Leading Euro clubs to sit with UEFA

GENEVA, Sept 12: Six major European soccer clubs will take part in UEFA's bid to stage off a breakaway European Super League...

Senior officials from Italy's Juventus, England's Liverpool, Germany's Bayern Munich, Ajax Amsterdam in the Netherlands, FC Porto of Portugal and France's Olympique Lyonnais will all attend the first meeting of the 14-member UEFA panel on Monday in Geneva.

Senior UEFA officials and representatives from national leagues in England, Germany and Italy will also sit on the panel.

UEFA created the task force to find ways of restructuring its tournaments in response to plans by Italy's Media Partners company to start up a European "super league" competition. The committee is due to make initial recommendations before December 25.

Liverpool won't follow others

LONDON, Sept 12: English football giant Liverpool Club will not be sold off to a media group, its chairman said, reports AFP.

The chairman of the Premiership club, David Moores, ruled out that the club would go the same way as Manchester United, taken over by BSkyB for £2.2 billion pounds (around one billion dollars) this week.

Moores said: "I do not wish to comment on how other clubs do their business, but I see no change whatsoever in what is happening here now or in the foreseeable future."

Arsenal say they are holding talks with Carlton Communications about a possible deal and city analysts have suggested that Liverpool could be next in line.

But Moores, part of the wealthy Littlewoods dynasty, owns 57 per cent of Liverpool and the club, privately owned, do not trade on the stock market.

Maharani's bad luck

KUALA LUMPUR, Sept 12: Shooting's international governing body has stopped former Soviet world champion Irina Maharani from appearing at the Commonwealth Games for hosts Malaysia, reports AFP.

Maharani, who was given Malaysian nationality three months ago, would have been a hot favourite for the sports pistol gold in the shooting competition on the northern island of Langkawi.

But the international federation, the IUT, now plans disciplinary action against Malaysia for not getting clearance when she competed in the World Championships in Barcelona in July, the New Straits Times reported.

The IUT imposes a three-year residential qualification before a shooter can represent a new country.

Two to fight it out

NEW YORK, Sept 12: The world's top-ranked players reached a women's singles title showdown at the US Open Friday — but in vastly contrasting styles, reports AFP.

Defending champion and world number-one Martina Hingis had to fight for her life to beat third-seeded Jana Novotna 3-6, 6-1, 6-4 while

accept that she had lost Friday because she had lost her nerve. She said she didn't think back to her infamous loss to Steffi Graf in the 1993 final at the All England club when she also squandered a 4-1 lead in the decisive set.

"I think today it was a fantastic match and it could well have been a worthy final," she said.

"We both produced a wonderful display of aggressive tennis.

Davenport was never seriously troubled by last year's finalist Venus Williams.

Davenport, whose powerful groundstrokes overwhelmed Williams, also stayed purposeful and calm throughout.

"It's another thing I've been working on — to stay calm and be mentally tougher — and not to worry about bad points."

In fact Davenport, who has won three hard-court titles this summer, needed to stay calm and collected when Williams, who was trailing, asked for a second-set toilet break — seen by many as a deliberate ploy to break her opponent's concentration.

"I don't know if she had to go to the bathroom, but I played her a couple of weeks ago and when I got up a set and a break, she asked for an injury timeout."

"Hopefully she had to go to the bathroom. I don't know if she did but it's been happening more and more with some players lately."

Williams shrugged off the issue and refused to admit that she had been beaten by a better player.

"She's better results than this year," was all she would say, adding "I wasn't on top of my game today. I can play better. That's definite."

Asked if she had lost because of inexperience, Williams snapped "I should have stayed in the hotel. I think I was ready today but I don't think you should blame it on lack of experience. If you give someone a racket they should be able to use it. I just didn't use mine too well today."

Against Davenport, Hingis will be gunning for her fifth Grand Slam singles title and her first singles title of any kind in nearly four months. She won the Australian Open, Wimbledon and the United States Open in 1997 and this year successfully defended her Australian Open title before semifinal exits at Roland Garros and Wimbledon.

The match statistics were eloquent. Novotna, the aggressor throughout, committed 50 unforced errors — 20 of them in the final set — and won only 14 points in the second set.

"The first set took a lot out of me," she said, adding "There were a lot of rallies and a lot of running. Everything went just a little too fast for me in the second."

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sledgehammer groundstrokes in the final. "I know I'm not as strong as her. But I shall try to keep the ball in play and use her power," she said.

The 6ft 3 in (1m90) Davenport was clearly elated after her win over Williams.

"It's a terrific feeling," said Davenport, who has shed some 30 pounds in the past year in a fitness regime that is clearly paying dividends on court.

"Everything is working out just great," she said. "This time I came to the US Open not to lose in the semis and my goal is to win it."

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Starr intrusion into tennis

NEW YORK, Sept 12 (AP/Internet): Home runs, tornadoes and now details of the White House sex scandal have all bumped the US Open out of the spotlight.

Just when Martina Hingis and Jana Novotna began play on the main court in the women's semifinals Friday, CBS interrupted its live coverage of the U.S. Open. Instead of tennis, there was Dan Rather talking about the release of Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr's report on the Clinton scandal.

"We'll have the stellar match from the U.S. Open later in the afternoon," Rather said as Novotna hit a flying forehand volley to make it 2-2, 40-15 first set.

CBS came back to tennis 45 minutes later, with Rather citing "contractual obligations to the U.S. Open." The Novotna-Hingis match was tied a set apiece when action picked up live.

It was just one more bump for this snakebit Grand Slam tournament.

For the first time since 1989, four of the top five women's seeds made it through the two-week minefield to the semifinals.

But with the Starr report released and the future of the Clinton presidency in question, tennis again became less compelling.

For the Open, the timing could not have been worse. CBS contract gives it exclusive live broadcast rights to all matches beginning with the second Friday. Until then, USA cable network showed the matches from 11 a.m.-11 p.m. EDT each week-day.

The release of the Starr report one day earlier would have meant that more than just the 19,000 people in Arthur Ashe Stadium could see some of the most glamorous matches of the tournament, the American showcase for a sport trying to regain public attention.

"CBS has a responsibility to provide national news coverage," said LeslieAnne Wade, vice president of communications for CBS Sports. "We understand the disappointment of tennis viewers. We returned to tournament coverage as soon as possible."

Arsenal sign Ljungberg

LONDON, Sept 12 (Reuters/Internet): English league champions Arsenal have completed the signing of Swedish attacking midfielder Fredrik Ljungberg, the club confirmed on Saturday.

"I like his intelligence, his sharp eyes, his quick, good pace," Arsenal manager Arsene Wenger said of the 21-year-old international. "He has all the assets you need to be successful in the modern game."

Media reports said Ljungberg, who won his fifth cap in Sweden's 2-1 win over England last Saturday, cost Arsenal three million pounds (five million dollars).

The signing came too late for Ljungberg to make his debut for Arsenal in their away match against Leicester City on Saturday, the club said.

Davenport proves a point

NEW YORK, Sept 12 (Reuters/Internet): Lindsay Davenport answered her doubters on Friday by reaching the US Open final.

"I think I've really proven a lot of people wrong," said the second seed after outslugging fifth seed Venus Williams 6-4, 6-4 to reach her first Grand Slam singles final.

"No one ever said when I was growing up I was ever going to be any good or get to a Grand Slam final, or in my teens I wasn't expected to do anything," said Davenport. "I just tried hard, so hard to get where I'm at. I think it's great."

The 22-year-old Davenport can become the first American-born women's Open champion since Chris Evert in 1982 by beating top seed and defending champion Martina Hingis in Saturday's final at the Arthur Ashe Stadium.

For the first time in her career, Davenport entered a major championship actually believing she could win it.

"This time I came to the US Open not to lose in the semis," said Davenport, who went out in last year's semifinals to Hingis. "My goal was to try and win it. I've got one more match to go."

Davenport turned professional in 1993 without the fanfare that accompanied the debuts of many of her contemporaries.

"You know everyone says when people are young they are going to be great. They're going to be great. No one ever said anything about me. I was never a prodigy. I was never going to be any good," said Davenport.

"Maybe it bothered me a little bit in my teens, but I kind of realised after a certain point there's no use in listening to it or arguing with it," said Davenport.

This has been a breakthrough season for the Californian girl, who enjoyed only modest success previously.

She reached a career-high number two in the world by winning four tournaments and reaching the semifinals at the Australian Open and French Open.

The hard-hitting Davenport, now ranked third in the world, has lost a total of just 24 games in six victories at the Open and entered the tournament with a chance to be number one had Hingis stumbled before the final.

The 6-foot, 2-inch (1.89m) Davenport does not possess the natural athleticism of a Venus Williams. "She's a tremendous athlete, probably the best one that plays tennis," but she makes the most of what she has.

"For me I had to stick to things that I do well, that's being aggressive and keeping the other people off balance.

"In tennis you don't have to jump high or be lightning quick. There's all different type of players that can play tennis." And if Davenport has proved anything this summer, it's that she CAN play tennis.

Venus' shattered dream

NEW YORK, Sept 12: Venus Williams was deprived of a return-trip to the final of the US Open when she lost 6-4, 6-4 to second-seeded Lindsay Davenport on Friday at the National Tennis Centre, reports Reuters.

The dynamic 18-year-old American was also denied the chance to wear the seventh and last chic tennis dress in a provocative line especially designed for her Grand Slam campaign.

"I think I'm deeply saddened that I didn't have my opportunity to wear my seventh dress," Williams said, tongue in cheek, after her one hour, 12 minute defeat to the power-stroking Davenport.

"I'm going to put it in the coffin and bury it," said Williams. "It was red, white and blue. Of course, matching hair and nails," she added about the ensemble she would have concocted had she booked an encore final performance at Arthur Ashe Stadium.

Instead, it will be Davenport dueling top-seeded world number one Martina Hingis, who last year dispatched Williams in straight sets.

Williams was simply outplayed by Davenport, who has now beaten her five of six times. The supremely athletic Williams said afterward her goal was to play consistently and take control of the points.

Davenport suggested that Williams did her a favour by hitting with less ferocity in hopes of gaining greater control.

"I think she wasn't going for her shots as much, trying maybe to be a little more consistent, it was giving me a little bit more time to set up," said Davenport. "I knew if I had the opportunity, I really had to go for the shot."

Williams, who shot to prominence with her exhilarating run through the field last year in her US Open debut, said she believed she was a better player than last year and was continually improving. But she did not want to blame her defeat on a lack of experience.

"Maybe like a year from now I'll admit it. But I think in the end, I should be able to play, too," said Williams, who won two tournaments this year. "I've been practicing. I should be able to come out and play ball. If I'm not ready, I should stay at home."

Williams began a meteoric rise two years ago. She began 1977 ranked 204, ended the year ranked 22nd and now stands at number five.
