Tribhuvan University ground tomorrow. Weather permitting. the 50-over-a-side affair will kick off at 9 am. Star TV will cover the contest of the two apparently unequal opponents Live from the spectacular venue.

Defending champions Bangladesh, who made it to the final in style, eliminating reigning runners-up UAE by six wickets in the first semifinal, looked confident to cross the final hurdle in a repeat clash with Malaysia.

The Malaysians, who conceded a huge 141-run defeat to Bangladesh in their group league match, pulled off a stunning 41-run victory against fancied Hong Kong in the second semifinal. The win enabled the Southeast Asian cricketers to earn a dream passage to a final of any international meet.

His deputy Khaled Mahmud said that the substandard tournament has hardly helped our cause apart from lifting our tarnished image.



# Rakib becomes IM



Bangladesh men won the round against their European counterparts by 2.5-1.5 points. With the draw, national runner-up Rakib earned a direct 13round norm in the 110-nation meet to confirm the second highest prestigious title in



chess. The previous three International Masters of the country are: Zillur Rahman Champak, Ziaur Rahman and Reefat-bin-Sattar.

On his way to the IM title, Rakib, the Narayanganj-based youth who first earned a nineround norm last week in this meet, defeated Robert Smith of New Zealand in the third round J Atia of Iraq in the 6th round. IM To Hong Thong of Vietnam in the 7th round, IM Hendger Odiv of Turkmenistan in the ninth round and Hugo Monuz of Ecuador in the 11th round. He also drew with English Grand Master Methuen Sedler in the first round, GM Geren Piket of Holland in the second round and Leonid Sedler of Australia

in the eighth round. In the other boards of the 12th round, IM Reefat-bin-Sattar and Enamul Hossain Rajib won while IM Ziaur Rahman lost his board.

The men's team now have 25 points to their credit out of a possible 36 points.

In the women's group, Bangladesh also won their 12th round clash against South Africa by 2.5-.5 points. The ladies have 18 points on completion of the round.




