An official source said, the production target of wheat has been fixed at 42,000 tonnes.

The government has already taken all preparations to supply quality seeds, fertilisers and pesticides among the farmers at fair price to make the wheat cultivation programme a success.

## 'Policy to be formulated soon for proper land use'

A policy will soon be formulated for proper land use, planning and its management in the country, reports APB.

Agriculture Secretary Dr AMM Shahak Ali disclosed this at a national workshop on "Land Use and Land Degradation Situation in Bangladesh" at the BARC conference room in the city yesterday.

Underpinning the need for proper use, planning and management in view of increasing pressure on land, he said the proposed policy would incorporate modalities of its optimum use.

Dwelling on the relation between land use in agriculture and industry, Dr Ali said low productivity in agriculture was not only due to degradation but also due to other factors like agro-economy and the present state of lack of harmonious

balance in land distribution.

Land for housing, industry and infrastructure in the country are now experiencing conflicting use, he said and called upon the experts to find ways and means to strike a balance between agriculture and infrastructure for ensuring proper land management.

Speaking as the chief guest Agriculture and Food Advisor to the Prime Minister AM Anisuzzaman called upon the agriculturists to identify the problems and suggest appropriate measures for their solution.

He observed that there should be continuous monitoring and analysis in the field.

The advisor urged the scientists to evolve suitable strategies through agricultural extension for the benefit of the farmers.

Dr Z Karim, who presided over the closing session said, inventory for soil-testing will be carried out by the Council for analysing the nutrients and help overcome the deficiencies.

Member-Director (Soil) of BARC Dr MS Islam presented a paper on "land degradation situation and cropping pattern changes in Bangladesh". Director of Soil Resources Development Institute (SRDI) Mustafizur Rahman on "land degradation situation in Bangladesh" and National Project Director, GIS project, BARC, M Anwar Iqbal on "changes in cropping pattern in Bangladesh over the last two decades".

### Couple injured in clash over land

JHALAKATI, Dec 27: A couple was seriously injured at a village in Rajapur thana on Saturday in a clash over a disputed land, reports APB.

They were identified as Moazzam Hossain, 35, and his wife Mamata Begum, 30, of village Fuluhar.

Witnesses said Modasser, brother of Moazzam Hossain, swooped on them with *daos* and sticks over possession of a plot of disputed land.

The couple was taken to Rajapur Thana Health Complex where the condition of Mamata was stated to be critical.

### Killer elephant executed in India

NEW DELHI, Dec 27: An elephant who had rampaged through human settlements and trampled to death 19 people in the last year-and-a-half, was shot dead in northeastern India by orders of the forest department, domestic news agencies reported Sunday, reports AP.

Three hunters especially assigned to the job shot the full-grown male tusker Saturday evening in the remote Tinsukia district in Assam state, the United News of India said. The heavily forested area is 1800 kilometers (1,100 miles) east of the Indian capital, New Delhi.

The elephant, named Gobinda Singh, was declared a 'rogue' last month when he killed a forest department doctor who had tranquilized him for a medical check. The elephant suddenly regained consciousness and attacked the veterinarian.

In the past, he has also damaged crops and destroyed more than 150 huts, UNI said.

Wildlife experts say a shrinking habitat and a disproportionate rise in the number of elephants in the past 15 years have led to change in the elephants' behavior making some of them violent.

## Domestic violence on the rise in India

HYDERABAD, Dec 27: Domestic torture is on the rise in India. Apart from mother-in-law, daughter-in-law syndrome, social torture of children are seeing an upward trend, top doctors from the country have acknowledged here, reports PTI.

Participating in a special symposium on "torture and the medical profession" at the ongoing seventh National Conference of Indian Medical Association (IMA), doctors said domestic violence in various forms is increasing as more people are becoming upwardly mobile.

Though police torture hit the headlines in newspapers, in the Indian scenario, torture of daughters-in-law occupies the top slot. With financial and social pressures mounting, daughters-in-law are the biggest torturers.

While past president of IMA, Dr Parameswaran called domestic violence a serious issue that would need medical intervention, Dr A K Chary from Andhra Pradesh termed the issue as a national problem.

Chary also focussed his attention on children being "tortured" at schools to perform better and sometimes even to "outperform" others. Such types of violence need social intervention, he said.

### Two rebel spies burnt alive in Sierra Leone

FREETOWN, Sierra Leone, Dec 27: Fearing an impending rebel assault on Sierra Leone's capital, angry residents surged through the streets and burned alive at least two men accused of being rebel spies, reports AP.

The rebel Revolutionary United Front, meanwhile, reported Saturday that it had killed 60 Nigerian soldiers from a West African intervention force while capturing the town of Makeni, 96 kms east of the capital, Freetown.

Fighting has intensified in recent weeks in the West African nation, settled two centuries ago by freed slaves from the United States. Britain and Jamaica. It has a population of 4.7 million.

The rebels, who controlled Freetown after a bloody May

coup, are seeking revenge for their ouster from the capital in February by the Nigerian-led intervention force which returned President Ahmed Tejan Kabbah to power.

Rebel commander Sam Bockarie said Saturday his forces dragged the bodies of the dead Nigerian soldiers through the streets of Makeni with an armoured car "as an example to everyone."

But Kabbah's government, which has been waging war against the rebels, denied that Makeni had been captured and said the intervention force, known as ECOMOG, continued to fight for the economy.

Government troops remained firmly in control of the country, the Information Ministry said in a statement.


Matters relating to collection of films for the archives, methods of their preservation, seminars and symposiums on films and film festivals also came up for discussion in the meeting.
