

## AL to ensure political stability: PM

MAGURA, Dec 5: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today said her government would ensure democracy, political stability and prosperity of the country to honour the love, confidence and expectation of the people on her party which they demonstrated through June 12 national polls, reports BSS.

Through establishing the voting rights of the people and subsequent incorporation of the provision of holding national polls under neutral caretaker government in the Constitution "we had buried the notion of capturing powers by coup, killing and conspiracy," she said.

Addressing a workers' rally of Magura district Awami League here, the Prime Minister said the name of Magura would remain ever notable in country's political history as she took a vow to establish people's right to vote at any cost from Magura following the massive vote rigging and a reign of terror let loose by BNP centering a by-election here in 1994.

Paying tributes to the leaders and workers of Awami League for achieving independence as well as for reestablishing democracy in the country, the Prime Minister said that the cardinal principles and ideology of Awami League were to

bring welfare of the down-trodden people of the country. She called upon the party workers to be ready to make more sacrifices for the people as they did in the past.

As it was her first meeting in Magura since formation of the government, the Prime Minister emotionally recalled the atrocities of BNP in the name of election and said that from this soil she took the decision not to take part in any election under BNP. She also took the decision to resign from the parliament because of the misdeeds of BNP in Magura by-polls, she added.

The Prime Minister said that her government is running the country with the objectives to build the country attuned to the ideals and spirit of the War of Liberation. She also referred to a number of steps taken by her government for the well-being of the people and development of the country including Magura.

The Prime Minister called upon the people to sink their narrow differences, if any, and devote whole heartedly to translate into reality the dream of the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman to establish a poverty and hunger-free prosperous country.

## Solo sculpture exhibition begins

On display are 60 pieces of work in iron, aluminium and brass. The exhibition will continue till December 18. Speaking at the opening ceremony, the chief guest, Prof. Abdur Razzak, said that sculpture had begun at the Fine Arts Institute "out of nothing". Our paintings were on an international level, while sculpture had lagged behind because it had received little encouragement from relevant authorities, he said.

On Milky's work, Prof. Razzak said her work combines both craft and art and that the sculptor had dealt with different aspects of every day life in her work.

Asst. Prof. Hamiduzzaman Khan drew attention to the fact that it was a pity that the National Exhibition of '98 at the Shilpakala Academy offered no prizes for sculpture, although there were numerous sculpture exhibits of high quality. He added that since Dhaka society does not as yet recognise sculpture, it is a difficult profession indeed as compared to that of other artists.

Christoph Steyer, the Deputy Director of Alliance Francaise, said that the exhibit was a bridge to further possible achievements for the artist.

Milky has had 12 group exhibitions apart from this solo exhibition, and has won two awards, at the Gallery Tone, at the 1st Tone International Miniature Art Exhibition and at the 3rd Shilpangan Young Artists' Exhibition.

## BNP wants to create anarchy over Pabna by-polls: Zillur

RANGPUR, Dec 5: Awami League General Secretary Zillur Rahman today said BNP would not be allowed to make an issue out of the Pabna-2 by-election scheduled for December 10, reports UNB.

Like all the by-elections to parliament and the union parishads held under the Awami League government, this by-poll will be free, fair and impartial, he said.

The impartiality of the government was highly praised at home and abroad, added Zillur Rahman who is also the Minister for LGED and Cooperatives. He was addressing a public meeting, organised by the district Awami League, at Rangpur Public Library ground.

Zillur Rahman said it has become clear to the people that BNP wants to create anarchy to manipulate the by-election results. Engaged in a conspiracy, the opposition has been trying to create ground for calling a 48-hour hartal, he added.

But, with people's cooperation, the government and the Election Commission are determined to hold the polls in a free and fair manner, he said. The Awami League leader

said the government's success in constructing the Bangabandhu Bridge over the Jamuna, the CHT peace agreement, the Ganges water treaty and successful management of the worst-ever flood made the BNP unnerved and jealous.

Zillur said the corruption, politicisation, repression and oppression, vote dacoity, killing of farmers and above all misuse during BNP regime are still fresh in the minds of the people.

Referring to the welfare measures taken up by the government of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, the LGED Minister said the main target of the BNP is to grab power illegally by destroying the democracy.

He said Leader of the Opposition should not do politics sitting inside the cantonment. If she wants to do politics, she should come out of the cantonment and face the people.

The meeting was presided over by president of Rangpur district unit of Awami League and addressed by Md. Ahsanul Haq Chowdhury MP, H. N. Ashiqur Rahman MP and party central leaders Fulu Sarkar and Ivy Rahman.

## Wizard at repairing cameras

Thirty-year-old M A Bashir has repaired 40,000 cameras in his life time, along with other related equipment.

In his tiny 5-foot by 5-foot shop at the Stadium, he specialises in repairing mechanical and electronic goods. When he began work at the age of 12, cameras were only manual and had transistor circuits. Today he deals with microchips and specialises in the electronic digital types.

Bashir has learnt the skills from his grandfather and uncle and also taken lessons from late S M Siddique, the first camera mechanical expert in Bangladesh.

Old cameras are the sources of spare parts he uses so that there is recycling of goods and

saying of thousands of taka. He also makes some of his own instruments like forceps, compasses and fibre hammers himself.

He repairs not only cameras, but also mechanical and electronic goods such as two-in-ones, camera projects, radios and TVs, on request. What he specialises in is instantaneous repairing of cameras that give problem to photojournalists when they are on duty specially during cricket and football matches.

Bashir has worked for the Mirpur Staff College, ISPR, British Council, Shilpa Bank, Drik Picture Gallery, and works regularly for several well-known photojournalists of national dailies and BTv.

## Int'l seminar on ecosystem begins tomorrow

## Smuggled goods worth Tk 65 lakh seized

CHITTAGONG, Dec 5: Bangladesh Navy in separate operations on Friday night seized huge smuggled goods worth about Tk 65 lakh from the coastal areas here and arrested 55 pirates in this connection, reports UNB.

Official sources said the Navy patrol ship recovered 700 tons of salt worth about Tk 45.5 lakh and arrested 55 Bangladesh smugglers while they were patrolling in the Bay of Bengal on Friday night.

They also seized seven trawlers used for carrying the salt from Myanmar as the smugglers failed to produce valid papers for the goods they were carrying.

## Asia's first centre to treat children with cancer opens

CALCUTTA, Dec 5: Asia's first centre exclusively to treat children with cancer was inaugurated here today inside the Thakurpukur Cancer Centre Welfare Home and Research Institute (CCWHRI), reports PTI.

The centre, whose first phase was inaugurated today, will cater to the special needs of paediatric patients suffering from any form of cancer, the Director of the facility Dr Saroj Gupta said.

Gupta said as childhood cancer, comprising about five per cent of the total cancer afflicted, was increasing in number, the whole of India and neighbouring countries would be largely benefited by the facility.

We had a special children's ward in our centre with 16 beds but an increasing number of children with cancer are now turning up from the whole of eastern India and this prompted us to open a specialised centre for them, he said.

The centre has been built amidst picturesque environments with an amusement park, a lake, an open air theatre and a toy train for entertainment of the paediatric patients.

# Need for compilation of women's experience in Liberation War stressed

Birangana Chakma's husband was killed by the Pak army because he was an active member of the AL during the Liberation War. She had to subsequently struggle to bring up her three young children all by herself. Today her sons feel proud to say that their father sacrificed his life for the country, but remain bitter that nobody recognises his sacrifice.

Sheema Ahmed was a married young woman who was deserted by her husband and subsequently forced to become a sex slave for the heinous Pak army. Today she leads a life filled with the nightmares of those nine long months. Nobody remembers her.

These were a few of the heart-rending stories of women of our country during the liberation struggle which were presented at a seminar where the speakers called for proper compilation of the experience of women in the Liberation War in the history of the country. They also reiterated the need for recognition of everyone's contribution.

Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK) held the seminar on Friday to present some of their findings from a research conducted to gather information about women's role and contribution in the liberation war.

The day-long seminar 'The History of women's experience in the Liberation War of Bangladesh' held at the WVA auditorium was open to all participants for discussion on the topic.

ASK has been working on this project to gather information to start a compilation of women's role in the war in history.

Extracts from case studies from the research conducted were read out which related heart-rending accounts of women victimised by the war and mostly left scarred for life. They included case studies of the tribal women of CHT. It was noted that some 400 to 500 tribal women were raped during the war but they are not given due recognition for their sacrifice.

Speakers at the seminar voiced support for the need of a compilation of the experiences of the women in the war. A lawmaker noted the unavailability of any data or research at present relating to their contribution or even participation.

The call for a formal apology from Pakistan for war-time brutalities on women was reiterated by a professor from DU.

She said that this was sadly falling behind from all agencies.

Other speakers voiced their support and included requests to ASK not to stop at the 20 or so cases that they had compiled so far but to include more.

The 19 women who conducted the research for ASK include Meghna Guhathakurata, Hamida Hossain, Sultana Kamal, Hasina Ahmed, Dr Amina Mohsin and Linda Islam among others.

Participants in the seminar included Sonia Amin, Advocate Shahida Begum, Z I Khan, Sadaka Halim, Shaheen Akhter, and Mesbah Kamal.

## Prof Shariff appointed JU treasurer

## Death anniversary

An ex-member of Pakistan National Assembly (1962-64), Khan was born in Brahmanbaria in a respectable family in 1908. He was also a reputed lawyer after obtaining MA, LLB degree, he practised law in Calcutta Alipore Court, Dhaka Supreme Court and High Court.

He was involved in politics and a close associate of Husain Shahid Suhrawardy, Maulana Bhasani and Sheikh Mujibur Rahman.

One of the founder vice-presidents of Awami Muslim League, Khan represented Pakistan in the United Nations General Assembly (1963-64) and East Pakistan Lawyers' Association in Oslo in 1955. He headed many social welfare and political organisations. Amiable in nature, Khan was very popular for his witty.
