100 JU teachers for 10-yr ban on student politics

Some 100 teachers of Jatiya Jangirnagar University (JU) have expressed solidarity with the President's recent call for a 10-year moratorium on student politics, which press release said.

The teachers in a statement yesterday said, "student politics in recent times has retracted from its glorious past. Student activists as supporters of political parties are not following a healthy course," the statement said. "We do not differ with campus or institution oriented student politics," they said.

The teachers also urged all to take effective measures for implementation of the President's suggestions regarding student politics, the release said.

Suu Kyi will resist move to deport her

YANGON, Dec 26: Nobel Peace Prize-winner Aung San Suu Kyi has told members of her party that she won't allow Myanmar's military regime to deport her, reports AP.

The opposition National League for Democracy said in a statement obtained today that Suu Kyi told members last week not to worry about rumours that she would be deported after the New Year.

Party members should not be worried of my deportation, Suu Kyi said. "I am not a citizen of other countries and I have no intention of leaving this country."

Suu Kyi is married to a British academic, Michael Aris. The government often refers to her a spy and puppet of foreign nations, particularly former colonial ruler Britain and the United States.

I am not a British citizen and my conscience is clear, said Suu Kyi. "How can a government deport its citizen if there is no country to accept him or her?"

Hartal threat worries FBCCI

## 'Open land routes with bordering Indian states'

The country's business people yesterday voiced the need for opening land routes with bordering Indian states at several points to boost bilateral trade, reports UNB.

Besides the proposed Dhaka-Calcutta bus route, such links can also be established with Agartala (Tripura), Guahati (Assam), Darjeeling (West Bengal) and Shillong (Meghalaya), they suggested while exchanging views at the FBCCI conference hall.

Some of them also spoke about establishing Dhaka-Agartala and Dhaka-Guahati airlinks to facilitate smooth and frequent travel of businessmen to explore trade opportunities.

The representatives of different chambers and trade associations from across the country were summoned by the apex trade body — Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) — to speak on the economic situation and the role of FBCCI.

Painting a grim picture of the country's post-flood economy, some chamber and trade body representatives said the country's economy was showing a downturn, and both trade and industry have a sluggish performance.

They also criticised the government and the banks for not extending adequate support to the small industries, worst hit by the recent flood, to overcome the damage.

They felt that the FBCCI, as the 'main parliament' of the business community, could play a more effective role to

again hit the country's 'weakening economy.'

The Opposition should seek other ways to settle their differences with the government or share the business losses caused by hartals, some of them advised.

FBCCI president Abdul Awal Minto presided over the function, also attended by Metropolitan Chamber president Laila Rahman Kabir and Foreign Investors Chamber of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) president AKM Shamsuddin.

He said many existing industries are facing closure due to lack of credit expansion and working capital support from banks.

Instead of extending help to the small industries to recover from the flood damages, the government rather increased duties which will further shrink the business and industrial ventures, Rouf Chowdhury feared.

A trade association leader, Nazrul Islam, pointed to the higher interest rates on bank loans which, he said, was caused by huge defaulting loans.

Small scale genuine borrowers are bearing the cost by paying higher interests, he said.

Nazrul Islam hoped that bilateral trade would increase of road and air links could be established with Guahati, Shillong.

### Another shameful event in our sordid politics

Once again we have lowered ourselves in our own eyes. A politician of dubious distinction is the centrepiece in a tug of war between our two leading parties. What is the worth of politicians like M.A. Khaleque?

For some one who has been in all parties that formed governments in independent Bangladesh, what better term can there be than "shameless opportunist"? Haven't the "Khaleques" in our politics destroyed whatever honesty, ethics and credibility that remained in it in spite of years of military and autocratic rule? Haven't they, through their ready collaboration with whichever party came to power, regardless of the means by which it came to power, given politics and the politicians a bad name and an image that has all but destroyed public confidence in our elected leaders?

For good twenty-one years the Awami League was out of power. Therefore it was free from such practices and clearly not guilty of indulging in this type of sordid politics. But coming to power after two decades, AL appears to be in a hurry to

make up for all the corrupt policies that it failed to indulge in during all these years in wilderness. Recall the "bribing" of two BNP MPs into the ruling party camp with two junior ministerships.

We would like to raise three questions in this commentary. First, what is the future of our democracy if this "buying and selling" of politicians becomes the practice rather than the exception, and what will be the level of our politics if the ruling party tries to allure, bribe or coerce other party leaders and MPs into joining its ranks in such a corrupt manner? Second, how could the Prime Minister allow herself to be associated with a person of such notorious background that exposed herself and her office to such a ridiculous situation? Third, what has been the role of the DGF in all this?

## JP regrouping, ready for simultaneous movement

A meeting of the Jatiya Party Presidium yesterday endorsed the idea of a simultaneous anti-government movement with the main opposition BNP and other parties, reports UNB.

The meeting at the JP Chairman's office at Baridhara with party chief HM Ershad in the chair also finalised an 8-point plan of action.

It was decided in the meeting that the party would join a simultaneous anti-government movement if BNP supports the JP's ideal of compelling the government to hold all the local government elections, including Upazila election, under a caretaker government.

The meeting emphasised on building the party's image as an opposition party among the countrymen.

The presidium members endorsed the reinstatement of Mizanur Rahman Chowdhury as the party's presidium member and also the Vice-Chairman.

The meeting also welcomed

## Bus accident kills 10 in Sirajganj

SIRAJGANJ, Dec 26: At least 10 people were killed and 75 others injured in a road accident involving three passenger buses on the Dhaka-Bogra highway in Kamarkhanda thana yesterday, reports APB.

Police and witnesses said six people died on the spot while four others succumbed to their injuries at the Sirajganj General Hospital.

Doctors feared the death toll from the accident, one of the

two Dhaka-bound passenger bus collided with a Rangpur-bound bus at a place in between Jhalawal-Bridge and Konabari at 1 pm. Moments after another Naogaon-bound bus rammed the two vehicles.

DU tense as rival groups issue threats

Tension gripped the Dhaka University campus yesterday when two rival groups of students brought out separate processions and held rallies.

One group under the banner of "Students Protesting Sexual Harassment" was demanding punishment to teachers allegedly involved in sexual harassment and the other styled "Conscious Students" was staging programmes to "protect the image of teachers".

The "Conscious Students" group announced at their rally that they would capture the Vice-chancellor's office premises today and resist their rivals' programme of burning effigies of accused teachers.

Witnesses said that the two groups were about to clash at about noon when activists of the "Conscious Students" group who were holding a rally at the Aparajeo Bangla allegedly hurled indecent remarks at a SPSH procession which was passing through the area.

The SPSH brought out a silent procession from in front of the DUCSU building wearing masks and carrying banners.

The "Conscious Students" group which appeared in the scene on Thursday gathered in the morning after parading the campus carrying placards reading "Save your varsity from NGO and Garment Workers."

Speakers at the rally alleged that the students who were staging programmes against teachers were garment workers and NGO agents. They are
