Forest using Van Hooijdonk as collateral!

NOTTINGHAM, England, Sept 29 (Reuters/Internet): Nottingham Forest have asked the English premier league for a four million pounds (\$6.83 million) loan, using Pierre Van Hooijdonk as collateral.

The Dutch international has been on strike since the start of the season, refusing to rejoin Forest after they rejected his request for a transfer.

Forest want the cash to sign a replacement and plan to repay the money when they eventually sell Van Hooijdonk.

They believe they already have the backing of the premier league chairmen and the League

Managers' Association. "It's not pie in the sky and could happen," said Forest manager Dave Bassett.

The Bangladesh cricket team leaves Dhaka today to take part in the Asian Cricket Council (ACC) Trophy. to begin in the Nepalese capital of Kathmandu

Pencilled in group B for the first round robin league along with five other nations in the 12-nation meet, Bangladesh, the reigning champions, will take on Papua New Guinea (PNG) in their first match on

the opening day. Considering the standard of the tournament, the new-look national team will be riding on the mounting expectations of millions of sports lovers of country for whom nothing other than a title triumph will

be acceptable. "My target is to defend the title", said the newly-appointed Bangladesh captain, Aminul Is-

lam, who stepped into the shoes of Akram Khan after the Kuala Lumpur debacle. Bangladesh cricket hit its lowest ebb in recent years in the just-concluded Kuala Lumpur Commonwealth Games, where they conceded three defeats including a humiliating 114-run thrashing by Northern Ireland.

"MCC emerges from this vote stronger, more united, and better equipped to play a major public role. But the decision was con-

demned by many of the MCC's 17,250 members, some of whom voiced their anger in a packed and acrimonious special general meeting at Lord's cricket ground in north-west London.

Prominent "anti" Edward Grayson said he would lobby for the creation of a separate ladies' club, associated to the MCC. Another member, who refused to give his name, said:

"I'm very upset about it. We've all been steamrollered and blackmailed into this.' One speaker accused the

committee of "looking like propagandists in a communist state" while another warned: "We dislike being manipulated".

The MCC was harshly criticised by Prime Minister Tony Blair after February's vote. when a 56 per cent vote to admit women failed to overcome the

too far." "You cannot assault a referee...He stands between the game and chaos," he said. "The FA have got to chuck the book at Di Canio...This isn't a tap on the wrist job."


