

In the first match, Bangladesh Rifles easily defeated Bangladesh Bank Club 15-2, 15-3. 15-1.


This was the Rifle men's second victory in two matches while for Bank it was the second defeat.

PERTH, Nov 28 (Reuters/AP): England's campaign to win back the Ashes was in danger of falling apart almost as soon as its began after a disastrous start to the second Test today.

Needing a strong performance to keep alive their hopes of winning the series after rain saved them in the first Test last week, England self-destructed on the first day at the WACA.

The tourists showed little resistance and collapsed for a pitiful 112 all out in their first innings. They then dropped three catches as Australia raced to 150 for three at stumps. England's total was their

lowest ever in a Test at the WACA, eclipsing their 123 all out in the 1994-95 Ashes series. Australia won that match by 329 runs.

Only four players made more than six runs for England on Saturday, Mark Butcher, Graeme Hick and Alan Mullally all scored ducks.

England's innings lasted just

Australia's pacemen revelled in the conditions after Mark Taylor won the toss and sent England in to bat on a lively

WACA wicket. Damien Fleming finished with career-best figures of five for 46. Glenn McGrath took three for 37 and Jason Gillespie, playing his first Test since breaking down during the 1997 Ashes series, claimed two for 23

Premier Cricket


