokon and beat him up. Police rescued Rokon from the mob and also arrested him but failed to recover the gold chain. Anwara Begum filed a case with Tejgaon thana in this regard yesterday.
