The dead was identified as Kulsum, daughter of Abdul Sattar, a resident of a nearby house of the collapsed two-storey building, fire service sources

Of the two children killed earlier on Monday one was Sumon, the 12-year-old son of Noor Mohammad, the owner of the building, who being a mason constructed the building. The other was Jannat Ara Begum. a two-year old daughter of a tenant living in that building.

The court fixed November 4 for their next appearance and also ordered the authorities of the Dhaka Central Jail to ensure their proper treatment. It also advised the jailor to take necessary measures for giving them division as per the Jail Code. They were later granted first class division.

The three leaders were arrested on September 29 in connection with the Jail Killing

Barrister Rafigul Islam Mian appeared for Obaid and Manjur while advocate Syedul Islam Syed appeared for Moazzem.

The lawyers prayed before the court for granting First Class Division to the three leaders in the jail and for measures for their proper treatment. No bail petition was moved on behalf of any of the three accused. Defending their clients, the

lawyers said that the accused were not listed in the FIR and were arrested in connection with an incident which occurred 23 years ago. Investigation of the case began in 1996 but no charge was brought against them during the last two years, they said. "I do not believe in the poli-

tics of killing. I was an active participant in the Independence War and all the subsequent mass movements. I have been implicated in the case for political harassment," Obaid said in See Page 12 Col 1

Army's last warning to Sharif govt?

ISLAMABAD, Oct 6: A call by The government-dogged by the powerful army chief to establish a National Security Council was seen today by polit ical opposition parties as a final warning to Pakistan's embattled government, reports AP.

"It seems to be a last warning to the Prime Minister," Naveed Qamar, a leading member of the main opposition Pakistan Peoples' Party, told The Associated Press. "The army chief alone is the person who has the power to upset the apple cart."
Army Chief Gen. Jehangir

Keramat, in a strongly worded statement yesterday warned that Pakistan could not afford "the destabilizing effects of polarization, vendettas and insecurity-driven expedient poli-

This was the first time Karamat, who became army chief nearly three years ago. has suggested direct army involvement in policy decisions through a National Security Council.

CHAPAINAWABGANJ, Oct 6: Funds for micro-credit schemes are ready with the non-government organisations but disbursement is yet to start in flood-hit Chapainawabganj and neighbouring districts. Sources at the regional of-

fices of Grameen Bank, Bangladesh Rural Advancement Committee (BRAC) and ASA, when contacted said, funds are ready but the main borrowers who are supposed to seek loans are yet to return to their homes.

BRAC's Regional Manager Shahera Banu told The Daily

Star yesterday that they have decided to allow individual members of a samity to withdraw up to 50 per cent of their savings money in view of the devastating floods this year.

The search for survivors yesterday in Monday's building collapse in the city's Lalbagh area

"We are prepared to provide funds to the victims but the borrowers are not yet ready to take loan," she said. "We have also approved a house-building fund of about Tk

ever, direct any judge of a sub-

ordinate court to try a pending case on a point of general public importance," a top official of the ministry noted. already CID chargesheeted 14 persons including Assistant Commis-

sioner of DB Police Akram Hussain and ward-level Awami League leader Mukuli Begum for the murder of Shamim Reza Rubel, in DB custody on July 23. The 12 others chargesheeted accused are policemen. The case would proceed as per normal law, law ministry
