



I like making predictions Did I say that the India-Aus-I tralia match would be a humdinger, or what? Make no mistake, this is one huge rivalry emerging in world cricket. # SACHIN'S TON TABLE


Indian batsman Sachin Romesh Tendulker smashed his 19th one-day international century last night when he hammered a match winning knock of 141 against Australia in the third quarterfinal of the Wills International Cup at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.

The right-hand opener set a new world record last month when he scored his 18th hundred against Zimbabwe, surpassing the 17 held by former West Indian opener Desmond Haynes.

Tendulker's ton was also his third in a row against Australia. He scored 142 in a first round of a triangular tournament in Sharjah on April 22 and then hammered 134 in the final two days later. Sachin has played a total of 194 innings in his 201 appearances in the instant version of cricket and scored a total of 7446 runs which now includes 19 centuries and 43 fifties.

The winners of the quarterfinals will get 20,000 dollars as prize money.


