

Nicol: A star in the making

KUALA LUMPUR, Sept 13 (AP): She's 15 years old, likes math at school and shopping with pals. And as Malaysia's squash wonder, Nicol David also loves to give world-class players the jitters.

David, No. 1 in the women's field in Asia, made a splash at the Commonwealth Games before succumbing Sunday to Linda Charman of England, a top 10 player who dwarfed the Malaysian teenager in size.

But judging by her poise and speed, the girl's future seems a bright one.

Malaysians certainly think so.

Hundreds of people packed the stands to cheer her, whooping so much that the referee had to hush them into silence. Even Malaysian King Tan Sri Ja'afar, looking casual in a blue sports jacket, took a front row seat with bodyguards in tow.

"I'm still young so there's no pressure on me," David said after her 9-6, 9-6, 9-0 loss. "Every time I play, all I do is keep focused, play my game and not worry about my opponents."

David, who started playing with her two sisters a decade ago, beat experienced Melanie Jans of Canada in a first-round match and is scheduled to play doubles Wednesday.

She has made big strides in the last six months, reaching the final of an international tournament in Malaysia before pulling out with a fever. On the way, she beat No. 10 Alison Wray of England.

David trains for two hours daily and works out with light weights. Already a veteran of the junior tournament circuit, she has played in England, Scotland, Hong Kong and Australia. Her father is an engineer and her mother is a schoolteacher.


Her black hair dyed with streaks of the national color, yellow, David opened with a backhand volley winner against Charman that had the crowd yelping in delight. But she grew error-prone as the 26-year-old Englishwoman wore her down.

She'll also have to grow more. At times, she was simply too small to reach Charman's low crosscourt drives.

Richard Gianfield, a British coach on the Malaysian squash team, said he and David's parents don't want to press her into a professional career too early. Registering her in the Commonwealth Games was more of an experiment, he said.

But David, who turned 15 on Aug. 26, looked at ease Sunday night. Like an old pro, she signed autographs for fans, posed for their snapshots and flashed a smile at the King.

Rafter ready for 'Scud' An all-Aussie final

NEW YORK, Sept 13 (AP) - Patrick Rafter will have to wait. Australia will be all the rage in this US Open men's final.

That set up an all-Australian final Sunday, with Rafter facing unseeded Mark Philippoussis, who defeated Carlos Moya 6-1, 6-4, 5-7, 6-4 in the other semifinal. It also protected the record of 12 Slam titles held by another Australian, Roy Emerson.

The last time two Australians played for the US Open crown was 1970, when Ken Rosewall defeated Tony Roche, who is Rafter's coach.

Rafter, his pony tail dancing as he ripped shot after shot, wore the top-ranked Sampras down and finished him off with a backhand shot that whistled past the four-time Open champ.

The Australian had 55 winners and just 22 unforced errors in the five sets. Sampras finished with 16 aces but the same number of double faults.

Sampras, gunning for a record-tying 12th Grand Slam championship, had revenge on his mind after losing to Rafter on a disputed ace at week point in Cincinnati three weeks ago. After the match, he was asked

the difference between himself and Rafter and snapped: "Ten Grand Slams."

They looked much closer than that on Saturday, with Rafter, encouraged by the win in their last meeting, keeping the pressure on the world's No. 1 player. Rafter had said he was always intimidated by Sampras before, but that was no more in evidence at the Open.

Even after Sampras won the first set on a tiebreaker at 10-8, Rafter traded him shot for shot. It wasn't until 1 hour, 43 minutes into the match that Sampras finally got a break point in the fourth game of the third set. He converted but shortly after that, he came up limping, favouring his left leg after a backhand volley return.

Leading 5-2, he took an injury time out and had left quadriceps muscle massaged and his upper left thigh wrapped. He returned to finish out the set 6-2 but was favouring the leg.

Sampras said the injury shocked him.

"I wasn't sure I'd be able to continue," he said. "Adrenaline was the only thing that kept me going. It was just bad luck. I couldn't put a lot of weight on it and I couldn't push off."

"I don't know if I would have played tomorrow if I had gotten through tonight."

That would not be a problem. Rafter came right after him, using service breaks at the start of both the fourth and fifth sets to take control. Sampras battled gamely but was hobbling on several points.

The final turning point came in the fifth set, when Rafter, protecting the early break, came to the net and turned back three straight point-blank shots by Sampras, who finally

hit wide to surrender the point.

"I wasn't quite sure what was wrong with him," Rafter said. "I thought he may have been sick."

"To me, it was just one of those hard luck stories for Pete. If Pete was fit it might be a different story. I did what I had to do to get through. I very happy

with what I did and to progress."

Philippoussis came into the Open just another name on the draw sheet, equipped with plenty of weapons and just as much unfulfilled potential.

Now he's in the first Grand Slam final of his life and knows he poses a real threat to win the championship.

Noah makes up his mind

PARIS, Sept 13 (Reuters/Internet): Yannick Noah is to step down as France's Davis Cup and Fed Cup tennis captain to spend more time with his children and live in New York, he told sports daily L'Equipe.

"My decision is made," said Noah who will lead the Davis Cup squad for the last time in a world group qualifying round match against Israel later this month.

"I have not had a chance to discuss it with the boys yet. I will do it in Tel Aviv and I don't know what their reaction will be," he said.

But Fed Cup testers Julie Halard and Sandrine Testud asked me to reconsider my decision and I did not accept."

The former French Open winner led France twice to Davis Cup victory, in 1991 and 1996. He took the French women's team to their first Fed Cup win last year.

Edwards said if the \$1 billion BSKyB takeover went ahead he wanted to remain as chairman.


"I certainly hope to stay as chairman. I want to and have been asked to do so. It is my intention to do so," he said.

Lindsay's maiden Slam



NEW YORK, Sept 13: The new Lindsay Davenport, fit and determined, capped a sensational summer by overpowering top-seeded defending champion Martina Hingis in straight sets to win the US Open women's singles championship and claim her first Grand Slam title on Saturday, reports Reuters.

The second-seeded Davenport pushed Hingis all around

the triumph to her mother, Ann, who celebrated her birthday beaming down on her daughter from the stands at the National Tennis Centre.

"I guess she thinks she's getting a really nice gift now," joked Davenport, clutching the winner's check for 700,000 dollars.

Hingis, who repeated as Australian Open champion this year but has now gone four months without a title since winning the Italian Open, col-

"I'm in the weight room three or four times a week," said the 6-foot-2 1/2 (1.89m) Davenport. "I'm always running sprints, too, and playing a lot every-thing is designed to make me faster."

The once-lumbering Davenport was "dazzling" against Hingis as she ran her summer hardcourt record to a spectacular 21-1 including a sweep of the three California hardcourt tournaments.

Davenport uncorked 35 winners to just 22 for the usually sure-shooting Hingis, pinning the Swiss teen several places behind the baseline and sending her scurrying from side to side before opening up an angle to pound home a winner.

One of the reasons I've gotten better as I'm moving better," said Davenport, the first US born woman to win the Open since Chris Evert in 1982. "All the hard work has paid off. I'm getting to more balls."

The American broke the top seed three times in the lopsided first set, and looked in control of the second set after breaking to lead 4-2 but the towering Californian wobbled a bit, wilyly missing an easy backhand volley that would have given her a second game point in the seventh game.

Hingis recovered to break back and then again broke Davenport, who appeared to be fading, in the ninth game to lead 5-4 but Davenport revived and, taking advantage of Hingis' weak second serve, broke the top seed at love, the last point coming on a double fault by Hingis to level the set 5-5.

Davenport held her serve and then posted one last break against Hingis, she could not have scripted a more satisfying last point as she raced to the net to reach an ill conceived Hingis drop shot and whip a winning cross-court backhand.

"It was my first match point and getting to a drop shot and hitting a winner. It was perfect," said Davenport, who was playing in her first Grand Slam final in her eight years of trying.

"In my eyes, to act like a champion and really win a title, it was amazing."

Hingis said her last two hardcourt victories over Monica Seles and Jana Novotna might have affected her. "It did take something out of me," said Hingis.

"But to see the ball flying from Lindsay, so deep and with such good length, there's not a lot you can do with that."

Davenport took special pride in proving she has what it takes to be a champion.

"People didn't give me a shot a few years ago to win a Grand Slam," said Davenport. "It's great to prove them wrong. And I don't think I'm through."
