
Hosts humble Pakistan

NEW DELHI, Nov 25: A skipper's knock of 113 by Anand Sharma helped India beat archrivals Pakistan by eight wick-ets to reach the semifinals with a clean slate in the inaugural Kanishka World Cup cricket for the blind here yesterday, reports PTI.

Anand Sharma's superb effort and his 174-run second wicket stand with all-rounder Balaji Damor 62 not out propelled favourites India to 248 for two in 36.1 overs after they had inserted and restricted Pakistan to 244 for 8 in 40


