

Poor Barrett

KUALA LUMPUR, Sept 21 (AP): Long-time leader Craig Barrett of New Zealand collapsed with dehydration less than a kilometre from the end of the 50-kilometre walk-marathon, handing Malaysia its first athletics gold medal at the Commonwealth Games.

In an extraordinary ending to the race on the final day of the 16th Games, Barrett, who had led almost from the start and had a 5-minute lead on his rivals, began staggering along the road.

He stopped and leaned forward, placing both hands on the ground. He got up, tried to walk again but had to stop twice more.

After trying again, Barrett staggered to the side of the road and fell. Team officials and medics got out of their vehicles and went to him but race rules meant they were unable to help him up.

Eventually, and still in the lead, Barrett got to his feet and began walking again. But he was still very unsteady and fell once more.

After his third attempt to finish the race, he fell again and this time New Zealand officials called for an ambulance.

Clavet captures Romanian Open

BUCHAREST, Sept 21: Top-seeded Francisco Clavet of Spain showed superior concentration and experience Monday as he defeated France's unseeded Arnaud Di Pasquale to win the 350,000 dollars Romanian Open tennis tournament, reports AP.

It took Clavet 125 minutes to finish off Di Pasquale 6-4, 2-6, 7-5 and to win 45,000 dollars and 150 ATP points to move up seven places and become the world's 24th ranked player.

In the first set, the pair played long rallies on a slow wet clay court at Progresul Arena. In the end, left-handed Clavet managed a break and took the first set 6-4.

In the second set, Di Pasquale replied with a powerful service and strong backhands and won two games on Clavet's service to win the second set 6-2.

But the Spaniard came back in the final set, leading 4-1, before Di Pasquale broke his game and evened the score 4-4. Then the Frenchman lost his concentration and made some unforced mistakes, finally losing 7-5.

Hingis may take a break

GENEVA, Sept 21 (Reuters/Internet): Having carried Switzerland to the brink of Fed Cup glory, world number one Martina Hingis

hinted after the defeat by Spain in the final that she may lighten her load next season and not play for her country.

Even a sold-out crowd of 12,000 flag-waving, cowbell-clanging fans, with a boisterous display of support not often seen in the normally reserved Alpine nation, may not be enough to convince the 17-year-old Swiss to return for another crack at the title.

Battle-hardened Fed Cup veterans Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario and Conchita Martinez closed out a day of pulsating tennis with a straight sets win in the decisive doubles on Sunday to claim Spain's fifth title of the decade.

But as Hingis pointed out in the post-match press conference Switzerland's appearance in the final was unprecedented, capping an unsuccessed rise to the top of women's tennis by the country.

Toiling in the Fed Cup minor leagues just two years ago, Switzerland is the first country to come from outside the World

Group and go on directly to win through to the final.

Leading the country out that tennis wilderness has been Hingis, who has been near unbeatable in singles play, compiling a record of 18-2. Her loss in Sunday's doubles was also only her second.

"I don't want to talk about next year right now," said Hingis. "We've had a great year this year getting to the final and who knows what's going to happen next year."

"I haven't made any decisions." But Swiss tennis federation officials and Swiss media have already resigned themselves to the fact that Hingis will not be on court next April when the country attempts to retain its place in the World Group against Slovakia.

Hingis has commented several times recently that she is not happy with the current Fed Cup format.

"I prefer going back to the old formula, everything was played out in one week," said Hingis. "It isn't easy to continue with the Fed Cup after a Grand Slam, especially for the top players."

The added pressure and responsibility has also taken a toll on the Swiss star, who has made it clear she wants to concentrate on Grand Slams and protecting her number one world ranking.

Hingis has also had a love-hate relationship with the Swiss public and media.

Despite the outpouring of adoration and support at the weekend, Hingis, a native of the Czech Republic, has felt often appreciated and has often appeared uncomfortable carrying the flag for her adopted home.

At the moment, however, next year's Fed Cup is the last thing on Hingis' mind as she ponders how to stop a comparative slump over the past months.

By most standards, Hingis' four tournament wins, including a second consecutive Australian Open crown, would constitute a productive year.

But compared to last season when she won 12 tournaments and came within one match of sweeping all four Grand Slam titles, Hingis is struggling through a disappointing campaign.

She has not won a tournament since the Italian Open in May and seen her lead atop the world rankings, once measured by the thousands, reduced to a precarious 146 points over US Open champion Lindsay Davenport.

King's fate in the balance

MIAMI, Sept 21 (AP/Internet): Florida's five commissioners who regulate boxing are considering whether to suspend or revoke Don King's license to promote fights in the state. But there's more at stake before the State Athletic Commission than King's ability to promote his fighters.

The commission's decision may also test its credibility, as its executive director, Michael Sciotti, fends off allegations that King was given special treatment in return for a \$100,000 donation to a boxing foundation that Sciotti started. U.S. Sen. John McCain has asked Florida Gov. Lawton Chiles to investigate allegations that the commission is caught up in a conflict of interest in its dealings with King. Both the governor's office and the Attorney General's office are investigating the allegations.

The governor's office has concerns, and we will be taking appropriate action," Chiles spokeswoman Edie Ousley said. "We are not taking this issue lightly."

Sciotti -- a friend of Chiles and a former amateur boxer -- was appointed by the commission as its top administrator in 1996. By 1997, he decided to create a boxing foundation that would be a positive force for young fighters. It would offer scholarships and a way to give something back to the sport, he said.

Sciotti discussed his plan at a commission meeting last September, announcing a major contribution from Don King Productions, based in Deerfield Beach. "He floored me when he said \$100,000," Sciotti said.

Henman retains Uzbek crown

TASHKENT, Sept 21 (Reuters/Internet): Britain's Tim Henman retained his President's Cup crown in the ex-Soviet republic of Uzbekistan on Sunday, defeating top-seeded Russian Yevgeny Kafelnikov 7-5, 6-4 in just over an hour and a half.

His first tour win of the year will not be enough to pull the 24-year-old from Oxford into the world's top 10 when the rankings are next calculated, ATP officials said, but it was an important confidence booster.

"I wouldn't say it was a classic confrontation," Henman said after the game, played in a packed, state-of-the-art indoor stadium.

The world number 11 and British number one had to claw back from a break down in both sets of a scrappy game on a hot and humid Central Asian afternoon.

For Henman, the victory means a cheque for \$66,400 but, more importantly, a further 170 points to this year's tally and a big psychological lift.

Spain's experience gets the better of Swiss youth

GENEVA, Sept 21: Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario and Conchita Martinez proved there's no substitute for experience, overcoming a stacked deck to collect Spain's fifth Fed Cup title Sunday, reports AP.

Despite facing a hostile cowbell-clanging crowd, the world number one, injuries and fatigue, the two battle-hardened Fed Cup veterans were able to add the 1998 title to the ones they claimed in 1991, 1993, 1994 and 1995.

"We had everything against us: The home crowd, the court surface, the World No. 1," said French Open champion Sanchez-Vicario, who along with Martinez has led Spain to seven Fed Cup finals in the last eight years. "It makes the trophy worth that much more."

"We played one of the best teams and worked so hard to win." For the first time since 1991, the Fed Cup title was decided in the doubles, the Spaniards breezing past Swiss teenagers world No. 1 Martina Hingis and Patty Schnyder 6-0, 6-2 in just 56 minutes, sending 12,000 disappointed supporters silently into the night.

It was an unexpectedly speedy finish to a long day that had lasted 10 hours earlier with the first of two gripping reverse singles.

Hingis put Switzerland ahead 2-1 and into position to claim their first ever Fed Cup title when she won a two set slugfest from Sanchez-Vicario 7-6 (7-5), 6-3. But Martinez, playing most of a three-hour-plus marathon hobbled by blisters, bravely battled Schnyder to a 6-3, 2-6, 9-7 win, forcing the tie to a decisive doubles.

While Martinez blossomed under the pressure, Schnyder, winner of five tournament titles this season, showed none of the poise that had helped lift her from 26th to number nine in the world rankings this year.

Failing to convert a key match point against Martinez -- which would have given Switzerland the title Schnyder -- was consumed with guilt, collapsing in tears after helplessly watching a high lob drop in behind her on the winning point.

"I gave all I had," said Schnyder. "I tried everything, Martina won her matches but in the doubles we weren't able to win." Swiss team captain Melanie Molitor, Hingis' mother, believed Schnyder simply succumbed to the jitters.

"I think Patty learned a lot this weekend," said Molitor. "She was far too emotional in her first match and the doubles. There was a lot of pressure on her here."

Hingis, still just 17, displayed the same steely nerve as her Spanish opponents but again the question of the Swiss star's physical conditioning came into question after she required court-side attendance for cramping muscles.

"I was dead tired after my singles against Arantxa," said Hingis, who called an injury break to have her legs massaged near the end of the match. "I was happy to end it quickly because my legs were beginning to cramp and I couldn't jump on my left leg to serve anymore."

"Luckily I'm still young and I can recuperate quickly." Hingis diverted attention from her physical form, citing fatigue as a factor which played against Schnyder in their doubles match.

In smooth acceptance of their defeat, Hingis insisted it was "a great accomplishment for Switzerland just to reach the finals."

Hingis' temperance may have something to do with her uncertain future in Fed Cup competition.

Hingis earlier hinted this might be her last Fed Cup campaign in three weeks of competition difficult to cram into an already lengthy season. Following the Spanish victory, Hingis danced around the issue of next year's nations' contest.

Tyson back inside the ring by November?

LAS VEGAS, Sept 21: Mike Tyson, basically broke despite earning than 100 million dollars in his last six fights, could be back in the ring and earning millions by the end of November, reports AP.

With his bid for a boxing licence reinstatement now only a mere formality away from being accepted, Tyson stands ready to cash in with a series of megafights that figure to culminate in a third fight with Evander Holyfield.

A psychiatrist gives the OK, Tyson could be fighting as early as late November at the same Las Vegas casino where he bit Holyfield's ears and was banished from the sport he once dominated.

"If I ever get reinstated again, I'll probably make 300 million, dollars," Tyson said Saturday.

If he does, he has a team of new advisers who say it will be their job to make sure he keeps most of the money.

Though Tyson made more than 100 million dollars in official purses in six fights ending in the abortive title fight with Holyfield, he is now basically broke and owes the Internal

Revenue Service 13 million dollars in back taxes.

Tyson's free-spending ways did much to contribute to his financial problems. But a contract that gave promoter Don King and Tyson's two co-managers half of everything he made didn't help matters.

Tyson's attorney, Dale Kinsella, introduced figures at Saturday's Nevada Athletic Commission meeting showing Tyson ended up with only 5.2 million dollars out of the 30 million dollars purse he received to fight Holyfield in their second bout.

Kinsella promised that when Tyson resumes fighting, the commission will be given copies of all the contracts he has signed.

"Mike Tyson will be fighting for Mike Tyson again, not all the people around him," Kinsella said.

Tyson's new advisers have already negotiated an extension of his old deal with the Showtime network, which televises his fights via pay-per-view.

Tyson will fight at the hotel when his career resumes.

That will happen on a Saturday night in late November or early December, assuming a psychiatrist finds that Tyson is able to fight again without snapping and the commission grants him a new license when it meets Oct 3.

Tyson's comeback would likely go along the lines of the one following his release from prison in 1995 when his first two fights were against two opponents deemed easy, Peter McNeeley and Buster Mathis, Jr.

Though Tyson is getting old for a boxer at the age of 32, and is coming off two straight losses to Holyfield, he remains the premier attraction in the sport.

"Win or lose, people want to see Mike Tyson," Showtime executive Jay Larkins said. "There's an almost insatiable appetite to see him in the ring."

Tyson still must be licensed, of course, and also must either reach a deal with King on his promotional rights or get a court to rule in his favor. Tyson has sued King and his former managers to break their contracts and recover money he claims was rightfully his.
