PM opens power plant in Khulna

From Page 1 She assured the nation that the power shortage will be reduced by December when an additional 500 megawatt will be generated in both public and

A joint venture with Wartsila NSD of Finland, the Khulna Power Company Ltd setup the plant at a cost of over Tk 500 crore. The PDB will purchase the electricity at Tk 2.24 per unit and distribute it among the consumers.

private sector.

The prime minister said considering the paramount importance of electricity in economic development, the government has undertaken concerted efforts to generate power in the country.

After assuming power. Hasina said, her government adopted power generation policy in the private sector in October 1996. Being attracted by the incentives, many renowned foreign companies came forward to set up power plants in

Bangladesh. Under the programme, the decision to set up four bargemounted power plants through international tender had been taken in November 1996 to keep pace with the growing electricity demand. These include one 110-megawatt plant at Khulna, two 236 megawatt plants at Haripur and one 130-megawatt

plant at Baghabari. The 110 megawatt bargemounted plant began operation today while the remaining three are expected to start generation by the middle of next

The prime minister said process of generating another 1,325 megawatt power in the private sector is also underway.

These are 360-megawatt Haripur plant, 450-megawatt Meghna Ghat first phase and 115-megawatt Baghabari plant.

Hasina said that another barge-mounted power plant with a capacity of 100megawatt will be set up at Noapara, Jessore.

About one billion US dollar is going to be invested in the private power sector, she said disclosing that US company AES signed a deal on Wednesday to set up the Haripur Power

Apart from the private sector, the government has also taken initiatives to set up power plants. The 210-megawatt 6th unit at Ghorashal is nearing completion. Besides, process of construction of 109-megawatt power plant at Haripur, 60megawatt at Shahzibazar and 210-megawatt at Shidhirganj is also going on, she informed.

Hasina said the government has undertaken steps to develop the transmission system along with increasing power generation. For the first time a 145km long Comilla-Baroaulia 132-KV transmission line is being constructed using indigenous technology and resources. Work on the line from Baroaulia to Feni portion will be com-

larly, Dhaka Electric Supply

pleted soon and the remaining portion by December this year, The prime minister said for increasing efficiency in power management, work on separation of production, and transmission and distribution system is underway. Power Grid Company of Bangladesh has -been constituted for separating the transmission system. Simi-

Company has been formed for power distribution in Mirpur area in the capital.

Hasina said rehabilitation and management of some old power plants is also being given to private sector. International tenders have been opened for rehabilitation and operation of four plants. These are 110megawatt power plant in Khulna. 20-megawatt in Sylhet. 20-megawatt in Saidpur and 60megawatt in Sikalbaha.

She said at present the average electricity requirement in the country is 2300 megawatt per day, against which 2000 megawatt is being produced. Through planned load-management the current situation has improved substantially, the prime minister added.

Hasina said system loss has jeopardised the power management system for the last several years.

'Without preventing technical loss, pilferage, illegal connection and misuse, we would not be able to ensure proper service to consumers by limited production," she said.

Hasina reminded the officials to be careful in increasing revenue income apart from stopping systems loss.

Referring to the success of Rural Electrification Board in realising revenue from the poor rural consumers, Hasina posed a question why PDB and DESA would not be able to realise the price of electricity from rich and big consumers of urban ar-

The prime minister said a 500-megawatt power plant could be set up with the dues amounting to Tk 1700 crore lying with the consumers.

Bangladesh Mahila Awami League distributed dry food and other relief materials among the flood-hit people at East Hajipara in the city.

Lalbagh thana unit of Bangladesh Awami Shechhashebak League in collaboration with Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA) on Friday launched a two-day relief distribution programme at the Kamrangirchar and Hazaribag embankment. They have also set up medical centres there to provide treatment

Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) distributed 4,000 ruties and halua among the flood victims at Keraniganj and at the Dhaka Jute Mill areas, a BDR press release said.

Form 'national govt' to face calamity: Ershad

Jatiya Party Chairman H M Ershad yesterday urged the international community to help

Streets of London paved with gold, platinum deposits!

LONDON, Sept 12: The streets of London and other British cities are paved with gold and other precious metals a geologist has discovered, the press reported here today, says

The metals are being emitted by exhaust fumes from cars fitted with catalytic converters and in the case of platinum the levels are rising so fast that it will soon become feasible to pan the roads for deposits, Dr Hazel Prichard believes.

The geologist from Cardiff University started collecting road dust in the Welsh city to see whether any of the platinum, gold and other precious metals used in modern exhausts ended up on the streets.

She found that the levels of platinum which is more valuable than gold "are quite high .. We are approaching economic

Ceasefire in DRC African ministers fail to agree on terms

ADDIS ABABA, Sept 12: African defence ministers failed today to agree on the terms of a ceasefire in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, a Rwandan delegate

"We could not agree on the principles of a ceasefire," the delegate told Reuters after a meeting of regional military officials at the Organisation of African Unity (OAU) headquar-

ters in Ethiopia. Uganda and Rwanda, both accused of supporting the rebels, walked out early on Saturday morning after the talks reached an impasse over whether rebels fighting to topple Congo President Laurent Kabila should attend the meet-

ing, the delegate said. The Congolese delegation and representatives from Zimbabwe, Angola and Namibia which are providing military support to Kabila - had refused to allow the rebels to join the negotiations, he said.
