

Salas sinks Inter

ROME, Dec 5: Marcelo Salas scored twice as Lazio beat Inter Milan 2-1 in an Italian Cup quarterfinal, first leg on Thursday, reports Reuters.

The Chilean drove home a penalty on 18 minutes after Czech Pavel Nedved had been brought down in the box by Argentina's Diego Simeone.

Youri Djorkaeff pulled Inter level with a goal from a freekick after 32 minutes but Salas restored the Rome side's lead two minutes after the interval when he sprinted on to a pass from Roberto Mancini to beat Italy goalkeeper Gianluca Pagliuca.

Lazio's victory ruined Micea Lucescu's debut as Inter coach. The former manager of the Romanian national side joined the club on Tuesday after his predecessor Luigi Simoni was sacked.

Inter have made an erratic start to the season and are seventh in Serie A. They are well-placed in the European Championship but Lucescu will still need to take his side into the last four of the Italian Cup to satisfy ambitious club president Massimo Moratti.

The return leg is in Milan in late January.

Bochum baffle Bayern

BONN, Dec 5: German league leaders Bayern Munich were held to a 2-2 draw by VfL Bochum Friday evening and could lose top spot today if Bayer Leverkusen beat VfL Wolfsburg by a margin of two goals or more, reports AFP.

The 87th minute of Friday's game was marked by two questionable penalties — one at either end.

Bayern's Markus Babbel pulled down Yugoslav Zdravko Drinic while clearing the ball and Bochum's Stefan Kuntz converted from the spot. Kuntz had just enough time to reach the opposite end of the ground and, seconds later, was penalised for hand ball.

Thomas Stunz converted that penalty giving Bayern an unexpected but not undeserved draw.

"The Bayern guys told me that Babbel's penalty wasn't one," Kuntz said, claiming that the ball hit his chest and not his hand. "Still, it's disappointing that an experienced referee like Bernd Heynemann should give them a concessional penalty."

Bayern could have sown up the match before half time but missed a penalty — the third to be awarded during the game.

Norbert Hofmann initially gave Bochum the lead after just three minutes but Carsten Jancker equalised in the 45th. The result was celebrated like a victory at Bochum and was reward enough for a team which is racked by injury.

In Friday's other Bundesliga game, Nuremberg beat 2-0 but were still unable to notch up their first home victory, eventually sharing the points with Hansa Rostock after a 2-2 draw.

Rennes climb

PARIS, Dec 5: Rennes' 0-0 draw at Metz in the French League on Friday was enough to put the Brittany club up from fifth to third spot, reports AFP.

However Rennes remain 10-points adrift of leaders Marseille and second-placed Bordeaux who both have 38 points.

The leading duo both played on Thursday, Bordeaux losing 2-1 at Lyon and Marseille drawing 1-1 at Auxerre, the last team to win the league and French Cup double two years ago.

Nantes, who thanked two goals from Frederic da Rocha at the Beaujoire Stadium for their 2-0 win over Bastia, made some ground on the leading clubs.

Fourth-placed Monaco, who beat Nancy 3-0 on Thursday and fifth-placed Lyon are just one point ahead of Nantes, who are a place further back.

Lens beat Bastia 3-0 in a good result before their final European Champions League match against Dynamo Kiev on Wednesday.

Paris Saint Germain however could only draw 0-0 at the Parc des Princes against Toulouse, who are the bottom club.

Berkovic stands by Hartson

LONDON, Dec 5: (Reuters/Inter-Net): Eyal Berkovic has written a letter in support of West Ham teammate John Hartson, who faces a misconduct charge after kicking an Israeli international midfielder in the head during a training session.

"There is and has been no ill feeling between John Hartson and me," he wrote in a signed

letter which was obtained and published by the Mirror newspaper on Saturday.

"We have and have had a normal relationship between members of the same squad, and have played in the same team and practised together on many occasions since then."

Hartson kicked Berkovic during a routine training session in September as the Israeli kneeled on the ground after a hard tackle. The incident was filmed and images were subsequently published and broadcast worldwide.

The letter published on Saturday painted a very different picture to the one that first emerged. At the time, Berkovic was quoted as saying he was considering his future at the English Premier league club.

He wrote in a newspaper column about how the blood had gushed from his head after the incident and of the anger he felt for his teammate and employers.

"If my head had been a ball, it would have whizzed into the stanchions from his kick," he wrote in an Israeli tabloid, dismissing Hartson's subsequent attempt to apologise by telephone as a "bit late for that now."

However, West Ham manager Harry Redknapp said after the match that both men had settled their differences and shaken hands.

Berkovic confirmed in the letter that was the case and had asked Redknapp not to fine Hartson because he had accepted his teammate's apologies.

"We both put the incident down to our training hard at the time," Berkovic wrote.

The English Football Association (FA) charged Hartson, who faces a lengthy ban, with misconduct in October but no date has yet been set for any disciplinary hearing where the letter is expected to be produced.

West Ham are currently third in the Premier league and need both players as they chase a place in Europe.

Boxer dies

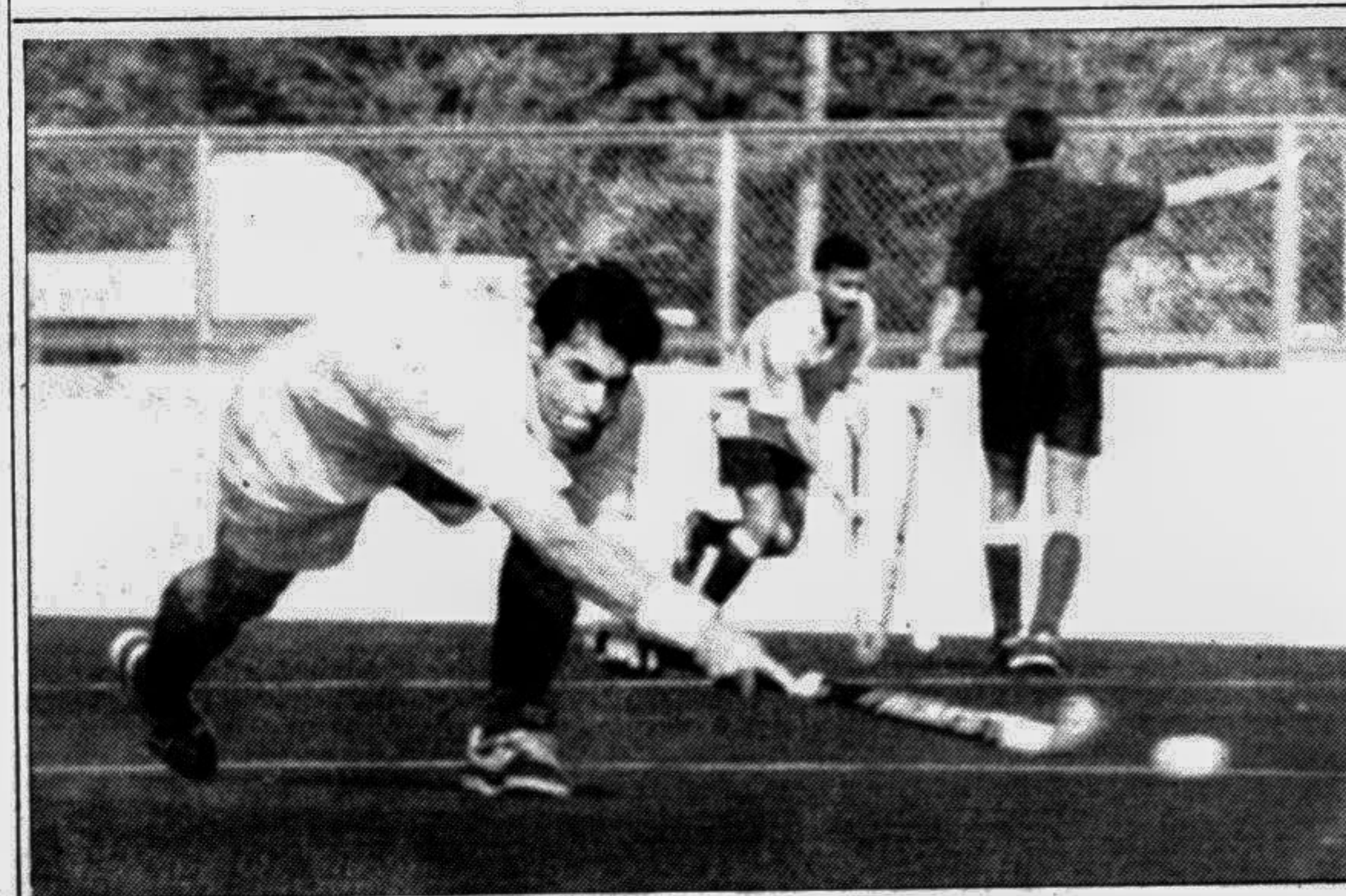
ERIE, Pennsylvania, Dec 5: Johnny Bizzarro, who made unsuccessful bids for the world junior lightweight and light-weight boxing titles during the 1960s, is dead at the age of 60, reports AP.

Bizzarro died Thursday night in the emergency room at St Vincent's Hospital. An autopsy will be performed.

Bizzarro, a native of Italy and longtime resident of Erie, compiled a 54-11 record with two draws and 24 knockouts. He bid for the junior lightweight title in 1963 and lost a 15-round decision to Gabriel "Flash" Elorde in Philadelphia. In 1966, he was stopped in the 12th round by Carlos Ortiz in a challenge for the lightweight championship at Pittsburgh.

Survivors include his wife and seven children.

Funeral arrangements were pending.

Tyson goes to Hollywood

NEW YORK, Dec 5: Mike Tyson is going Hollywood.

A news conference to announce Tyson's return to boxing will be held Tuesday in Hollywood, California.

Tyson is scheduled to fight Francois Botha of South Africa January 16 in the MGM Grand at Las Vegas.

In a release announcing the news conference at the Hollywood Athletic Club, Showtime simply stated that Tyson and Botha would be present. One of the contacts listed on the announcement was the MGM Grand.

Tyson has gotten back his boxing license from the Nevada State Athletic Commission, which revoked it after he was disqualified for biting Evander Holyfield's ears June 28, 1997, but the former heavyweight champion still has out-of-the-ring problems.

George Walker, the chief probation officer for Marion County (Indiana) Superior Court, has said it appeared Tyson violated terms of his probation on a rape conviction as a result of his no-contest plea to misdemeanor assault charges in Maryland on Tuesday.

It is possible Tyson could be returned to prison.

Tyson, who served three years on the rape conviction before being released in 1995, is scheduled to remain on probation until March.

Tyson was charged with punching one man and kicking another after a traffic accident in Montgomery County, Maryland. He has reached a settlement with the two men to avoid a civil suit.

Sweden sweep singles

MILAN, Dec 5: Sweden were to win their seventh Davis Cup title on Friday after taking a 2-0 lead over Italy, reports Reuters.

Italy suffered a serious setback when number one Andrea Gaudenzi pulled out of his match and the rest of the final with a shoulder injury.

Gaudenzi retired hurt in the first match with the score at 6-6 in the fifth and final set of an epic opening clash with Magnus Norman which lasted four hours and 56 minutes.

Norman's teammate Magnus Gustafsson then needed little over an hour and a half to demolish Davide Sanguinetti 6-1, 6-4, 6-0.

Before a subdued 11,000 strong crowd on the red-clay court of Milan's Forum Di Asago.

The two victories propelled the defending champions to within sight of their seventh Davis Cup title and their third in the past five years.

Their formidable doubles dup of Jonas Bjorkman and Niklas Kulti was due to face Diego Nargiso and Gaudenzi today.

Sanguinetti who hardly figured in Friday's clash with Gustafsson will stand in for Gaudenzi and is not a doubles

specialist he has never played Davis Cup doubles with Nargiso. "I had always said Sweden were the favourites even if we had started off at 1-1 (after the first day) but now were at 2-0."

Italian Davis Cup captain Paolo Pietrangeli told a news conference, "We will need not one but many miracles."

Gaudenzi had looked to have salvaged his match when he shrugged off the effects of a long term shoulder injury and fought back from 4-1 in the final set to first 5-5 and then 6-6.

Jr tennis team off to Colombo

A seven-member Bangladesh junior (under-13) tennis team left yesterday to take part in a junior tournament beginning in the Sri Lankan capital Colombo today.

Six players including three girls will be managed and coached by Zahurul Haque. The players are: Alamgir Hossain, Shahar Haidar, Amal Roy, Sifat Nusrat Beishakhi, Dyuti Sanchaita and Disa Islam.

The International Tennis Federation (ITF) is organising the event as part of its development programme. It will be held in two phases and is expected to end on December 19.

Sanguinetti gave Italy hope by taking the next four games in succession but then withered in the face of Gustafsson's superior ground strokes and vast Davis Cup experience.

The Swede chalked up 10 games on the trot to take the second set 6-4 and the third set to love.

India going downwards

CALCUTTA, Dec 5: (AP): As the Asian Games have grown bigger and better, India — a founder of the event — has remained a loyal participant but become less and less competitive.

For this year's Games scheduled December 6-20 in Bangkok, Thailand, India has placed its best medal hopes on tennis, track and field, newly introduced billiards and snooker, and, of course, the tag-like traditional regional sport of kabaddi.

India was instrumental in organising and hosted the first Asian Games in 1951. That inaugural year it was second in the medal tally after perennial high-performer Japan with 15 gold, 18 silver and 19 bronze.

India has participated in every Asian Games since, one of only half dozen nations to have done so. But its performance faltered as more and more countries joined, bringing athletes who were world, not just regional, powers. Eleven nations sent teams to the first Asian Games, which have been held every four years since 1954.

Hiroshima, Japan hosted 42 teams in 1994, when India won four gold, three silver and 15 bronze, finishing eighth in the medal tally.

Some 7,000 athletes from 45 countries will compete in Bangkok.

The poor 1994 showing was at least an improvement over 1990 in Beijing, when India was 11th in the medal tally with just one gold, eight silver and 14

bronze. If a slow resurgence has begun, it may have been sparked on the tennis courts, where Leander Paes and Mahesh Bhupathi — a top ranked duo on the professional circuit — won the doubles gold and along with Kirtane and Syed Fajluddin won a team gold in 1994. India is a favorite to win the doubles and team golds in Bangkok as well.

Paes followed up his 1994 Asian Games victories with Olympic bronze in singles in 1996. India's first Olympic medal since 1950. A leg injury could keep Paes out of the singles tournament, but not the doubles, in Bangkok.

In track and field, medal prospects were brightened by the return of the woman known as India's "sprint queen," Payoli Tevarapampal Usha. Usha, who won four gold medals at the 1986 Games in Seoul, had announced her retirement in 1991 but this year announced her comeback at the age of 33.

At the Asian Track Championship held in Japan last July, Usha anchored India's 4X100-metre relay team to a gold, led her country's silver medal team in the 4X400, and earned an individual bronze in the 200 metres. Usha's relay teams are favourites in Bangkok, as is Jyotirmoyee Sikdar in the women's 800 and 1,500. Bahadur Singh and Shakti Singh in the men's shot put and Neelam Singh in the women's discus.

In billiards and snooker, India's team is led by two world champions, Manoj Kothari and Geet Sethi, who are expected to

win gold.

Gold seemed assured for India in kabaddi, a game that is virtually unknown outside South Asia. The game resembles team tag, with a twist that requires feats of lung power. When a player is in the opponents' zone, he has to hop continuously on one leg while chanting "kabaddi," a nonsense word.

India took the kabaddi gold in 1994, with neighbors Pakistan and Nepal finishing second and third.

The private Hinduja Sports Foundation offered cash awards to individual athletes who earn medals at Bangkok. United News of India reported Monday. The news agency quoted foundation president OD Sharma as saying gold medalists will receive 2,000 rupees (47 dollars) a month about what a janitor in India earns for the next four years. Silver medalists will get 1,500 rupees (35 dollars) and bronze medalists 1,000 rupees (23 dollars).
