#### USOC commends decision

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colorado, Jan 25: The president of the US Olympic Committee on Sunday praised the decision to oust six bribery-tainted International Olympic Committee members as a "good start," but warned that more will have to be done to restore credibility the celebrated Games, reports

"We think it is a good start," Bill Hybl said at the US Olympic Complex after six IOC members were essentially removed in a purge stemming from the biggest corruption scandal in the history of the Olympics.

"However, we will say there is more to be done," said Hybl. "We don't think this will be gone tomorrow."

The shake-up, Hybl said, indicates "that the International Olympic Committee is taking this very seriously."

He said he was satisfied that the IOC and Samaranch "have done a very good job in moving the process forward." But Hybl said the moves are

only the first of several steps that the IOC will take. "It will certainly take substantial change to restore con-

fidence and credibility" to the Olympics, he said. "When they go to their March meeting they will be addressing

a whole series of issues. A series of issues that can make the Olympic Movement stronger," said Hybl, who applauded a proposal that more athletes participate in the decisionmaking process in the IOC. Hybl acknowledged that US

Olympic Committee should shoulder some of the blame for the Salt Lake City scandal and said he, too, would take steps to avoid similar embarrassments in the future. "We look back and ask,

'should we have been better detectives? Should we have done a better job at oversight of Salt Lake City?' The answer is yes, you can always do a better job," he said.

"But I can assure you in the future we're going to do a better job," he said. "The presence of the USOC should be to insure that these types of practices don't go on with the bidding cities. We need to make sure it is a level playing field."

KAMPALA, Jan 25: Uganda's International Olympic Committee (IOC) representative Major General Francis Nyangweso. has denied allegations that Uganda accepted a 31,000 dollars inducement to vote for Australia to host the year 2000 Olympic Games, newspapers reported here Sunday.

"I never touched any money There was totally no money that passed under the table that I ate, but may be the bribe I took was having a dinner with the organisers Nyangweso, who is also Uganda's Olympic Committee president told the independent Sunday Monitor news-

The Australian newspaper, the Sydney Morning Herald, claimed on Saturday that the Olympic committee chief in Uganda and Kenya had accepted the inducement in 1993 to help them boost their domestic programmes prior to a vote in Monte Carlo to decide the host of the 2000 Games. Australia beat its rival for

the Games the Chinese capital Beijing by two votes.

Previous confidential documents released by the Australian Olympic Committee on Saturday said that it had agreed to spend 1.2 million dollars on training and related funding for 11 African countries and that the release of much of the money was conditional on Australia winning the Olympic

Several Ugandan athletes, including boxers Abdu Tebazalwa and Vicky Byarugaba and swimming coach Abdu Kogonya, have already travelled to Australia for training.

Uganda National Sports Council chairman, AK Lutaaya, said in a report published Sunday by the state-owned New Vision newspaper that "it would be terrible if the claims were true. I am only praying it is not authentic after the spoiling of Uganda's image in the 1988 and 1996 Olympics."

In 1988, Ugandan boxing judge Bob Kasule was suspended at the Seoul Olympic Games after allegedly manipulating the results in favour of a South Korean boxer, while in 1996, heavyweight boxer Charles Kizza was arrested by US police after being found in possession of counterfeight currency.

Spiegel, reports AP. Juergen Tiedtke was his daughter's coach in former East Germany, when she was a ju-

nior athlete. He is suspected by Berlin investigators of causing bodily harm by giving anabolic


steroids to young athletes in at least six cases.

Tiedtke denied the accusations and said his athletes only took steroids for medical reasons or "as a one-time occurrence" before competitions. None of them suffered any health damage, he told Spiegel.

His daughter was instructed to take steroids by the East German federation before the Junior World Championship in 1988. She refused and stopped competing, only resuming her career after the fall of the Berlin Wall, Tiedtke told Spiegel.


