THAT on the first day of the Battle of the Somme, 1 July 1916, some British officers were so confident of easily breaching the German lines that they gave their men footballs to kick as they advanced across no-man's land towards the German trenches.

Despite obvious preparations for the assault, including a weeklong artillery bombardment, the British suffered the heaviest casualties in their history: 19,000 men were killed on the first day. In spite of this, the attack continued and several small gains were made — the German line was almost breached 14 July. After a lull, the battle started again 15 Sept when tanks were used for the first time; some 47 tanks were available to the Allies of which most broke down. This attack made some progress but when the battle finally died away mid-Nov the total Allied gain was about 8 miles at a cost of 615,000 Allied and about 500,000 German casualties.
