

Hooliganism in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct 12: The Brazilian passion known as soccer to the rest of the world might be even more popular if it weren't for the violence that surrounds the club matches, reports AP.

In a poll by Ibope, commissioned by and published Sunday in the sports daily Lancel, 61 per cent of 3,000 soccer fans surveyed said they stayed away from matches because of hooliganism.

The problem (of hooliganism) is much the same as in England. There is a very active minority of fans involved," said Col Silvio Roberto Villar, who heads policing of Sao Paulo soccer stadiums, in an interview with radio station CBN on Sunday.

"Ideally, supporters should not go to wear their teams' colors when leaving stadiums in case they are attacked. It's an absurd situation but that is the state of things".

Since the early 1990s, fan clubs of club teams — known throughout south America as "Barras Bravas" — have clashed sporadically in Brazil, causing the deaths of two teenagers in the last three years.

Last season, a youth was killed in a street fight following a game between Rio teams Flamengo and Vasco da Gama.

In Sao Paulo, a 16-year-old died during a 1995 stadium riot involving fans of Sao Paulo FC and Palmeiras, prompting a judge to ban fan club members from city stadiums.

Since then, security cameras have been installed in Rio's famed Maracana Stadium to clamp down on violence and meeting rooms for fan clubs have been shut.

The Ibope survey found the other major reason keeping fans away from games is high ticket prices, cited by 16 per cent as a problem. Fourteen per cent said "poorly organised" leagues were the chief reason they missed matches.

Attendances at Brazilian soccer matches have fallen over the last two years although no exact figures were available.

USOC decides to boost athletes

WASHINGTON, Oct 12: The US Olympic Committee has decided to put up 18 million dollars to boost American athletes to win more medals at the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City, reports Xinhua.

The money was budgeted Saturday as the board met in Phoenix and approved its budget through 2002.

The funds will be directed to the USOC's Podium 2002 programme, designed to foster athlete development, said USOC executive director Dick Schultz.

"We're really excited about this," Schultz said. "This is a new way of doing things for the US Olympic Committee."

The United States won 13 medals at the 1994 Winter Games at Lillehammer, and equalled that total at Nagano, Japan, last winter.

Schultz said: "Our programme is going in the wrong direction to keep and increase public support, the United States must win more medals," he added.

Shanghai Open Chang's

SHANGHAI, Oct 12: Michael Chang, enjoying a revival after a run of injuries, claimed his second title in six weeks when he beat top seed Goran Ivanisevic 4-6, 6-1, 6-2 in the Shanghai Open final today, reports Reuters.

The 26-year-old American was ruled out for nearly two months by knee and wrist injuries earlier this year and his world ranking has dropped from third at the start of 1998 to 33rd.

But he rediscovered his winning touch after more than a year without a tournament victory when he took the MFS pro-championship title in Brooklyn, Massachusetts, at the end of August.

Today's victory over Ivanisevic brought second ATP seed Chang his 33rd ATP Tour title and a record 12th Asian crown.

Chang, widely popular in China, benefited from the roaring support of the crowd as well as a slew of unforced errors from an opponent ranked 12th in the world to carry off the 48,200 dollars winners prize.

"It was like a home-court advantage. I was also able to use my forehand shots to keep Goran off balance," Chang said.

"It's a very special feeling to win in Asia. The support I get from people, I feel a great sense of warmth and love from people here."

"They can relate to me, to be able to see a Chinese person doing so well in a sport dominated by so many races makes them and me feel good."

The final was postponed from Sunday because of heavy rain but the skies cleared just enough to allow play to resume today.

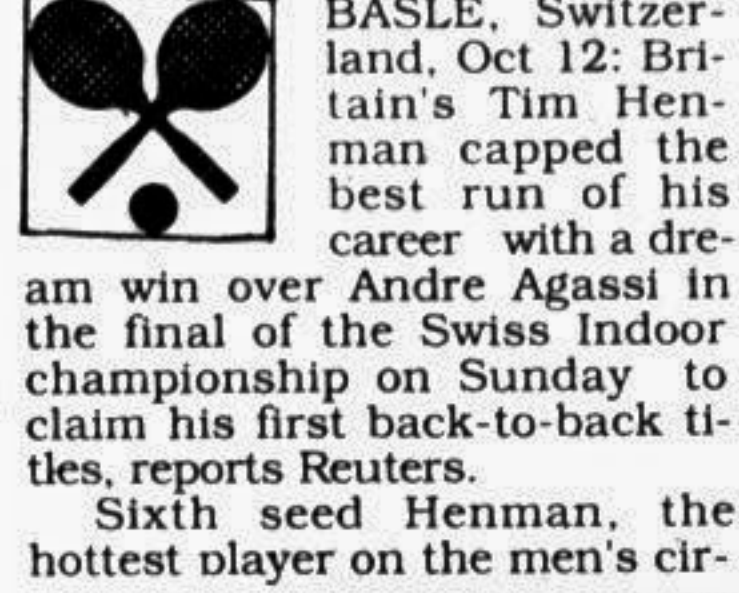
After dropping the first set, Chang charged back to win 12 of the last 15 games.

"I felt great today," he said. But he added that he still needed to work on regaining full health.

Ivanisevic, who struggled with his serve and backhand, was clearly disappointed.

Both players will compete in this week's Singapore Open.

Tim, last man standing

BASLE, Switzerland, Oct 12: Britain's Tim Henman capped the best run of his career with a dream win over Andre Agassi in the final of the Swiss Indoors championship on Sunday to claim his first back-to-back titles, reports Reuters.

Sixth seed Henman, the hottest player on the men's circuit, dreamed of and I had to be realistic that it would drop off a bit in the third.

"In a final against Agassi you know you're going to have to play some great tennis to beat him and to have come away and won this tournament, as strong as it was, is the best week in my tennis career so far."

"Today I played the best match of my career but I can still improve in a few areas."

momentum into the second set, breaking Agassi again to go ahead 2-0.

Agassi, playing in his ninth final of the season, looked to have steadied himself when he immediately broke back.

But Henman responded with a break of his own to retain control of the set.

Agassi, who edged one of the most remarkable comebacks of his career the previous weekend when he recovered from 5-2 down in the fourth against Karol Kucera in the semifinals of the Grand Slam Cup, looked poised to make another return from the abyss when he claimed the only break of the third set to jump back into the contest.

But in the end Henman prevailed in a wild fourth set in which each player broke the other twice before the Briton nailed down the win with a further break.

"I was struggling and frustrated in the first two sets but at least I got back into the match," said Agassi, currently eighth in the rankings after sinking below 140th last year.

"I could have shot myself if I had a gun, I was so mad at myself the way I was playing."

"I was up a break in the fourth and couldn't put it away. If I had, we would have had a fifth set and a match."

"I need to play well at the right time against the biggest players. I need to step up and do it in the big situations. That's what this fall is all about for me."

Asian Games

No change in main venues

TOKYO, Oct 12: Organisers of the Bangkok Asian Games in December assured Japan today there would be no change in the main Games venues despite some worries about delays in construction amid the economic crisis, reports AFP.

Charouk Arirachakaran, secretary general of the Bangkok Asian Games Organising Committee, said here all facilities at the Bangkok B-Land Sports Complex would be completed on time.

It was reported last month construction of the B-Land Complex had been delayed and some of the seven sports to be staged there might be relocated to the northern city of Chiang Mai.

"There will be no move of venues. Those sports events will all be held at B-Land as initially scheduled," Charouk, who was here to promote the regional competition, told a news conference.

"I promise the (B-Land) centre will definitely be ready in time. All venues are due to be completed by October 15," he added.

Charouk said the committee made a decision a few days ago to keep all the seven sports — including gymnastics, tennis and volleyball — at B-Land, also known as the Muang Thong Thani Sports Complex, as scheduled.

The four other sports are boxing, weightlifting, snooker and rugby.

Lindsay learns a lesson

FILDERSTADT, Germany, Oct 12 (Reuters): Lindsay Davenport was given an immediate reminder of how hard it may be to hold on to the world number one ranking when she suffered a surprise defeat in the final of the Porsche Grand Prix.

Davenport, who made sure two days ago of ending Martina Hingis' 18-month reign at the top, was beaten 7-5, 6-3 by the unseeded Sandrine Testud, who in six attempts had never previously won a match at this tournament.

It earned the French player only the second title of her career and the biggest — and a Porsche sports car worth about 85,000 dollars.

She also became only the third unseeded player in the 21-year-history of the tournament to have won it.

"It is such a big change from before here," said Testud. "I think I will only believe it when I drive the Porsche."

However Testud had to come from behind in the first set to do it, twice going breaks down before she established a pattern, eventually serving better than the world number one.

Davenport started well, broke for 3-1, and, after dropping serve, broke again to serve for the first set at 5-4. The second-seeded US Open champion even moved to within two points of winning the set, which might well have changed the mood of the match in her favour.

But at 30-15 Testud produced a cheekily angled backhand cross court which took Davenport very wide and combined it with a sensational backhand down the line which appeared to travel round the net.

That helped Testud to break back immediately and she then broke again to snatch the set, though with the help of a little luck.

She reached set point with a backhand return of serve which skidded under Davenport's racket.

The American may have placed herself under too much pressure to win the tournament, saying she had wanted to emulate Marcelo Rios' capture of the number one spot from Pete Sampras in March, when the Chilean went on to win the Lipton Championships in Key Biscayne.

Davenport certainly struggled more as the second set progressed, dropping serve to go 1-4 down, and missing a chance for a break back point with a backhand return wide from a Testud second serve.

The world number one nevertheless fought hard to avoid going 1-5 down, saving a break point and even gaining a point to break back before Testud, who revealed in the fast conditions, made her final surge.

She was often able to out-drive Davenport and, although she served one double fault in the final game, made no mistake in serving out for the match and the biggest success of her career.

"She played fantastically well, and it shows you can never take anything for granted," said Davenport.

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Accused cop turns club president

BUCHAREST, Oct 12 (Reuters/Internet): Vasile Ianul, who is standing trial on charges of fraud during his tenure at Dinamo Bucharest, has been appointed president of Romanian second division club Politehnica Iasi.

A statement said the club's board in the northeastern city of Iasi had elected Ianul at the weekend.

Politehnica are second in the standings of one of two flights of Romania's second division.

A former police colonel who headed Dinamo Bucharest, the Interior Ministry club, from 1990 and 1993, Ianul went on trial earlier this year on charges of misappropriating \$2.6 million.

Ianul has always denied the accusations. If convicted, he would face a sentence of up to five years in prison.

Early upsets which claimed the world's two highest-ranked players — Pete Sampras and Patrick Rafter's Australian Open champion Petr Korda, helped clear a path to the final for both Henman and Agassi, who never faced a player inside the top 20 until they stood opposite one another.

With both players going on the attack right from the opening serve, it was Agassi who produced the first break-opportunity of the match at 4-3 in the first set.

But the fourth seed was unable to convert, Henman fighting off three break points with the help of his booming serve.

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Ondoro overhauls Khalid

CHICAGO, Oct 12: Ondoro Osoro won the Chicago marathon on Sunday with the fastest debut marathon in history with a 2:06:54 time in the 26.2-mile (42.1-km) race, reports Reuters.

The unheralded 30-year-old Kenyan surged past defending champion Khalid Khannouchi of Morocco in the final mile of the race.

Khannouchi's 2:07:10 clocking set in Chicago in 1997 had been the fastest first-time marathon. He hung onto finish second in 2:07:11 despite a cramped calf muscle and sore ankle in his left leg.

South African Gert Thys duplicated his Boston marathon finish by coming in third in a personal-best 2:0:43. Another relatively unknown Kenyan, Joseph Kibugui, was fourth in 2:07:57, which lopped more than 3 minutes off his best time.

The marathon was first in history to have four man run faster than 2:08.

Joyce Chepchumba, 27, of Kenya was the women's champion in 2:23:57, the third fastest time in the world this year. Chepchumba passed pace-setting Colleen Derruck of South Africa in the 22nd mile.

Although she struggled in the final miles, she won by a significant margin over Derruck (2:27:04) and South

African Elana Mayer (2:27:20), both of whom tired badly.

Before his breakthrough in Chicago, Osoro had been known as track and cross-country athlete and the longest road race he had run was 11.6 miles (18.7 kms). He was ranked as the sixth-best road racer of 1997 by one prominent American running publication. While his performance was surprising to many, it wasn't a shock to Osoro.

"This was not my first time running," he said. "I have been running well in cross-country in Europe and have been doing well in American road races. I have set a world record form 10 miles in Florida (45:36 in 1997)."
