# IT seen as way forward for Asian battered economies

SANTA CLARA (California), Nov 22: Government ministers and business leaders from a dozen Pacific Rim countries ended a two-day summit here Friday at which information technology was hailed as the way forward for Asia's battered economies, reports AFP.

The booming markets for electronic commerce and advertising took center stage at the Asia Pacific Information Technology Summit, where participants pronounced their confidence in the Internet as a leading engine of economic growth.

"In pursuing our economic growth we are emphasising our Internet industry," said Taiwan's Vice Minister for Economic Affairs, Yi-Fu Lin.

While the mood was upbeat, leading US information technology executives warned there were still hurdles ahead for Asian countries seeking to maximise the potential of electronic commerce, which allows Internet users to buy products and services online.

Larry Ellison, Chairman of Oracle, the world's largest supplier of software for computer databases, warned that the costs of Internet access would have to fall in many Asian countries before information technology could begin con-

tributing to economic growth. "If your country does not have low-cost Internet access, it will be a big impediment to growth," he said. "It would be as if you did not have an international airport, did not have a university, did not have any

Ellison said cheap access to the Internet and improving information technology infrastructure were essential for realising the potential of electronic commerce. Unlike the United States, Internet users in many Asian countries have to pay for each minute they stay online, in addition to basic subscrip-

"It is so fundamental, nothing will hold back your economy more than high connection costs because commerce is moving quickly to the realm of the network," he said.

Echoing Ellison's view, Intel chief Andrew Grove said the high cost of getting online in some Asian countries was impeding the growth of the Internet. He said that based on the average time spent online by the average US user Internet access costs were even overtaking

computer costs in the long run. 'The biggest obstacle in popularising - commerce and making it truly a mass medium - the biggest factor separating people and people without computers — is telecommunications costs, and not computing costs," Grove said. "This is a problem that urgently requires address-

# Indian city opens technology park

HYDERABAD, Nov 22: Aggressively wooing foreign computer software companies, a city in southern India unveiled a technology park Sunday where companies such as Microsoft, Oracle, Apple and Sun Microsystems have set up shop,

reports AP. Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee called it the "biggest and most exciting development in the information technology sector in India.'

The 10-story building, part of the Hitech City project on the outskirts of Hyderabad, capital of Andhra Pradesh state, was built a little over one year after Microsoft chief Bill Gates extracted a promise from state Chief Minister Chandra Babu Naidu that he would improve the infrastructure there.

Microsoft and Oracle have taken up one floor each in the building. The rest of the space has already been taken up by other software companies, according to S D Kulkarni, chairman of Larsen and Toubro, which constructed the building.

The park, spread over 160 acres (65 hectare) is estimated to cost the government 15,000 million rupees (\$352 million). When completed over the next five years, it is expected to employ 10,000 people.

In a message to Naidu, Microsoft chief Gates said such investments will improve the local infrastructure and attract foreign investors.

## US cracks down on biggest illegal alien smuggling by Aziz Haniffa

WASHINGTON, Nov 22: The US Immigration and Naturalisation Service (INS) has smashed "the largest, most complex and sophisticated alien smuggling case in U.S. history" that had brought thousands of foreigners illegally into the country.

The INS crackdown came after a year-long investigation. known as "Operation Seek and Keep." "The smugglers provided undocumented workers to unscrupulous employers who wanted cheap labour," the agency said, adding, "at least in the past three years, this organisation smuggled as many as 300 Indian nationals per month, at a cost of more than \$20,000 per alien."

INS officials said the cartel specialised in smuggling Indian nationals through Moscow to Cuba, then from Cuba via boat to the Bahamas from where they were transported in boats or planes to Miami, Florida. An alternative route took the aliens from Cuba to Ecuador from where they were flown to Miami or driven through Mexico to the southern U.S. border.

The cartel also smuggled Afghans, Pakistanis and Syrians into the U.S., but officials noted that the majority of the aliens smuggled in were from India.

The INS said it had "identi-

fied the entire alien smuggling cartel and the organisational hierarchy at the global level." Twenty one members of the ring were nabbed in the U.S., Puerto Rico and the Bahamas where the organisation's alleged ring leader Nick Diaz, also known as Nitin Shettie and Roshan Bha-

jun, was apprehended last week. Three indictments unsealed by a federal jury in Dallas charged Diaz alias Shettie alias Bhajun and his associates with smuggling Indian nationals from India, through Ecuador, the Bahamas and Haiti into the United States by boats and air-

The indictment noted that Diaz and associates maintained stash houses to hold aliens until their smuggling fees were paid. These houses also stored alien smuggling fees until the money could be transported to Shettie. Under the direction of Shettie and his associates. smuggling fees of more than \$20,000 per alien were sent to Quito, Ecuador, the Bahamas and Dallas.

The agency said that after beginning the arrests last week. it had discovered that some of the cartel's clients were being housed in transit countries. Consequently, acting on an INS tip-off, Bahamian authorities found 31 Indian nationals,

while Ecuadorian officials found 30 Indians being held at a smuggler's residence in Quito. The INS said it was also

working with the State Department to provide Cuba with information about the identities of smugglers there and 37 Indian nationals who were being held in transit there. An estimated 7,200 illegal aliens were brought to the U.S. in the last three years and "the gross take for the organisation would be nearly \$220 million," it said.

Attorney General Janet Reno said, "This is the largest alien smuggling organisation ever dismantled in the U.S. history," adding "Let all those who flout the nation's immigration laws be warned: We plan to take swift and decisive action against you." Reno said the success of the operation was due in large part to the cooperation of the governments of the Bahamas, Canada, Ecuador, India and Panama.

INS Commissioner Doris Meissner told reporters that "cracking a multi-million-dollar alien smuggling ring whose operations spanned four continents is an impressive achievement and that underscores INS' commitment to aggressive anti-smuggling efforts to defend the integrity of this nation's immigration laws."

LONDON, Nov 22: European shares ended close to their highs on Friday as a strong start on Wall Street cheered markets already bullish after a big jump in Tokyo shares.

London, Frankfurt, Paris, Amsterdam and Madrid gained 2.0-2.5 percent as investors sought to squeeze better yearend returns from surplus cash.

Some traders believe this annual process of investors window dressing their portfolios may be starting early this year because of the advent of European monetary union in

January. In currency markets, traders were less enthusiastic about prospects for the Japanese economy and sold yen, though the dollar failed to hold on to

all its gains. Wall Street stood one percent up as European bourses closed but was expected to be volatile

because of today's so-called double-witching expiry of stock index options.

"The market is buoyant for a couple of reasons. Options expirations usually skews itself toward the the trend of the previous week," said Barry Hyman, senior market strategist at Ehrenkrantz and King.

"The other reason is the possible coordination of the political parties in Japan and the very positive reaction to that." Japan's Nikkei share index rose three percent on Friday.

But some European traders, particularly in money markets, said they remained cautious about a sustained rally in Japanese shares. President Bill Clinton, in Tokyo for a summit meeting, on Friday urged Japan to vigorously reform its bank-

London shares extended

yesterday's strong close and raced ahead to hit a 16-week high with dealers talking about the start of a year-end rally.

"People are forgetting about economics and just thinking about liquidity," said Ian Williams, UK strategist at Panmure Gordon.

"We are beginning to see the year-end rally. Investors are uncomfortable with high levels of cash and want to make their portfolios look better before the end of the year," he said.

The German bourse also put in a sparkling performance, climbing above 4,900 points on the electronic Xetra DAX index. Car stocks advanced, benefitting from the dollar holding firm above 1.68 marks. A stronger dollar makes German products more attractive in dollar-linked economies and increases the value of repatriated

foreign earnings.

DaimlerChrysler was up seven percent at one point, rising for the fourth day since the merged company's new shares officially began trading on Tuesday, but closed 3.5 percent higher. BMW AG ended 1.6 per-

In Paris, shares rose strongly in heavy trade of 16.9 billion francs. Traders said solid orders arrived with yearend portfolio preening coming early to beat the euro switch.

Madrid rose two percent. Traders said Clinton's cautious support for Japan's economic reforms fuelled optimism that an end to the Japanese financial crisis was in sight.

The Ibex-35 blue chip index gained 191.3 points to 9,431.9 points, bringing the week's gain to 5.4 percent. "There's just no bad news coming out now," said

a trader at Credit Lyonnais Securities in Madrid, adding that he saw the Ibex heading up to 10,000, led by Telefonica.

In currencies, the dollar climbed against the yen after comments from top Japanese officials quelled speculation that a Japan sales tax cut was in the works, dealers said.

The U.S. currency's rise gathered pace as Japan Finance Minister Kiichi Miyazawa said the ministry was not planning to lower the five-percent consumption tax rate that some analysts have blamed for exacerbating the nation's recession.

Miyazawa also said the ministry had not taken into account the big income and corporate tax cuts that were seen as a target on Thursday by Japan's ruling Liberal Democratic Party and its long-time rival Liberal Party, after their sur-

prise alliance.

"They're in the process of trying to figure out a way to save face and at the same time get its domestic economy working and because of the way things work in Japan it's never a black and white deal," said Mike Malpede, of Refco Group Ltd in New York.

The dollar fell about three yen on Thursday as analysts speculated the political alliance was a sign of LDP flexibility on the tax. Indeed, analysts said the tax might still be lowered as Japan might soon exhaust other means of economic stim-

The dollar was also stronger against the mark in the after-

noon session. Oil failed to retain early gains, with Brent futures traded on the International Petroleum Exchange sagging after NYMEX opened in New York.
