UEFA assures tight security

GENEVA, Nov 30 (Reuters/Internet): European soccer's governing body UEFA said on Monday the politically-charged Champions' League clash between Turkey's Galatasaray and Italy's Juventus would go ahead on Wednesday with increased security.

A UEFA spokesman said the Turkish club would be providing tighter security than normal and would face severe punishment if promised security measures failed to materialise.

FIH allows England

BRUSSELS, Nov 30: The FIH, world governing body of field hockey, announced here on Sunday that England would be allowed to compete in the 1999 Champions Trophy despite pulling out of this year's event.

The ruling means that England, who withdrew from November's tournament in Pakistan after the foreign office advised Britons not to travel there as a result of anti-western feeling following the Americans bombing of neighbouring Afghanistan, will replace Germany in Brisbane, Australia, next June.

FIFA leaves it upto ROK

SEOUL, Nov 30: Stalinist North Korea could host some of the 2002 World Cup finals matches. Sepp Blatter, president of world football governing body FIFA, hinted here today, reports AFP.

He told reporters while it was not possible to change FIFA statutes to allow the North to formally host any games, if the South as co-host made its own contacts "FIFA, at least, will not close the door."

"We are open to any dialogue."

The 2002 finals are being co-hosted by South Korea and Japan.

Blatter, in Seoul for the first time since he replaced his long-time boss Joao Havelange in June last year, said he was planning to visit the communist state next fall at the invitation of Pyongyang.

Feyenoord triumph

AMSTERDAM, Nov 30: Julio Ricardo Cruz scored late and Feyenoord won the Rotterdam derby at Sparta 2-1 Sunday, taking a four-point lead over Ajax atop the Dutch First Division, reports AP.

Ajax lost ground after losing up three-first half goals at Vitesse Arnhem and losing 3-2.

Sunday's other-scheduled fixture saw FC Utrecht down Willem II Tilburg 2-0.

An unfi pitch after an early-morning inspection meant Saturday's postponed NEC Nijmegen-RKC Waalwijk match still could not be played and had to be put off a second time.

Sampras sees no new foes



HANOVER, Germany, Nov 30 (Reuters/Internet):

Tennis will remain stuck in a rut next year -- the same few players challenging top man Pete Sampras, according to the world number one himself.

Sampras, the best player around for a record sixth consecutive year, said newcomers were nowhere to be seen.

"I think you're going to see pretty much the same guys," he said at the season-ending ATP Tour world championship. "I don't see anyone ranked 40 or 50 that's going to be in the top 10 by this time next year."

Sampras has not been quite as dominant as in previous years, partly because of injury.

But he still won Wimbledon, his 11th Grand Slam title, and three other tournaments.

Only Australian Roy Emerson has won 12 majors.

"I'm not that old and I've still got plenty to look forward to," said Sampras, 27. "I know that if I'm fit and if I play my best tennis, it's going to be very hard for other guys to beat me."

Obviously, Sampras wants a couple more grand slam victories. With 248 weeks at world number one, he could also beat Lendl's record 270.

Sampras fell to eventual winner Alex Corretja of Spain in the semifinals in Hanover but his only rival in the race for number one, Chilean Marcelo Rios, had already pulled out injured.

I regard this as an ultimate achievement," Sampras said of his record. "I don't think it will ever be broken."

The world's finest player also said he sometimes felt he did not receive all the attention and the respect he deserved.

The fact that Sampras, often criticised for his perceived lack of charisma, keeps outclassing the opposition may be a handi-

cap for the sport but there are others.

Lack of personalities, a complicated ranking system and the high number of tournaments also explain why fans, sponsors and media are becoming

North Korea must march after South

BANGKOK, Nov 30 (Reuters/Internet): North Korea's demand that its team should parade ahead of South Korea at Sunday's Asian Games opening ceremony has been rejected by Thai organisers.

"We are organising the march in accordance with the Thai alphabet, so South Korea will come first," organising committee vice-chairman Samprab Tejavannja said on Monday.

The slogan of the Asian Games is "Friendship beyond Frontiers", so the march is organised in accordance with the order of the Thai letters. It has nothing to do with politics."

He said South Korea would be the fourth or fifth team into Bangkok's Hua Mark stadium. North Korea would appear 35th or 36th.

But a spokeswoman from JSI Production House, which is directing the opening and closing ceremonies, said North Korea would enter the stadium right behind its southern rival.

North and South Korea are technically at war and separated by a heavily militarised border.

The management of the athletes village is keeping the teams quartered well apart from each other.

In order to avoid direct confrontation we have separated them," said a senior official. "We hope they will appreciate our arrangement."

Aware of that, the ATP Tour, which runs the men's professional circuit, is working on a series of measures aimed at keeping everybody interested.

A new elite series comprising the current Super-9 events and the season's finale will be launched in 2000.

The ATP Tour and the Super-9 tournaments -- the highlights of the season outside the Grand Slams -- have signed an agreement with marketing agency ISL/Octagon to market the rights of the events in the series.

The news practically means that the Super-9 tournaments have agreed to keep working together with the ATP Tour and its marketing partner.

The current deal runs until 2000 and rival organisations, notably Boris Becker, together with marketing agency Prisma, had approached the organisers of the most prestigious tournaments, offering to promote their events.

Becker said his proposals were more lucrative for both the tournaments and the players but ATP Tour boss Mark Miles disagreed.

To those who say that they can add value to the game, we say that with ISL/Octagon, we have," he said.

Miles said the commercial rights of the events in the new series will be pooled for a long period which has not been determined yet but should run for some 10 years. He said the value of the new package would be around \$100 million a year.

Miles also confirmed that from 2000 there would be a 12-month rankings race with all the players beginning the season at zero and accumulating points throughout the calendar year.

Changes could also be brought to the rules to make the sport more exciting to watch, said Miles. He declined to give details.

Alex, an Ivan idolater

HANOVER, Germany, Nov 30 (Reuters): Spain's Alex Corretja said he had been inspired by memories of Czech legend Ivan Lendl after battling back from two sets down to defeat compatriot Carlos Moya in the final of the ATP Tour World Championship on Sunday.

"I was thinking about Lendl and that French Open final against (John) McEnroe (in 1984), when he came back from two sets down and won in five sets," said Corretja, who did just that to beat Moya 3-6, 3-6, 7-5, 6-3, 7-5 in an all-Spanish thriller.

"Lendl was my hero and I was saying to myself 'come on, do like him'.

"I was also thinking about members of my family who died," added the 24-year-old, who recently lost an aunt and an uncle.

"I was talking to them in my head, asking them to give me the power to finish the match. This victory is for them."

Winning the longest final of the year and one of the most exciting was sweet revenge for Corretja, crushed in straight sets by Moya in the French Open final last June.

"I was not noticed them," he said. "I was playing against a friend in a big match and all that was a bit confusing. I knew that if I was to meet him again in a final I'd have to be mentally stronger, today, I was."

Victory moved Corretja three places up to third in the year's final rankings.

"It's a great way of ending the year," he said. "Now my goal is to fight for the number one ranking but I'm not obsessed with it."

In the middle of the post-match news conference, somebody brought him a mobile telephone.

"Excuse me, I think it's the King of Spain who wants to talk to me," Corretja said.

In fact it was Prime Minister Jose Maria Aznar.

"He's nice too," said Corretja, "the King will probably call later."

After going two sets down, Corretja, cheered by an enthusiastic 13,000 crowd packing the Hanover Hall, picked up his game to emerge as the winner of the longest final of the year.

"I've been working really hard for years for this kind of win," he said. "I don't know if I'm a great champion but today, I feel like one."

The 24-year-old Corretja, who became the first Spanish player to win the season's finale since Manuel Orantes' triumph in 1976, earned a huge 1.36 million dollars in prize money.

His victory also moved him three places up to third in the year's final rankings.

Corretja clinches title
