Sir Roland Smith, chairman of the United PLC board said BSkyB would not interfere in team affairs and transfer policy if the deal goes through.

"(Manager) Alex Ferguson will be in charge of team selection. Alex and the board of Manchester United will be responsible for the acquisition of the players," Smith wrote in a document sent to shareholders outlining the bid.

Smith added that ticket prices for matches at United's Old Trafford home would not be affected by the bid. He stressed that the current

United management team of chief executive Martin Edwards, his deputy Peter Kenyon and finance director David Gill would continue to oversee the day-to-day running of the club. The announcement last

month that the United board was recommanding acceptance of a bid worth more than 620 million pounds (1.05 billion dollars) from satellite broadcaster BSkyB, 40 per cent owned by Murdoch's News Corp, initially sparked protest from fans groups in the northern English city.




