

FIFA relaxes suspension

ZURICH, Jan 9: FIFA lifted the ban on the Cameroon football federation (FECAFOOT) on Friday after the country's government agreed to a new executive committee for the federation, reports AFP.

FECAFOOT's affairs will now be directed by a 12-man panel, eight of whom have been appointed by FIFA and four by the Cameroon government's ministry of youth and sports. The new panel was needed after FECAFOOT's administrative council dismissed its president Vincent Onana last year amid allegations he was involved in the trafficking of World Cup tickets allocated to the Cameroon football federation.

Liu, Waldner to fight for final berth

PARIS, Jan 9: Olympic champion Liu Guoliang of China and Sweden's world champion Jan-Ove Waldner meet in an intriguing East versus West battle in the semifinals of the ITTF pro-Tour finals here today, reports AFP.

Both, 22-year-old Liu and 33-year-old Waldner notched up quarter-final victories on Friday in table-tennis equivalent to the ATP's Tour championship finals in tennis.

The 220,000-dollar competition is not as big as a World Championships or World Cup — but it is not far behind, grouping the best 16 men and women players from 11 international tournaments between February and November last year.

Waldner, who beat 1994 European champion Jean-Michel Saive of Belgium 21-15, 15-21, 14-21, 21-17, relished the chance to play Liu.

Liu, oozing confidence, threatened world number 17 Patrick Chilla of France 21-10, 21-19, 21-13.

In the other semi-final, world number-three from China Kong Linghui, who beat compatriot and world number-nine Yan Sen 21-16, 19-21, 21-14, 21-9, faces compatriot Wang Ligin. Ligin was a 17-21, 21-17, 16-21, 21-13, 21-12 winner against Ma Lin.

In the women's event, an all-Chinese semi-final line-up is in place today through Croatia's Tamara Bos, the only non-Chinese in the last eight, lost narrowly.

Brazil beat Colombia

TANDIL, Argentina, Jan 9: Brazil with goals by Matuzalem, Rodrigo Gal and Ronaldo Rodrigo defeated Colombia 3-1 Friday and now head Group B in the first round of the South American U20 soccer tournament, reports AP.

Mauricio Molina scored for Colombia in the 90th.

Also Friday, Paraguay defeated Bolivia 2-1 with second-half goals by Roque Santa Cruz and Francisco Escobar, overturning an early deficit from a goal by Ronald Garcia.

Bolivia's Marco Melgar and Paraguay's Diego Gavilan were red-carded for rough play five minutes before the end of the match.

Brazil have 6 points, Paraguay and Uruguay 3, Colombia and Bolivia none.

In Group A, defending champions Argentina have 6 points, Chile and Peru 3, Venezuela and Ecuador 0.

The first three from each group will play a round robin final round for 4 berths in the World Youth Championship scheduled for April in Nigeria.

The tournament will continue on Sunday with Bolivia vs Uruguay and Brazil vs Paraguay.

Fiorentina face Lazio test

ROME, Jan 9 (Reuters/Internet): Serie A leaders Fiorentina take on in-form Lazio in Rome on Sunday.

Fiorentina's experienced coach Giovanni Trapattoni, a key figure in the club's successful run, agrees with Vieri's expectations of an open game.

"For us, this is clearly another big test," he said. "You lot all say that Lazio absolutely have to win. That's true but so do we."

"We always go out to win, we never hold back... and against Lazio we won't be changing that attitude."

Lazio will be without Czech midfielder Pavel Nedved and Croat striker Alen Boksic, both injured, but will still field a classy side led by Roberto Mancini, Marcello Salas and Vieri in attack.

Yugoslav Dejan Stankovic, Argentine Matias Almeyda and Portugal's Sergio Conceicao support playmaker Mancini in midfield while Alessandro Nesta and Yugoslav Sinisa Mihajlovic marshal the Lazio defence.

Fiorentina are without two suspended first choice midfielders in German Jörg Hirth and Christian Amoroso. They will be replaced by Stefano Tarozzi and Giulio Falcone respectively.

Despite the absences, Fiorentina field a strong side led by the imposing attack of Brazilian Edmundo, Argentine captain Gabriel Batistuta and Belgian Luis Oliveira, with Portuguese midfielder Rui Costa in the playmaker role.

CAGLIARI (12) V AS ROMA (5): Cagliari without defender Gianluca Grassadonia and midfielder Tiziano De Patre, both suspended. Roma missing suspended midfielder Eusebio Di Francesco and injured Brazilian right back Casali.

EMPOLI (15) V AC MILAN (4): Empoli at full strength. Milan without suspended Liberian striker George Weah but Croat midfielder Zvonimir Boban returns.

INTER MILAN (6) V VENEZIA (18): Inter may field three-man attack with Roberto Baggio playing behind Brazilian Ronaldo and Chilean Ivan Zamorano. Captain and defender Giuseppe Bergomi suspended. Bottom side Venezia without suspended Brazilian defender Bilica and injured German midfielder Gerhard Poschener.

JUVENTUS (7) V BARI (9): Juventus prospects not helped by the suspensions of French midfielder Didier Deschamps and Uruguayan defender Paolo Montero. Bari at full strength.

PERUGIA (10) V UDINESE (11): Perugia still without Uruguayan defender Martin Rivarola, midfielder Pietro Strada and defender Gianluca Colonello, all injured. Udinese at full strength.

PIACENZA (13) V PARMA (2): Full strength Parma must win to maintain their championship challenge. Piacenza missing defenders Gian Paolo Manigheiti, suspended, and Stefano Sacchetti, injured.

SAMPDORIA (14) V BOLOGNA (9): English midfielder Lee Sharpe, currently recovering from influenza, expected to make his debut for Sampdoria. Striker Vincenzo Montella returns in attack, having come on as a second half substitute in Wednesday's defeat by Fiorentina. Missing key players are Yugoslav defender Nenad Sakic, defender Moreno Mammì and Yugoslav striker Zoran Jovicic, all injured. Argentine Ariel Ortega suspended.

Bologna without four injured players in defenders Michele Parmatti and Giovanni Bia, Brazilian midfielder Eriberto and winger Carlo Nervo.

VICENZA (16) V SALERNITANA (17): Vicenza without midfielder Lamberto Zauli and Colombian striker Marcelo Otero, both suspended. Salernitana have defender Luca Fusco suspended.

Pierce stoops to Schnyder

GOLD COAST, Australia, Jan 9: Switzerland's Patty Schnyder defeated top seed Mary Pierce of France in three sets Saturday to win the Australian women's hardcourt tennis championship, reports AP.

The Swiss second seed defeated Pierce 4-6, 7-6 (7-5), 6-2 for her second women's Tennis Association victory in Australia, having won the Hobart International last year.

The win at the Hope Island Tennis Club was Schnyder's first in four attempts against the World No 7 and should move the 20-year-old from a world ranking of 11 at the end of 1998 to eight.

In the final set Pierce appeared to run out of steam and Schnyder broke twice to win the match.

Pierce will have a week off before the Australian Open in Melbourne while Schnyder will play at the Adidas International in Sydney beginning next week.

Enqvist, Hewitt in final

ADELAIDE, Jan 9: Swede Thomas Enqvist put last year's injury-plagued season behind him to earn a berth in the Australian Open hardcourt tennis final by defeating Australian Scott Draper on Saturday, reports AP.

Enqvist, who took a break for three months last year after undergoing ankle surgery, comprehensively outplayed Draper, delivering three of his 12 aces in his final service game to claim the match 6-3, 7-5.

Enqvist will play defending champion Lleyton Hewitt of Australia in Sunday's final following Hewitt's 6-1, 6-3 win over countryman Jason Stoltenberg in the other semi-final Saturday.

"You don't like losing but Thomas served bombs today," Draper said. "I played OK today, but he was just too good on the day."

Bayern craving for Beckham touch

BONN, Jan 9 (Reuters/Internet): German soccer heavyweights Bayern Munich want to buy a player of the stature of Manchester United's David Beckham for next season, vice-president Karl-Heinz Rummenigge was quoted as saying on Saturday.

"We are ready for a real top guy like David Beckham," Rummenigge told local newspaper Muenchner Merkur. "We are already looking for such a superstar, who would also have to be a great entertainer."

Asked how many reinforcements Bayern were looking for, he said: "Three would do."

Venus grabs Challenge Cup

HONG KONG, Jan 9: Former World champion Steffi Graf dropped out of her Super-Power Challenge Cup final Saturday against American teenager Venus Williams in the first set after becoming ill, reports AP.

The 29-year-old Graf, who was plagued by injuries last year, was said to be suffering from an upset stomach.

The German, who has won 21 Grand Slam titles in her career, had managed to battle to a 2-2 tie in the first set before retiring at the Victoria Park tennis court.

She had advanced, to the final with a 6-2, 7-6 (7-4) victory over Serena Williams — Venus' sister.

Venus, ranked 5th in the world, defeated Anna Kournikova of Russia 6-4, 6-3 in the semifinals on Friday.

All four players were using the three-day Hong Kong tournament as a warm-up for the Australian Open, which begins Jan 18.

Hosts lift Hopman Cup

PERTH, Jan 9: Australia defeated Sweden to win the Hopman Cup for the first time in the mixed teams tournament's 11-year history on Saturday, reports AP.

Tenage phenomenon Jelena Dokic, the 15-year-old world junior champion, continued her string of upsets when she beat Asa Carlsson 6-2, 7-6 (10-8), and Mark Philippoussis clinched Australia's victory with a 6-3, 7-6 (8-6) win over Jonas Bjorkman.

Dokic, ranked 341, added Carlsson to a list of victims that included Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario and Sandrine Testud.

Carlsson, ranked 92, was unable to outclass her rival in the fierce baseline rallies. Dokic often increased the pace and caught Carlsson off guard, and she also kept the Swede under pressure with an exceptional forehand and driving double-handed backhand.

But with Bjorkman leading 5-2 and a third set looking a certainty, the Swede's own serve

When Carlsson became more aggressive and forced her way back into contention, recovering from 1-4 in the second set, Dokic remained composed and held three match points at 5-3.

Although Carlsson survived then, Dokic finally claimed victory in the tiebreak on her seventh match point.

"It's probably the greatest day of my life," said Dokic. "I've never won something this big before and it gives me great confidence. We weren't expected to win coming into the tournament, but I've played some great tennis and got through."

Philippoussis also survived a second-set challenge after a single break of serve for 4-2 gave him the first. Bjorkman had seen four break points in the first set come to nothing, but when Philippoussis double-faulted he finally broke on his sixth opportunity to lead 3-1 in the second set.

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began to falter. Two double-faults in the ninth game allowed Philippoussis to break back to 4-5, and he survived a second crisis in the tiebreak, recovering from 0-4 to give Australia victory.

"I hit a double fault to lose my service game in the second set, and he hit a couple of double-faults to let me back into it," said Philippoussis. "In the tiebreaker he played some good points to be up, and I just put my head down and tried to get back a point here and there."

Dokic will be restricted by WTA tour rules to the number of tournaments she can play, and she believes that will hold her back as she seeks to improve her ranking.

In the dead mixed doubles, the Swedish pair made the final result 2-1 winning a single set game 6-6.
