

More attack on Blatter's plans

CAPE TOWN, Jan 27 (Reuters/Internet): UEFA fired another broadside in the direction of FIFA president Sepp Blatter on Wednesday, denouncing his plans to hold the World Cup every two years.

After formally rejecting the proposal on Tuesday at their executive committee meeting in Cape Town, UEFA said on Wednesday that it was unfortunate that Blatter had first revealed details of his proposals in the media.

The way the subject was introduced was not fortunate. It put members of the FIFA executive committee in an embarrassing situation," said UEFA general secretary Gerhard Aigner.

On Tuesday the UEFA committee, meeting in South Africa ahead of the Meridian Cup youth tournament, agreed unanimously that the proposal "had no positive elements for European football nor football in general nor the World Cup".

"It is obvious that it would serve only to devalue the World Cup," Aigner said.

UEFA and their African counterparts will discuss the Blatter plan on Thursday but both said it would be an informal meeting and no statement would be made after the meeting in Cape Town.

"We will be talking to each other about our position on this project but we really don't know much about it because much of it is just speculation," said Aigner.

The Confederation of African Football said they would release a statement on their position after a meeting in Abidjan on February 8.

"That is when we are going to discuss the matter at our executive committee meeting," said secretary-general Mustapha Fahmy.

UEFA are also to invite Blatter to a meeting to discuss his proposal but no date has yet been set.

Two-referee experiment?

CAPE TOWN, Jan 27 (Reuters/Internet): UEFA said on Wednesday it would start experimenting with two referees controlling matches if the International Board, soccer's law-making body, approves the idea at its annual meeting next month.

In a statement on Wednesday, UEFA said that if the Board give the go-ahead at its meeting in Cardiff on February 20, trials could start in Europe almost immediately.

"Without going into technical details, the move is in accordance with UEFA's philosophy of trying to optimise the use of human resources before even considering the introduction of technology," UEFA said.


Referees have come under increasing pressure in the last few seasons.

Conflicting official messages from FIFA throughout last summer's World Cup finals contributed to erratic officiating which led to a record number of both red and yellow cards.

Although experiments have been held with two referees before -- official trials were staged in England as long ago as 1935 -- the idea has never taken root.

In other matters, UEFA decided that Bosnia would be aided by the Eastern European Assistance programme, becoming the 13th nation in east Europe to benefit from the project.

It also confirmed that in 2000 Israel will stage the finals of the European Under-16 championship while in 2002 Denmark will host the finals of the European Under-16 championship and Norway will host the Under-18 finals. Portugal will host the Under-16 championships in 2003.

Yevgeny, Tommy in semis

MELBOURNE, Jan 27: Russian 10th seed Yevgeny Kafelnikov blasted his way into the Australian Open semifinals here today with a straight sets win over American 15th seed Todd Martin, reports AFP.

The 1996 French Open champion won 6-2, 7-6, 6-2 in the 47 min and now plays unseeded German Tommy Haas in Friday's semifinal.

Haas will be dining at his lucky restaurant again today after reaching his first-ever Grand Slam semifinal.

The German world No 33 repulsed American world No 44 Vince Spadea 7-6, 7-5, 6-3 in two hours 15 minutes in an all-unseeded quarterfinal.

The 20-year-old German, who has been coached by American guru Nick Bollettieri in Florida since 1989, has had a smooth path to the last four, having faced only one player ranked in the top-50 in Spadea.

"The tournament's not over yet," he said after disposing of Spadea, the fourth round conqueror of Andre Agassi.

"I'm not trying to think about what I did today, I'm now concentrating on my next match and my first Grand Slam

semifinal," he said. "I have had dinner at Planet Hollywood every night after my wins and I'll be going there tonight," Haas told a press conference.

Haas said he played the big points well against Spadea and capitalised on a tight opening set tie-breaker, which Spadea said was the pivotal set of the match.

Kafelnikov said he would never have a better chance to win another Grand Slam than at this Australian Open.

"It is difficult to realise that none of the seeded players are left in the tournament and I am the only one to have won a Grand Slam, so that will help me definitely," said Kafelnikov.

"Three times here before I have been beaten by the eventual champion, Pete Sampras in 1994, Andre Agassi in '95 and Boris Becker in '96."

Both players have had some tough matches and Kafelnikov said he knew Martin was tired.

"I knew I had to stay there with Todd, he has had a lot of time on court and he gave me a lot of easy points," said Kafelnikov.

"I'm really satisfied with my performance on my serve. That was the key, without a serve you cannot win matches or tournaments."

"I feel confident when I am serving but also confident on my returns. I'm combining both, that's why I'm into the semifinals."

Martin said if he had played to his potential he could have won.

"I thought I would have enough to serve it out," he said, adding that he was carrying a painful abdominal injury.

"He was the last guy I wanted to play in the quarterfinals."

"He can control points. With Yevgeny even if I hit the ball well and deep he still seems able to move me around the court."

"That's an awesome skill he has."

Meanwhile, Ecuador's hot new star, Nicolas Lapentti, said he was exhausted after playing 25 sets in five matches, but fired up for a semifinal showdown with Sweden's Thomas Enqvist.

"Against Thomas it's going to be a tough match," he said. "He's playing great tennis. He's got a lot of confidence but I have a lot also. I'm playing the best tennis I've ever played."

The 22-year-old, ranked 91 in the world, came through a quarterfinal against Jonas Bjorkman and Patrick Rafter on Wednesday.

"I'm just very exhausted," Lapentti said. "I went to a doctor and was examined and we agreed I shouldn't play the doubles."

He finished his quarterfinal in the early hours of Wednesday morning, killing off No. 7 seed Karol Kucera in five sets.

"I was so tired I couldn't get to sleep at all for about five hours," Lapentti said Wednesday afternoon. He has spent 13 hours 8 minutes in the singles draw.

He said Brazilian Kuerten was supportive of his decision.

Anna, Martina in doubles' final

MELBOURNE, Jan 27: Crowd pleasures Anna Kournikova and Martina Hingis were pushed to the edge today but rallied to book their place in the Australian Open doubles final, reports AFP.

The Court One darlings were delayed one-and-a-half hour by No 2 seeds Lisa Raymond and Rennae Stubbs before winning 6-3, 5-7, 6-4.

It was a sweet triumph for 17-year-old Kournikova who will appear in a Grand Slam final for the first time.

She has previously partnered Monica Seles, Arantxa Sanchez Vicario and Larisa Neiland, but in Hingis, a close friend, has developed a better all-round game.

After her well publicised double fault problem, the Russian star seems to have conquered the yips, serving just three to Hingis' one. She scored a respectable 71 per cent success rate on her first serve, equal to her Swiss partner.

The dynamic third seeds rattled off the first set in 26 minutes but a lightbulb by the American/Australian pairing tested their nerve in a gripping second set before a see-sawing third which included seven service breaks.

Hingis and Kournikova will play either the unseeded Williams sisters Venus and Serena or No 1 seeds Lindsay Davenport and Natasha Zvereva.

Lapentti drops out of doubles

MELBOURNE, Jan 27: Australian Open singles semifinalist Nicolas Lapentti withdrew from his doubles commitments Wednesday to rest for his match against Sweden's Thomas Enqvist, reports AP.

No. 91-ranked Lapentti, of Ecuador, has played one four-set and four five-setters in reaching the semis and decided he was too exhausted to team up with former French Open champion Gustavo Kuerten.

The pair were due to play a quarterfinal against Jonas Bjorkman and Patrick Rafter on Wednesday.

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Mukora quits IOC

NAIROBI, Jan 27 (Reuters/Internet): Kenya's Charles Mukora said on Wednesday that he was resigning from the International Olympic Committee (IOC) after a bribery scandal, but denied any wrongdoing.

"You know how decisions are made in clubs. When any rules are broken, big or small, it is likely that the sword will fall on you," Mukora told a news conference in the Kenyan capital.

"I am a victim of circumstances. I have never been party to any improper activities in my 40 years in sports."

Mukora admitted that he had received some money from Salt Lake City to fund his high altitude training camp at the Kenyan town of Nyahururu, at the foot of Mount Kenya.

Seles, Hingis in last four

MELBOURNE, Jan 27 (AP): All the traits that made Monica Seles a great champion -- the shrill grunts, the staunch groundstrokes, the

stubborn, gritty refusal to lose -- were back in her romp over long-time nemesis Stef Graf.

The duel of four-time Australian Open champions Wednesday dissolved into a one-sided affair as Graf's

Seles asserted her baseline superiority to keep her record Down Under unblemished at 33-0 with a 7-5, 6-1 victory.

"Steffi has been playing some awesome tennis. It was just do or die," said Seles, but stayed home the past two years, Seles, out of action from April 1993 to August 1995 as she recovered from the stabbing in Germany, is one victory away from her first Grand Slam final since last year's French Open.

Two-time defending champion Martina Hingis, playing with uncanny anticipation, also surged into the semifinals for a matchup against Seles in an unprecedented parade of Grand Slam champs.

Hingis, who topped the Australian and third in the world against former champion Mary Pierce with a 6-3, 6-4 rout Wednesday that showed off her talent for guessing where an opponent is going to hit before the ball is struck.

Broken in the first game, Seles trailed 5-4 with Graf serving for the first set when the 29-year-old German's serve began to wilt in the warm sun. Graf double faulted and was broken at 15-40 when she netted a backhand.

That started a run of eight straight games for Seles, who was given a gift of a double fault by Graf on set point in the first set.

"Obviously I got tight and nervous," said Graf, who missed most of 1997 and 1998 with injuries and illnesses. "I don't know why I couldn't turn it around anymore. I was throwing balls all over."

Graf said she was dictating points early in the match, but acknowledged she "couldn't concentrate anymore" in the second set.

"I had a very slow start today," said the 25-year-old Seles, who is now 9-5 against Graf. Steffi won't give you a free point, so I knew that even at 5-0, the match is never over against Steffi."

Graf's tally of 21 Grand Slam titles, won their last two matches in majors, both in the US Open finals in 1995 and 1996. Seles, who has won nine majors, last beat Graf in the Australian Open final in 1993.

US Open champ and top seed Lindsay Davenport earned a semifinal berth Tuesday night against former Wimbledon and French junior champion Amelie Mauresmo.

Never in women's tennis history have winners of so many Grand Slam events packed a quarterfinal lineup.

Pierce, who won the Australian in 1995 and was runner-up to Hingis in 1997, couldn't stay up with the 18-year-old Swiss teen in long rallies and couldn't overpower her with deep groundstrokes.

Pierce tried every trick she could conjure, but not much worked. And whatever Hingis attempted succeeded.

Marc Rosset, of Switzerland, led the men's best service under pressure and best overall pressure player rankings. He was steamed in straight sets by Thomas Enqvist.

No 7 Karol Kucera, of Slovakia, headed the best return under pressure and most complete player categories. He lost a five-setter against No 91-ranked Nicolas Lapentti, coming apart with a couple of lazy half-volleys at the end.

Mary Pierce was called the most complete player in the women's draw. She looked and felt terrible in a straight sets loss to Martina Hingis. Dominique Van Roost, overpowered by Amelie Mauresmo, led the best service under pressure category.

No 1 Lindsay Davenport, the overall best pressure player, turned the tide. She advanced with a win over Venus Williams.

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AUSSIE OPEN NOTEBOOK

MELBOURNE, Jan 27 (AP): Surprise semifinalist Nicolas Lapentti is having fun in the publicity fish bowl, even if it means he has to keep saying "we're just friends."

Lapentti's "relationship" with glamour women's player Anna Kournikova, has become more and more interesting the longer he's stayed on court.

The Russian teenager was in the stands for four sets of Lapentti's five-set victory over Karol Kucera, which ended in the early hours of Wednesday morning.

Television cameras showed almost as much of Kournikova watching the match as the match itself. There's Anna stretching, there's Anna shaking out her long hair, there's Anna eating an ice cream.

Lapentti said the pair have known each other for some time.

"Yeah, we're very close friends," Lapentti said Wednesday. "It was really nice that she came and watched me play last night."

He said he wanted to return the favour by watching Kournikova team with Martina Hingis in the women's doubles Wednesday but decided to give it miss to rest for his semifinal against Thomas Enqvist.

LINE CALL: Semifinal outsiders Amelie Mauresmo and Nicolas Lapentti realised there's often a fine line between success and failure.

Both the No 29-ranked Mauresmo and the No 91-ranked Lapentti were down two match points in their first round matches.

Mauresmo, who will play No 1 Lindsay Davenport in the semis, saved two in the second set of her victory over Corina Morariu of the United States.

Lapentti was behind two match points in the fourth set

of his opener against No 16 seed Thomas Johansson.

SIGN OF TROUBLE: Monica Seles wants it known that she's not too rude to sign autographs. Seles scored a straight sets win over old rival Stef Graf on Wednesday and walked off the court without accepting the pens and paper proffered from fans leaning over the walls surrounding Centre Court.

I pulled my shoulder muscle and I just don't want to go up high on it," Seles explained. "So I don't sign after my previous match and today's match, just to be safe."

GO FIGURE: So much for stats. The Australian Open's host computer company unveiled a new statistic this year, a "Pressure Player" index to gauge how the competitors cope under stress.

The latest update came before the quarterfinals, and in four of the five categories the pressure players got cooked.

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Korda bids to stop appeal in court

LONDON, Jan 27 (Reuters/Internet): Petr Korda goes to London's High Court on Thursday in an attempt to prevent tennis's ruling body challenging his lenient punishment for a positive dope test.

Korda believes his lawyers can prove that the International Tennis Federation (ITF) do not have the right to challenge a decision by their own appeals board.

The ITF believe the board misapplied anti-doping regulations in only docking Korda his ranking points and prize money in December after he had tested positive for the banned steroid nandrolone at Wimbledon last July.

The London-based ITF say that Korda, who won his first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open last year, should have received a one-year ban and plan to appeal to the International Olympic Committee.

backed Court of Arbitration for Sport.

ITF regulations, however, include a clause allowing a more lenient sentence than the mandatory one-year ban if 'exceptional circumstances' can be demonstrated.

Korda apparently satisfied the appeals board that these circumstances existed when he said he had not knowingly taken the performance-enhancing drug. But he has so far declined to explain how the substance might have got into his body.

The drug is normally injected and Korda has said he had injections to help cure a foot injury during Wimbledon.

Ironically, the ITF inserted the clause covering exceptional circumstances at the suggestion of the Court of Arbitration for Sport. But its intention was to put the burden of proof on the athlete to show how a banned substance got into his body.

Sports' ruling bodies have become increasingly nervous in recent years about imposing bans on athletes which rob them of their livelihoods.

Lengthy court cases, claims for compensation and long-term damage to the sport have often resulted.

Korda's case is a rarity in tennis which has had only a handful of positive drug tests in the past five years, none involving top players and most covering recreational drugs.

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Algeria soccer coach resigns

ALGIERS, Jan 27 (Reuters/Internet): Algerian national soccer coach Meziaine Ighil resigned on Wednesday following his team's defeat in an African Nations' Cup qualifier, state-run radio said.

Rabah Saadane had taken over as the new squad coach, it said.
