BNP's youth leaders bicker to block new Juba Dal faces

Two top leaders of the 12year-old committee of Jatiyatabadi Juba Dal, BNP's youth front, are fighting each other, forcing an angry party chief Khaleda Zia to abandon the plan to bring new fares

Khaleda Zia had asked the two leaders -- Mirza Abbas and Goyeshwar Chandra Roy, president and general secretary respectively of the Juba Dal for more than 12 years now -- to find out a compromise formula.

But they have failed to do so. She had planned to announce the new committee by the first week of this month with a view to bringing dynamism in the youth body ahead of the city corporation elections, scheduled for some-

time in April. "The chairperson had wanted to bring major changes in Juba Dal leadership and accommodate former student

(Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal) leaders," a source close to Khaleda Zia said. "But continued grouping. lobbying and misunderstand-

ing among senior leaders have sent the plan into the cold storage," the source said. Party sources said that BNP and Juba Dal took initiatives several times in the last one

year to name a new central committee, dropping the "aged" leaders and putting younger faces in the front. Incumbent president Mirza Abbas wants to retain the top job, while general secretary

Gayeshwar Chandra Roy insists he should succeed him. "Both have remained rigid about it." the source said. Joining the fight between the

Meeting between Kalparanjan, Shantu Larma not held

By Special Correspondent A scheduled crucial meeting between Kalparanjan Chakma. Minister for CHT Affairs and Jyotirindriyo Bodhipriyo Lar-ma alias Shantu Larma, Chairman of Parbattya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS), was not held at Khagrachari yesterday.

Shantu Larma has fallen sick, sources here said. He is likely to leave for Calcutta on January 15 for treatment, the sources said.

The meeting was aimed at breaking an impasse on the functioning of the interim Regional Council (RC) and implementation of the CHT peace accord, signed in December 2.

Shantu Larma so far declined to accept the interim RC of which he was nominated Chairman by the government

in October last year. He accused the government of breaking the understanding with him on a number of issues. He also alleged that the 22member RC was announced unilaterally and refused to accept three out of six nominated members of the RC as represen-tatives of Bangalees in the CHT.

8 amendment bills to restructure varsity admn finalised

Eight amendment bills were finalised yesterday aiming at restructuring university administrations with provision for appointing one or more pro-VCs to deal with the onerous task of managing present day

campus, reports UNB. Two MPs of the opposition BNP, however, gave note of dissent on approval to the bills as the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Education adopted them in a meeting, official sources said.

The bills had been placed in Parliament earlier by Education Minister ASHK Sadeque and sent to the Standing Committee for a vetting before passage by the House.

Sources said BNP MPs Alamgir Kabir and M Moshiur Rahman opposed the amendments that enable the chancellors of the universities to ap-

point more than one pro-Vice-Chancellor for a varsity. After an elaborate discussion on the amendments, the

report on the bills was finalised. The bills, along with the report, are expected to be placed

and passed in the next session of Parliament, sources at the education ministry and parliament secretariat said. Committee chairman Nurul

Islam Nahid presided over the meeting which was attended by

members Education Minister Sadeque, Whip M Abdus Shahid, Prof M Abdul Quddus, Kazi Sirajul Islam, Rawshan Ershad, Alamgir Kabir and M Moshiur Rahman.

"It's designed to absorb partisan teachers in top rank and highly politicise the highest educational institutions of the country," Moshiur Rahman told

UNB after the meeting. He said the ruling party


couldn't provide many university teachers who are highly biased to Awami League and they would be made pro-VC if the bills are passed.


