## Repatriation of Rohingyas resumes

today

COX'S BAZAR, Nov 24: The repatriation of Rohingya refugees to their homeland resumes tomorrow, reports APB. Local administration

sources said 47 Rohingyas of seven families are likely to return to their homesteads in Arakan province of Myanmar on the first day of the repatriation. They will be returning voluntarily, the sources added.

The refugees would cross the river Naaf from their camp on the Teknaf frontier under the supervision of UNHCR officials, the Deputy Commissioner of Cox's Bazar and other local of-

ficials. No repatriation took place since July 16, 1997.

The repatriation process made a headway following the discussion between Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad and Myanmar officials in Yangon during his visit to Myanmar on November 12.

Concerned officials in Dhaka indicated that the repatriation of the Myanmar refugees would be completed by the first quarter of the next (1999) year. Then the two remaining camps for the refugees will be dismantled.


## Bill to legalise transplantation of limbs, tissue in human bodies

Health and Family Welfare Minister Salauddin Yusuf introduced the Bill. In the statement of reasons and objects containing the bill, the Health Minister said bill was aimed at removing different human, social and religious complexities in collecting limbs from the voluntary donors and dead persons for transplantation in the bodies of sick people.

# 'Offence' is too weak a word to describe such a crime

An incident in which a 15year-old girl is stabbed 22 times, then raped and killed cannot be termed a mere "offence", Latifur Rahman, father of murdered teenager Shazneen, told the trial court yesterday as tears rolled down

his cheeks. "This is a very weak word to describe a vicious crime of this nature," he said concluding his statement as the "informant" of the brutal murder in his Gul-

shan residence on April-23. In his 112-minute statement, the continuation of his

November 22 when he began his deposition, he narrated the incidents and events of relevance in the days leading to gruesome murder and after.

The trial is being held in the court of the Sixth Additional District and Sessions Judge, Dhaka.

Prices of rice soared once again at the city markets although aman, the biggest crop of the year, is ripe enough to be harvested and being added to supply line.

Traders at one of the city's main wholesale markets acknowledged the recent price rise of the staple food blaming lower domestic production, price rise in India, hoarding and the damage that recent cyclonic storm inflicted upon standing Government, however, is

still unwilling to go for OMS (open market sale) programme in spite of its claim of comfortable stock in the public reserve

Meanwhile, BBC radio, giving reference to a ruling party lawmaker and rice trader, reported yesterday that trucks carrying rice consignments were being hijacked. It said the food ministry had

talks with the home ministry in a bid to curb the hijacking of rice carrying trucks.

Earlier, The Daily Star was the first to report on September 15 this year that the food ministry had sought special security measures from the home ministry for safe movements of food consignments on the

highways. The government acted accordingly, deploying army and navy personnel at two seaports of the country to ensure quick shipment of foodladen vessels. But talking to rice traders at different city markets, this correspondent got an impression

that with the harvesting of aman crop, a sluggish trend in import from India is prevail-

# Battle of ballots in 4 Indian states today

NEW DELHI, Nov 24: The stage is set for 'a fierce battle of ballots' in four Indian states tomorrow.

It will be the first major test for the 8-month-old government of Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee as well as Sonia Gandhi's leadership in the Congress that trying to regain its prominence.

More than eight crore voters are expected to cast their ballots to decide the fortunes of about five thousand candidates in Delhi, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan and Mizoram states. Voting will start at 8 am and

ing will begin on November 27. Vajpayee's Bharatiya Janata Party and Sonia Gandhi's Congress are the major contenders for power in Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh and Delhi while Congress is pitted against ethnic parties in the northeast-

ern state of Mizoram. The elections in the four states are crucial for the BJPled alliance ruling India as political analysts feel that a rout for it could prompt fresh alignment of political forces which may have a bearing on See Page 12 Col 2
