

Janssen wants to make history

LAHORE, Pakistan, Nov 7: Dutch hockey captain Ronald Janssen is dreaming of field hockey's first ever Grand Slam in the final of the 20th Champions' Trophy men's hockey tournament tomorrow, reports AFP.

Holland, reigning Olympic and world champions, face Pakistan in the final and hope to earn a third coveted title.

"Yeah, I think it will be a dream come true and when you lead the side that achieves this honour it is a double joy," Janssen, who is also Holland's goalkeeper, told.

The 34-year-old Janssen said Pakistan "is a young side and can give a tough time" to his team.

"Their average age is 23 or 24 which is a plus point for them in the future. We gave them full space in the first match but it will be different in the final," Dutch captain said.

Janssen, who sells neckties for a Dutch company, thinks a strategy should be worked out to make field hockey professional.

"We give very little time to hockey in Holland because everyday works or studies so it is hard to make the game professional completely but it is upto the FIH to sort out this matter," he said.

A veteran of two Olympics (1988 and 1996) Janssen has horrible memories of the World Cup 1994 when Pakistan beat Holland on penalty strokes to lift the Cup.

"It is one of my horrible memories because I was in the goal and we missed the last penalty stroke, but it happens to every team," Janssen said.

Janssen was a member of the team that won the Atlanta Olympics in 1996 and the World Cup in his home town Utrecht last June.

"I am happy that I was a part of the teams on both gold medal showings and they are the most cherishing memories of my career," he said.

Janssen subscribes to the view Pakistan and India should work hard and come up in international hockey.

"With this performance in the current trophy Pakistan have come up but the Indians are not doing well. They must sort out their problems because Pakistan and India are two great hockey nations," Janssen said.

Sydney 2000 Swimming format changed

SYDNEY, Nov 7: The swimming programme for the Sydney 2000 Olympics has been extended from seven days to eight, Australian Swimming authorities said today, reports Reuters.

Australian Swimming president Terry Gathercole said the move had been agreed by the world's governing body FINA at a meeting in Switzerland on Friday in the wake of a FINA decision to re-introduce semifinals at the Olympic Games.

Several countries, including Australia, lobbied FINA to extend the programme by a day to stop multi-discipline swimmers from burnout.

Australia's Michael Klim, named best swimmer at this year's World Championships after winning four gold and three minor medals, had also pleaded to have the programme changed.

Under the proposed seven-day programme, he would have had to swim the 100 metres butterfly and 200 metres freestyle events, in which he is current world champion, on the same night.

"A seven-day programme had been put forward with semifinals included (for events) up to 200 metres but it was a very difficult programme to swim. It was not swimmer friendly," Gathercole said.

Gathercole also said that the men's 1500 metres freestyle, an event Australians have traditionally dominated, had been switched back to the final session under the new programme.

Dutch-Pakistani finale

LAHORE, Pakistan, Nov 7: Pakistan made heavy weather Friday of their last league match against Germany, but won 3-1 to reach the final of 20th Champions' Trophy, reports AFP.

Hosts will play Holland in the final on November 8.

Pakistan edged out Australian, who earlier in the day lost 4-1 to Holland. Both teams finished with eight points in five matches, but Pakistan had a three-goal advantage to Australia's one.

Pakistan missed a penalty stroke and, at 1-1, found the winning goal hard to score.

Haider Hussain, Sohail Abbas and Atif Bashir were Pakistan's scorers while Max Klink slotted one for Germany.

Two penalty corner goals by Bram Lomans and one each by Remco van Wijk and Marten Eikelboom saw Olympic and world champions Holland routing Australia 4-1.

Commonwealth Games champions Australia, the only unbeaten side of the tournament after four matches, needed just a draw to reach the final, but they had no answer to the Dutch excellence.

Holland, wounded after their 5-3 loss to Pakistan on Wednesday, gave no quarter to the Australians. Though missing Tazet de Noijer, who left for home after his family member died, Holland were the better side in most of the match.

"This was the best start my team had in this championship and we were expecting a one goal win, but they left Australian in doldrums," Dutch coach Roelant Oltmans said.

The Australians were upset over their loss, but most of the players waited at the ground to see the result of the last match. Held Germany hold Pakistan to a draw, Australia would have reached the final.

Asian champions South Korea downed Spain to finish fourth in the table with eight points, but with an inferior goal difference.

South Korea will take on Australia in the play offs. Spain and Germany line up on November 8 for the last two positions.

Pakistan, who needed to score a clear goal, scored their first in the 12th minute. Haider Hussain dived to convert a cross from Mohammed Sarwar.

"I am proud to play the leading part in my team's win. This is a gift from my side to the crowd who egged us on during the whole match," Pakistan's Bashir said.

Both teams forced two penalty corners in the first half with Germany equalising in the 35th minute through Klink.

Pakistan found it hard to break a stubborn German defence and the first 10 minutes saw both teams playing in the mid-field.

Sohail Abbas finally netted Pakistan's second goal when in the 54th minute he scooped home Pakistan's third penalty corner. Sohail then missed a penalty stroke in the 62nd minute when his push was stopped by German goalie Christian Schulte.

Bashir scored Pakistan's third goal to send the 17,000 home crowd to their feet.

Kim Young-kui scored two goals for South Korea while Kwon Keon-wok, Yoo Moon-ki, Yoo Woon-kon and Son Seung-tae netted one each for the Koreans.

Juan Escarce with two and Jordi Casas found the target for Spain.

At one moment Spaniards threatened to hold their opponents to a draw but the fleet footed Koreans edged them out by creating more goal scoring opportunities.

Spanish goalie Ramon Jufresa saved three clear goals.

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Nelson hangs up his gloves

ACCRA, Nov 7 (Reuters/Internet): Ghanaian Azumah Nelson, who was three times world champion in the featherweight and super featherweight divisions, has retired from boxing, the Ghanaian newspaper Graphic Sports said.

The sports weekly said Nelson, 40, made the announcement on his return from South Africa where the World Boxing Council conferred on him a Lifetime Achievement Award.

"I am not the type of man who says one thing today and turns back on it tomorrow," the paper quoted him as saying after announcing he was quitting for good.

Nelson has also been told he can expect to become the first African inducted into the international boxing Hall of Fame.

During his 19-year professional career, he stopped 28 of his opponents within the distance, recording a total of 38 wins, four losses and two draws.

Among opponents he beat were Mexican Marcos Villasana, Mario 'Azabache' Martinez, Australian Jeff Fenech, and Briton Jim McDonnell.

His four defeats were at the hands of Pernell Whitaker, Jesse James Leija (twice) and Genardo Hernandez.

Papin plans to retire

PARIS, Nov 7 (Reuters/Internet): Jean-Pierre Papin, who walked out on second division En Avant Guingamp last month because he clashed with the coach, looks set to retire from soccer later this month.

"It's a very tough decision to take, perhaps the hardest, because I've been playing football for 25 years," Papin was quoted as saying in Friday's France Football magazine.

Papin, 35, is due to give a news conference on November 17 when he will probably announce his retirement.

"I've always been impulsive and that meant I sometimes did stupid things, but this time I feel I'm doing the right thing," said Papin, who scored 30 goals in his 54 international goals for France.

The former France captain and Olympique Marseille striker had hoped to finish a full final season with regular football after generally starting on the bench for Girondins Bordeaux last season.

But Papin, who also had spells with AC Milan and Bayern Munich, and Guingamp coach Francis Smerecki quarrelled over tactics as the relegated club made a poor start.

Pele for an African WC

LONDON, Nov 7: Brazilian football legend Pele on Friday threw his weight behind South Africa's campaign to stage the 2006 World Cup, reports AFP.

But he admitted question marks still remained over the country's ability to produce satisfactory facilities to stage the 32-team tournament in eight year's time.

FIFA president Sepp Blatter last week confirmed he favoured a bid from Africa after a meeting with Prime Minister Tony Blair and supporters of England's rival bid.

"The World Cup should be in a country with enough potential to host the competition," said the 58-year-old, who made his first of four World Cup finals appearances aged 17 in the triumphant Brazil side of 1958.

"Africa are the only conti-

ner who have never had a World Cup and they will be invited to try to host it and they have a lot of potential. I think to do it properly only South Africa could do it.

"It would be good to see it there but we have to see if they have the right conditions."

"When we talk about Africa we talk with the heart. We cannot talk about the heart in business. This is a big business now. Today business is very, very important, it's no longer just about the game and this needs to be considered by FIFA."

England and Germany are widely acknowledged to have the strongest bids after working on their proposals and stadium for several years.

England can also point to the wide-ranging success of Euro '96 and the rebuilt Wembley Stadium as selling points in their campaign.

But Pele, who scored 97 goals in his glittering international

career, believes FIFA's policy of trying to stage the World Cup in rotation could go against the European bids.

"The only problem I see for England and Germany is that they've had it already and it will have been held in Europe just eight years before (in France '98)."

"I think the procedure of the World Cup always was to give more time before coming back to Europe, to go to South America, Central America, Asia and now possibly Africa."

Pele's comments came on the day that the British government were forced to deny reports that the Prime Minister had withdrawn his personal support for England's bid.

Sports minister Tony Banks insisted that a newspaper report claiming Blair had backed tracked on the bid following Blatter's comments as "absolutely absurd."

Venus aiming higher

NEW YORK, Nov 7: Venus Williams said on Friday that she was ready to return to action after resting a sore left knee for two weeks, her sights set on finishing the year on a high note at the Chase Championships, reports Reuters.

"In the last competition of the year, you want to win the tournament," Williams, 18, said about the elite, season-ending event at Madison Square Garden starting November 16.

It would feel great, going out of the season and heading into the Australian Open, said the Australian, who has never had that feeling. It's something I want to capture.

Williams, ranked fifth in the world, has suffered from tennisitis in her knee but pronounced herself fit and anxious to resume training at home in Florida after a hectic one-day publicity/business stop in New York.

"I think it's time I got serious about my tennis life," Williams said. "Between nibbles of the Carnegie Deli all-American Venus — a veritable buffet disguised as a sandwich offering stacks of roast beef, turkey, cheese, lettuce, tomato and red pepper on whole wheat bread."

Despite claiming her first three WTA Tour titles in 1998, including the Lipton Championships and the Grand Slam Cup, and accumulating winnings of more than 1.6 million dollars, Williams said the season had fallen short of her expectations.

The powerfully-built American said she had wanted to claim at least one Grand Slam title. "My goal was to win, to get to the next step, I guess I failed."

Williams expressed admiration for the success of compatriot Lindsay Davenport, who beat her four of five meetings

this year on the way to hoisting herself into the world number one spot.

"She just made up her mind she wanted to be there," said Williams.

"I think we both have the same game," Williams added. "In a couple of matches I made some bad decisions and a couple of matches she played better."

Williams, one of the hardest hitters and biggest servers in women's tennis, said she thought she needed to become aggressive on the court, take better advantage of short balls during rallies and get more comfortable rushing the net.

She said only one element was missing from making her matches against US Open champion Davenport the fabric of a scintillating rivalry.

"If I want it to be a rivalry, I have to win more matches," Williams said. "It's up to me."

One-match ban on TSV coach

BONN, Nov 7 (Reuters/Internet): TSV 1860 coach Werner Lorant will have to watch Saturday's top-of-the-table Munich derby against Bayern from the stands.

The German Soccer Federation fined Lorant 20,000 marks (\$12,030) and suspended him for one match on Friday after he swore at a referee.

Lorant was punished for his behaviour towards match official Lutz-Michael Froehlich in the 1-1 draw at Bayer Leverkusen on October 24.
