

Silent tribute across Spain

SEVILLE, Dec 13 (AP/Reuters): Benito Villamarin Stadium fell silent for a minute Saturday, a silent tribute to a soccer fan fatally stabbed earlier in the week prior to a UEFA Cup match.

The moment of silence, which preceded the 0-0 draw between Betis and Atletico Madrid, was to be observed at the remainder of the nine first Division matches this weekend.

Zabaleta, a supporter of Real Sociedad, was attacked Tuesday outside Atletico Madrid's Vicente Calderin Stadium during Sociedad's UEFA Cup game.

Police have arrested three alleged soccer hooligans and are looking for several others. Newspapers say they all belong to a neo-fascist splinter group of a mainstream fan club called the Atletico Front.

Zabaleta was stabbed in the chest as his girlfriend looked on. He died in hospital after undergoing emergency surgery.

Real Sociedad return to the Spanish capital on Sunday to play Real Madrid, and all Sociedad players were to wear special jerseys with Zabaleta's name on the back.

In Seville on Saturday, Atletico played without strikers Kiko Narvaez, Osvaldo Giroldo and Juninho, as well as midfielder Vladimir Jugovic, all out because of injury.

Betis' best chance to score came in the 12th minute when Atletico's Michele Serena was called for a handball, but goalkeeper Jose Francisco Molina saved the penalty by Brazilian midfielder Denilson.

The world's most expensive player, who cost the club 35 million dollars, has yet to score this season and was starting for Betis for the first time in three weeks after last month being relegated to the substitutes' bench by coach Javier Clemente.

The goalless draw meant that Clemente's flawless home record came to an end.

Betis' keeper Antonio Prats was nearly equal with a stop on Jose Mari Romer in the 43rd minute.

Atletico came out stronger in the second half but Prats again stopped promising shots from Antonio Munoz and Romer. In the 53rd minute, Prats stopped Zoran Njegus after a cross from Romer.

Prats was later forced out of the game with a leg injury after following another chance by Juan Carlos Valeron.

The scoreless draw left Atletico in fourth place with 22 points, and Betis in 11th with 18.

In Sunday's games, besides the Sociedad-Real Madrid contest, Barcelona play at home against Villarreal, Mallorca play against Zaragoza, Deportivo la Coruna and Athletic Bilbao, Celta play Espanyol, Valencia welcome struggling Salamanca, Valladolid host Alaves, Racing Santander take on Tenerife and last-placed Extremadura host Oviedo.

Presidents Cup Int'l team's

MELBOURNE, Dec 13 (AP): Nobody wanted another War on the Shore. Nobody expected a massacre in Melbourne.

A hungry and relentless international team made short work of the United States on a rainy Sunday at Royal Melbourne Golf Club, winning the first two singles matches to clinch its first Presidents Cup and the first one played outside the US.

Quarterfinals start today

BANGKOK, Dec 13: Eight teams drag weary legs and tired minds onto the field tomorrow for the quarterfinals of the Asian Games soccer tournament, half of them just 48 hours after playing their fourth game in nine days, reports Reuters.

The other four South Korea, Kuwait, Turkmenistan and defending champions Uzbekistan — will have three days rest and the extra day could prove crucial in the battle for gold.

Hosts Thailand, China, favourites Iran and Qatar all played their last second round matches on Saturday and all had to throw everything they had into the quest for a quarterfinal place.

Frenchman Philippe Troussier coach of a young Japan team which went out in the second round said a third day of rest made all the difference in such an intense competition.

"If we had one day more to recuperate I think the recovery and attitude of the players would be totally different," he said after the jaded World Cup 2002 co-host slotted out of the competition.

Other coaches also criticised the onerous schedule. "At the World Cup you have mature players but nobody asks them to play their many game in such a short time," said Carlos Quieroz, the Portuguese coach of the United Arab Emirates.

Another side which went out in the second round. "The Asian Games is one of those tournament where coaches bring a lot of young players and this schedule, physiologically, is too much for

them," he said. On the positive side for coaches it is an opportunity to put players into a high level tournament and teach them to rebound from the physical effort and to rebound mentally from a defeat.

None of the teams got to the quarterfinals unbeaten but in the side expected to play in the 2002 World Cup finals, opened their Asian Games campaign in miserable fashion with a 3-2 defeat by Turkmenistan in their first game.

But they recovered well and were the only unbeaten side in the second round. Tomorrow they meet hosts Thailand who scrapped through to the quarterfinals by the narrowest of goal difference margins after losing to Qatar 2-1 on Saturday.

The Thais will be tired but there will be 60,000 passionate fans in Rajamangala Stadium to give them a lift.

China and Iran, largely young side with a backbone of veterans including four who play in Europe take on Turkmenistan, who have not really impressed since their first round defeat of the South Koreans.

If China and Iran do win their quarterfinals which they should, they would meet again in the semifinals, and China's English coach Bob Houghton is relishing the prospect.

"I'm looking forward to it," he said after his side went down 2-1 to Iran on Saturday. "You are making a big error if you think that because we lost today we will lose the next one."

Gulf champions Kuwait are another side with a lot to prove after moving up the favourites list early in the tournament with some impressive performances despite Czech coach Milan Macala's protestations that they were not yet a good side.

They ended up with only one win in the second round but edged out Japan on goal difference, thanks to a 5-0 thrashing of the UAE.

They take on Qatar in the quarterfinals, a game they should win.

til May, he has been closely involved in the bidding process for successive Winter Games.

United thought they had done enough for victory but seconds before the final whistle Campbell popped up again to plant another header past Peter Schmeichel.

Elsewhere Middlesbrough moved up into fourth place with a 1-0 victory over West Ham.

With Paul Gascoigne buzzing, Boro thoroughly deserved their lead when Brian Deane scored off an Andy Townsend corner in the 40th minute.

West Ham fought back well and were unlucky not to gain the draw when John Hartson clattered the ball against the bar.

Afro-Asia call for IOC probe

BANGKOK, Dec 13 (Reuters/Internet): African and Asian sports chiefs said on Sunday the International Olympic Committee should investigate sensational allegations that cities bidding to be Olympic hosts had bought the votes of its members.

But the head of the Olympic Council of Asia attacked senior IOC member Marc Hodler for making the allegations — and said Hodler was only doing so because he was due to retire soon.

"Would he have said that if he was still on the IOC?" said Sheikh Ahmad al-Saber, IOC vice president.

Hodler created uproar on Saturday when he said potential Olympic hosts were routinely offered blocs of IOC votes in return for millions of dollars.

Hodler, an IOC member for 25 years, said Africans were the worst offenders and their bloc vote could be decisive for an Olympic candidate.

"I've never been approached by anyone," Taiwanese IOC member Wu Ching-kuo told the news agency. "This is the first I've heard about it and it comes as quite a shock."

Romeo Ribano, secretary-general of the Philippines Olympic committee, said: "They should really look into this because the integrity of the IOC is at stake."

World amateur boxing supremo Anwar Chowdhry of Pakistan said the cash-for-vote allegations were not new, but Hodler's position and experience meant they should now be taken seriously.

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Sam Ramsamy, a former anti-apartheid campaigner who is now South Africa's IOC member, said the IOC needed evidence to back up Hodler's allegations.

"Before we can do anything we need proof and at the moment there is no proof," said Ramsamy, who was involved in Cape Town's unsuccessful bid to host the 2004 Olympics.

Hodler's comments were so far the most serious allegation of corruption ever made publicly by an IOC member or official.

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Foster retakes title back from Popov

SHEFFIELD, England, Dec 13: Britain's Mark Foster reclaimed the world short-course men's 50 metres freestyle record from Olympic champion Alexander Popov today, reports Reuters.

Foster clocked 21.48 seconds in the morning heats on the last day of the European Short Course Championships to beat the 21.50 world mark set by Popov of Russia at a World Cup meeting in Desenzano, Italy, on March 13, 1994.

Foster had threatened the record on Saturday when he did 21.55 as lead-off swimmer for Britain in the 4x50 metres freestyle relay final.

He set a world record 21.60 in February 1993 and that time stood for 13 months before Popov beat it.

Ramzy keeps K'lautern going

BERLIN, Dec 13: FC Kaiserslautern again pulled out a dramatic victory Saturday, this time on Egyptian defender Hany Ramzy's last-gasp goal that extended a Bundesliga winning streak to seven matches, reports AP.

Ramzy's 90th-minute goal, one of countless for the Red Devils this season, allowed Kaiserslautern to creep within two points of Bundesliga front-runners Bayer Leverkusen and Bayern Munich.

The two top teams face off Sunday.

Kaiserslautern, a master of winning ugly, this time seemed to have complete control of Eintracht Frankfurt in a stellar performance that could have been a rout.

But after Damir Stojak stunned the side by heading in an equaliser in the 74th minute, Kaiserslautern again had to scramble and rely on last-minute heroics.

Ramzy, an oft-criticised player, snuck unnoticed down the sideline in the waning seconds. Before the Frankfurt players woke up, he sent the gamewinner flying into the net on one fluid kick off a long pass.

"I'm speechless," said Frankfurt interim trainer Bernhard Lippert. "We fought and played so hard in the second half."

Kaiserslautern rivals 1860 Munich, didn't fare as well as the side left Schalke roar back from 0-2 down to salvage a 2-2 draw on a last-minute own goal.

The result allowed the Red Devils to charge past them in the table to third.

Michael Ballack, a rising star, shot Kaiserslautern into the lead in the fourth minute. He stole the ball from a defender, faked past two more Frankfurt players then capped his performance by tunneling the goalie.

The amazing run of Kaiserslautern, whose player potential seems unequal to its on-field success, continued with Ramzy's goal.

The Red Devils burst from the second Division last season to steal away the Bundesliga title. This season, to most Germans' amazement, the south German side stroled into the Champions League quarterfinals.

Since Swiss midfielder Ciriacu Sforza dropped back to libero to shore up a shaky defence, Kaiserslautern have been unbeatable: 10 wins and a draw in league and international play.

In other matches, Wolfsburg beat Duisburg 4-2, Werder Bremen and VfB Stuttgart drew 2-2. Rostock beat Bochum 3-0 for a badly-needed win and Freiburg edged Nuremberg 1-0.

On Friday, Hertha Berlin won their third straight with a 4-0 blasting of Hamburg and Borussia Dortmund's rise to the top stalled again with a 1-1 draw against Moenchengladbach.

Schalke's prowess has returned as players come back from injury, including UEFA Cup hero Marc Wilmots.

Sino spikers down Japan

BANGKOK, Dec 13: China blew Taiwan off the court in straight sets Sunday to reach the final of the Asian Games men's volleyball, while South Korea's superior blocking overcame Japan for the other spot, reports AP.

The Chinese women, who finished second in the World Volleyball Championships in Japan last month, were later undertaking a similar demolition of host Thailand, whose young team battled bravely against opponents on average a full head taller than they were.
