PERTH, Oct 25: England paceman Dominic Cork, one of his side's major hopes for Ashes glory this summer, has been hauled over the coals for bowl-

ing too fast, reports AFP. The big 26-year-old was or-dered by England bowling coach Bob Cottam to slow down during a concentrated practice session in the WACA ground nets

here today. "That's a danger with Corkie at the moment," an exasperated Cottam explained at the end of the workout.

"He is trying to impress ev-eryone with pace. But he is primarily a swing bowler ... he has had all his success as a swing bowler.

"It's a thing we all go through. We've all done it. We just try to impress early on a tour because you know there is going to be competition for places," former Test player Cottam said.

"It's the adrenalin running hot, but he'll settle down." Cork is desperate to push his claims for a place in the side for the first Test of the series starting in Brisbane November 20 as the tourists attempt to regain the Ashes after five losing

He has played in 25 Tests capturing 94 wickets at an average of 31.41, but has yet to take on Australia at the highest level

### DFB accept random tests

DUISBURG, Germany, Oct 25: German football clubs are to accept random doping tests conducted at training sessions, the German National Olympic Committee (NOK) said Wednesday, reports AFP.

BUENOS AIRES, Oct 25: Argentina's government announced on Tuesday a new initiative to curb increasing fan violence at its First-Division football matches, reports AP. Each of the top division soc-

cer clubs must install a camera system by the end of the year, said Miguel Angel Toma, Argentina's Security Secretary. "The club that does not in-

stall them before the end of the year will not be able to compete in the next championship," said The monitoring system, de-

veloped by an Italian firm, will record fan activity and its images will be stored in a digitalized database.

In May, a judge suspended play in Argentina's top professional league after a gruesome weekend of fan violence that included two shootings.


#### Webber fined

Taylor added another four to his overnight 64 before he was bowled by Arshad. The 33-yearold Australian captain eclipsed his predecessor Allan Border's 395-run mark in a series in Pakistan. He scored 513, 426 in the second Test at Peshawar, with an impressive average of

Taylor and Langer put on 109 runs for the second wicket in 191 minutes.

Langer was run out when he failed to beat Ijaz Ahmed's strong throw from square leg. His 51-run innings included three fours and a six and came off 222 minutes.

Steve Waugh departed soon after lunch, giving left-arm spinner Shakil Ahmed his first Test wicket as Australia went for tea at 283 for four with Lehmann struggling at 26 and Mark Waugh on a patient 77.

Pakistan paceman Wasim Akram and Soaib Akhtar, removed Lehmann and Ian Healy (3) respectively in the space of three overs. Izaj took a superb diving catch to his right at point to dismiss Lehmann while Afridi took a well judged catch off Healy's mistimed pull at mid-wicket.

Shakil ended with four for 91 while two wickets were claimed by Moin.


