Ramaala wins Paris race

VERSAILLES, France, Oct 19: South African Hendrick Ramaala won the Paris 20km road race on Sunday, edging out Laoussine Mrrik of Morocco in 57min 46sec by one second in a sprint for the line, reports AFP.

The win was Ramaala's second in the French capital this month after he also took the Paris-Versailles on October 4. Morocco's Kamel Saaidou, second last year, bagged third place.

Ramaala allowed Kenyan opponents David Kiptum and John Kiyal to dictate the pace over the first few kilometres in warm autumn sunshine.

But around the 11km mark he made a move to join the leading group and with three kilometres to go it was any one of five — Ramaala, Kiptum, Saaidou, Mrrik and Algerian Kamel Kahl.

Five kilometres out from the line Ramaala accelerated and only Mrrik was able to join him in their sprint for the finish. Indeed the Moroccan got his nose in front briefly but faded over the final few metres.

Kenyan mopes had been dashed before the start with the late withdrawal of John Gwako.

Pete pockets CA Trophy

VIENNA, Oct 19: Pete Sampras took full advantage of a wild card handed over by Boris Becker to beat Slovakia's Karol Kucera 6-3, 7-6 (7-3), 6-1 in the final of the CA Trophy on Sunday, reports Reuters.

Sampras, whose goal is to end 1998 as the world's number one for a record sixth consecutive year, ensured he will remain at the top of the rankings for at least the next two weeks by reaching the final at Vienna's Stadthalle.

The 27-year-old American was given the wild card after crashing out to South African Wayne Ferreira in the first round at Basle last week. "I thought about Boris after the match. I consider myself very fortunate that he gave me the wild card. I wouldn't be here otherwise," said Sampras.

The Slovak, who began the year ranked 25th and entered the top 10 in April, had no replay to Sampras' big serves in the third set. The American hammered out more aces than any other player in the 800,000 dollars tournament.

Sampras now goes into his 242nd week at number one and is third in the all-time list behind Ivan Lendl, who accumulated 270, and compatriot Jimmy Connors on 268.

Connors was number one for five consecutive years in the 1970s and Sampras said at the beginning of this year his goal was to beat that record.

But he will have to fight hard in coming weeks to keep Pat Rafter and Marcelo Rios at bay. Rios has been number one all ready this year and Rafter, who lost in the quarterfinals here, is also close behind Sampras.

To secure the record, Sampras will play five tournaments in a row — something he has not done since 1993. "If I'm confident then I think I'm very hard to beat," he said.

All three of the world's top players will compete in Lyon next week. Rios won a tournament in Singapore on Sunday, beating Mark Woodford of Australia 6-4, 6-2, in the final.

Sampras, who now has 22 indoor titles and 56 in all, needed only a single break in the third game against fifth seed Kucera to take the first set in 31 minutes with a thundering forehand.

He broke again in the first game of the second set before his form wavered and he dropped serve for 4-4, but the Slovak handed Sampras the set in a tiebreak with a double fault and too many errors at the net.

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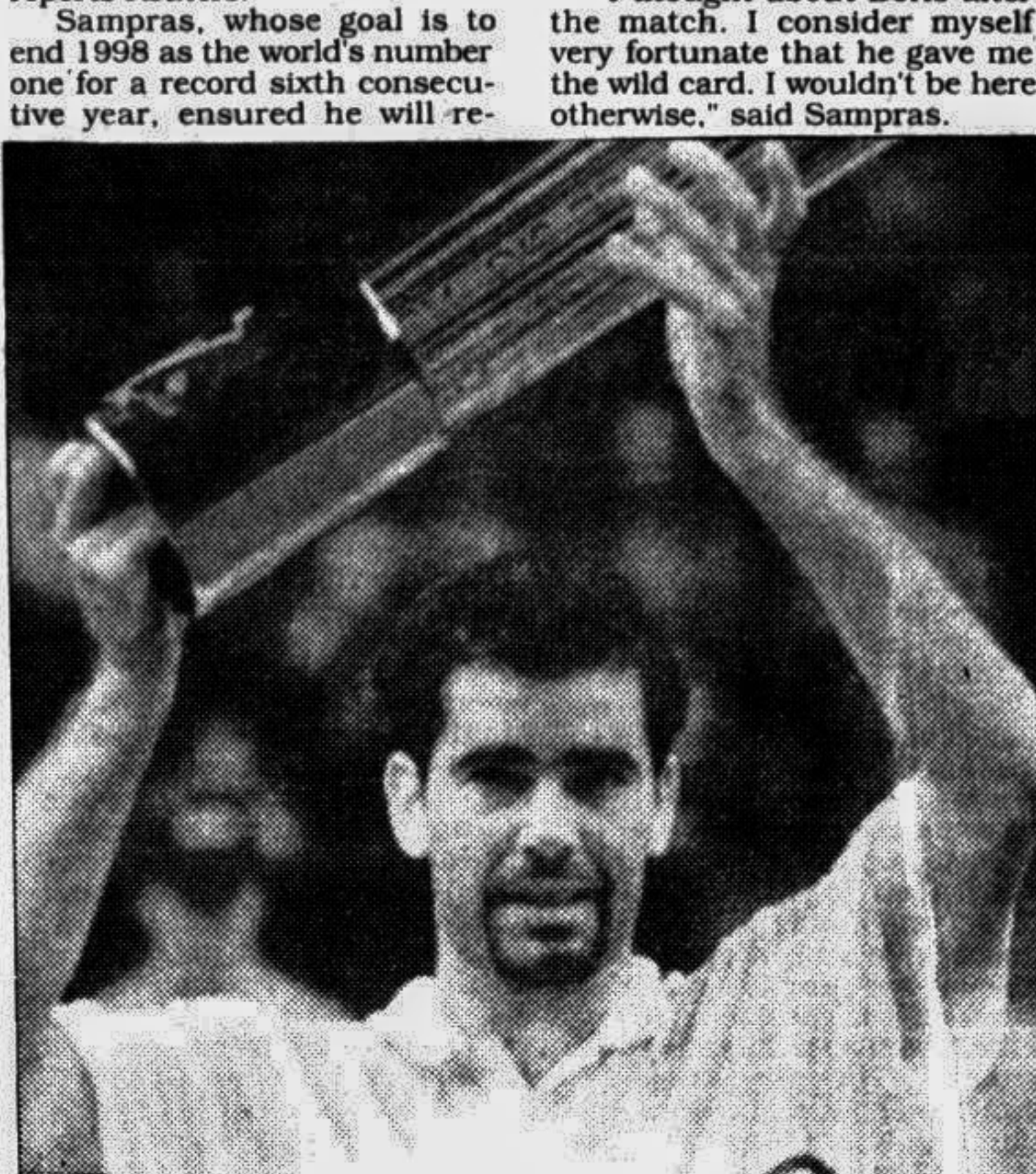

Top seeds stay away from Kremlin Cup

MOSCOW, Oct 19 (Reuters/Internet): The women's Kremlin Cup starting on Tuesday has lost some of its sparkle with the absence of world number one Lindsay Davenport and defending champion Jana Novotna.

World number five Venus Williams of the United States is top seed in the \$1 million tournament after Davenport pulled out with an arm injury.

The tournament also lost France's Nathalie Tauziat and Dominique Van Roost of Belgium, both ranked in the top 10, who have cited injury and fatigue as reasons for missing the event.

Top players who are making the journey to Moscow are American Monica Seles.

Spain's Conchita Martinez and Patty Schnyder of Switzerland will receive first-round byes.

Organisers were upset at the withdrawal of Davenport, who beat Williams to win the European Open on Sunday.

"It's not nice," said American Gene Scott, director of the men's Kremlin Cup. "She pulled out on Friday, saying she is injured, and then played two more matches (in Zurich). In the men's competition she would face a stiff fine for her action."

This year's Kremlin Cup has been hit by cutbacks with Russia in the throes of a severe financial crisis.

In order to save the eight-year-old tournament, organisers have cut back on handouts and souvenirs and abandoned lavish opening and closing ceremonies.

"We simply don't have the money to pay for all these extras," general director Yakov Shakhitov said.

The main thing for us right now is that the Kremlin Cup will go on.

Two English shuttlers banned

LONDON, Oct 19: Two English badminton stars today were banned after staging an impromptu cricket match with brooms in a toilet at a hotel in Holland following a drinking session, reports AFP.

Peter Knowles and Colin Haughton have been hit with suspensions by the England Badminton Association for their actions at the Dutch Open 10 days ago.

They were playing with brooms from the janitor's closet attempting to have a game of cricket in the gentlemen's toilet and left the place a mess," said Badminton Association of England press officer Maryanne Henchy.

"They had been drinking, although I don't think they were drunk. But they shouldn't do this type of thing while representing England abroad."

Knowles, 28, has been removed from the elite squad and will not be allowed to represent England until after 1998.

Davenport: From the top

ZURICH, Oct 19 (Reuters/Internet): Lindsay Davenport has no plans to become world number one, but now she has no intention of abandoning the position.

The US Open champion finished her first week on top of the world rankings by winning her sixth tournament of the season, successfully defending her European indoor title on Sunday against fellow-American Venus Williams.

"Making it to number one was never an obsession of mine," said Davenport. "I never thought I could get to number one."

"But my goal now is to stay number one."

While the 22-year-old's aim is to retain the top spot as long as she can, her immediate goal is to finish the year with the number one ranking.

With just a handful of tournaments remaining, Davenport's only challenger for year-end honours is Swiss teenager Martina Hingis. The 1996 Olympic champion took over from Hingis as number one last Monday, becoming only the eighth player since the world rankings began in 1975 to reach the summit.

Davenport's victory on Sunday, the 19th of her career, provided the American with a cushion in the rankings, allowing her the luxury of pulling out of this week's WTA event and a chance to rest for what she sees as a double tournament showdown with the Swiss youngster.

"I've got two more tournaments until the end of the year and I hope to play well in both of them and end the year number one," said Davenport. "It all depends on how the next few weeks in Philadelphia and New York go."

"I think it's all going to come down to the Chase championships in New York. It's not a battle, but it's going to be fun competing against Martina to decide who is number one."

While Hingis is at her home near Zurich resting a sprained ankle, Davenport will be doing the same for a bothersome sore arm at her home in New Port Beach, California.

After her U.S. Open victory Davenport returns home to celebrations. "This time she's hoping for a little quieter reception."

"I'm just going to relax and not play tennis for a week and try to get ready for the last few tournaments," said Davenport. "After the U.S. Open there was a lot more attention so I don't know what to expect when I get back."

"I'm just going to try and do whatever I want for a week so I can just relax after these crazy couple of months."

"Hopefully I'll just fit back into town and no one will bother me too much or make too big of a stink."

While comfortable with the media and attention, Davenport enjoys her time away from the spotlight.

So much so that she has been criticised for her easy going approach to the sport.

"Because I didn't think I could get to number one, people said I had a lack of confidence," said Davenport. "But I played tennis because I enjoy it. The way things have worked out is mind-blowing."

"I've been two for a long time and being one is a big deal but it's not like I went from 10 to one in one week."

"I don't think the players have any more respect for me now that I'm number one, hopefully they respect me for my results over the last couple of years."

Bangkok ready for pre-Games tests

BANGKOK, Oct 19: Thai sports authorities today voiced confidence the country would be ready for the Asian Games in December despite some glitches encountered in testing facilities last week, reports AFP.

Deputy Prime Minister Bhichai Rattakul, who chairs the Bangkok Asian Games Organising Committee, said he was satisfied with pre-Games tests which finished Saturday.

"It was not bad. We tested all the sports complexes, everything is going fine," he told reporters.

"But it was not perfect, some things have to be improved, such as facilities for live telecast, information technology, lighting and the sound systems," he said.

He said he was confident any problems with facilities would be ironed out before the Games which are to be held from December 6 to 20.
