



Khaleda urges police, govt officials

Remain neutral during opposition's agitation

SIRAJGANJ, Nov 14: BNP Chairperson Begum Khaleda Zia today urged the government officials and police administration to remain "neutral" during the opposition's future agitation programmes, reports APB.

She assured them that "compensation" would be provided if they "suffer for maintaining neutrality during peaceful movement.

At a public meeting here, Begum Zia once again charged the Awami League government with "plotting to revert to one-party system in the country."

The leader of the opposition in parliament alleged that the ruling party was trying to stay in power "by means of repression and false cases" after having failed to run the country. "Although it's not possible, they do not seem willing to take any lesson from the past," she added.

Begum Zia accused the government of muzzling the opposition saying: "We are neither allowed to speak in the House nor demonstrate on the streets."

"Those who are responsible for this state of affairs will be tried on this soil," she told the public rally at the Sirajganj University College ground. She branded the ruling party as tyrants (jalem) and said people were being united against them.

Presided over by district BNP convenor TMA Mannan MP, the meeting was addressed. among others, by Amanullah Aman MP. Alamgir Haider MP. Rafigul Islam Bakul MP, BNP

leader Iqbal Hassan, Sirajganj Pourasava Chairman Noor-e-Alam Helal and former MP Az-

izur Rahman Dulal. Begum Zia alleged that the ruling party leaders did every-thing to change their lots. She claimed only BNP could resist the "misdeeds" of the AL government and "that's why the rulers have resorted to repres-sion on BNP and its allies."

In this way, she said, they (government) foiled the Paltan Maidan meeting of BNP of November 7 so that "we could not announce any programme from a largely-attended gather-

Referring to the CHT peace accord, the BNP leader mentioned that Shantu Larma himself was now critical of the gov ernment's behaviour and talking about an "unwritten' agreement.

About distribution of gas blocks, the opposition leader complained that the government was striking deals with foreign companies without any prior assessment. "Any conspiracy to hand over national resources to the aliens will be foiled," she declared.

Begum Zia further blamed the government for not holding the trial of the share market scandal and for "not taking any effective steps to protect the dignity of women.

The BNP chief said they (AL) were now claiming the credit of constructing the Jamuna Bridge, but "I and my finance minister managed funds for the

From Page 1 Quoting Article 7 of the Constitution, Kamal Hossain said all powers in the Republic are supposed to belong to the people. "But does it appear that the people are now in power?" he asked the audience. "No," the audience replied.

Dr. Hossain requested Suranjit Sengupta, Prime Minister's Adviser on Parliamentary Affairs who was present there, to take immediate steps to separate the judiciary from the executive wing of the state. Sengupta nodded his approval.

Barrister Ishtiaque Ahmed said that the original constitution was a "document of beauty, grace and balance".

"But when the provision for promulgating emergency was incorporated in 1973, the beauty was gone," the barrister said. "Originally we did not keep the provision for emergoing r preventive detention because we had seen that such provisions were means of the Pakistani rulers to take away the fundamental rights.

"The balance between three wings of the state - Executive. Legislature and Judiciary - are there in the constitution. None of them is superior to any of the branches."

Terming Article Seven 'the pole star' of the Constitution. Ishtiaque Ahmed said it has limited the powers of a government while ensuring unquestionable sovereignty of the people.

Éarlier, Dr. M Zahir, a senior Supreme Court lawyer. gave an account of the contents of all the 13 amendments adopted so far and observed that most of them were assaults

on the original Constitution. He said the 13th amendment that created the provision for holding general elections under a non-partisan caretaker government proved that the country's political parties were extremely suspicious of one an-

Suranjit Sengupta, who was the lone opposition member on the Constitution drafting committee in 1972, said that the Constitution was not a gift or grant from anybody. "The people had to earn it through decades of struggle. The entire society has to make conscious efforts to implement the fundamental rights enshrined in the Constitution," the ruling party MP said. "Some academic

lectures were not sufficient. Claiming that he is optimistic about it, Sengupta said materialisation of the spirit of the Constitution was not an impossible proposition, especially when a congenial political atmosphere is there after the end of the Cold War.

Observing that patriotism is nobody's monopoly, he said the parliamentary standing committees which include the MPs of both the Treasury and Opposition benches are now making decisions keeping the national interests in mind.

The discussion was followed by a question-answer session, while a large number of people from the audience made various

"Let the impeachment hearings begin. We want out of it," Paula's husband, Steven Jones, told reporters yesterday outside his Long Beach, California, condominium.

"Paying a substantial amount of money makes a statement on its own. This is Paula's reputation that we were fighting for. This has nothing to do with an ax to grind with Bill Clinton," Jones said.

Clinton's lawyer Robert Bennett said the President "remains certain" that Mrs. Jones' allegations were baseless but wanted to get the dispute behind him. "The President has decided he is not prepared to spend one more hour on this matter," Bennett said.

The settlement that he reached with California attorney Bill McMillan, a Jones family friend, says Clinton will pay Mrs. Jones within 60 days

and requires both parties to "unconditionally release each other and representatives in connection with any claims" stemming from the lawsuit. Nothing in this agreement

shall be construed to be an admission of liability or wrongdoing by any party," the lawyers' signed agreement said. Nearly half of the payment

would come from Chubb Group Insurance, a legal source familiar with the case told The Associated Press. For a lump sum of roughly 400,000 dollar, Chubb was buying out the President's personal liability policy, which had been paying his Jones-re-lated legal bills, the source said. From Page 1 ogy successfully to raise potato production. In Thailand, rural women increased production of orchids which accounted for about 60 per cent of Thai ex-

ports, she said. In Bangladesh, orchids and ginger could be grown in the kitchen gardens along with gourds and string beans on raised platforms.

If the women are provided access to the technology, it would change their lifestyle and bring the country a rich dividend. The technology can also help conservation of nature, bio-diversity and help revive production of medicinal plants and herbs, Dr Ferdousi noted.

The biotechnology could also help waste disposal and produce bio-fertiliser. But the technology could not be spread due to lack of government support. Despite submission of research projects to the Science and Technology

Tk 12 crore fund, none bothered to pay any heed, she said adding, other government organisations like the BARC also remained impassive. Even government research organisations, despite funds and manpower at their disposals, have done nothing signifi-
