Besides, a draft agreement on operating modalities of transit cargo between Nepal and Bangladesh was approved at the Cabinet meeting.

# Cairn winding up keeping govt, Petrobangla in dark

In a clandestine deal, Cairn Plc, the British oil company that discovered and developed the country's first off-shore gas field, is winding up from Bangladesh by handing over all its responsibilities and concerns to Shell Oil, sources said. This move has been 'completed' without any prior knowledge of the government. Petrobangla, contractually the partner and regulator of Cairn, is totally unaware of this move. Cairn high officials yesterday announced to its local employees that the company would hand over all its responsibilities by June next and 'completely wind up' from Bangladesh.

"This is a gross violation of the contract between Cairn and Petrobangla," said one source. Cairn signed two Production Sharing Contracts (PSCs) with Petrobangla on blocks 16 and 15 in May '94 and early '95 respectively. Under the PSCs, Cairn had agreed to invest in Bangladesh on a 25-year term through a series of 'conditional short phases'.

A well placed source in the private oil and gas sector said that the decision for winding up apparently followed 'severe repositioning of Cairn's financial health worldwide'. The stock market position of Cairn at London Stock Exchange had plummeted to a rock bottom level.

Cairn has wrapped up in Australia, China and Bangkok in the recent times. It is now winding up from Bangladesh by selling off its blocks to Shell," said the source, adding that the company owners were, however, making high profit from such wrap-ups.

The local chiefs of Shell and Cairn could not be contacted for their comments last night. The local adviser of Cairn, when contacted, refused to say anything on the issue.

Cairn had also jointly submitted bids with Shell Oil on six blocks in the second round block bidding. Shell-Cairn was offered only one block — Block

5. Originally a small company, Cairn discovered the Sangu gasfield in Block 16 in early '96. Following the discovery, Cairn brought in two financially strong partners — Brown and Roots of USA and Shell Oil of UK-Netherlands — to develop the field.

After it started developing the gasfield early in '97, sources said that it was spending recklessly. Sangu had been one of the major investments of Cairn worldwide.

The financial crunch of Cairn began early last year when international oil price nosedived and share prices of

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# Business leaders demand Enact law to ban hartal

Top business leaders yesterday called for enacting appropriate laws in the Jatiya Sangsad to ban hartals as these are destroying the country's economy, report agencies.

They appealed to the President to take initiative to bring the government and opposition across the table to resolve the current standoff. They also discussed submission of a memorandum to the President by the business community.

They also asked the ruling and opposition parties to either resolve disputes through dialogue or compensate for the business losses.

In a closed-door meeting in the city, chamber and trade association leaders, irrespective of their political affiliation, voiced their common stand against hartal as the BNP-led opposition moved to enforce a 48-hour shutdown today.

They, however, did not announce any concrete action programme against hartal.

"The action is yet to be firm up... I'll aim at mobilising public opinions," one of the meeting sources told UNB.

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## Khaleda hints at boycotting JS session

Opposition leader Khaleda Zia yesterday gave a hint about boycott of Parliament session in course of their current movement as she saw the country's situation 'murky and anarchic,' reports UNB.

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## 5 hurt, vehicles damaged as pickets clash

At least five persons were injured in clashes during campaign for and against hartal in the city yesterday.

Besides, a number of motor vehicles were damaged in different parts of the city during the clashes.

The injured four were identified as Gaurango, 27, Shafiq, 35, Motahar, 40, and Atiqur Rahman, 22. They were admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

Our DMCH correspondent reports Gaurango and Shafiq sustained burn injuries when a number of processionists threw torpedoes inside a Kaliakair-bound minibus near the Pallan crossing at about 6 pm.

Atiqur Rahman sustained bomb injury when an pro-hartal procession confronted an anti-hartal one at a place between Pallan crossing and Zero Point at about 6:30 pm, hospital sources said.

Both the groups chased each other and blasted crackers. Police hurled a number of teargas shells to disperse the crowd.

Motahar, a hawker in Gulistan area, was injured when a bomb was hurled in the area at about 7 pm, sources said.

## Pro & anti-hartal activists clash at Natore: 25 hurt

NATORE, Feb 8: At least 25 people, including a pedestrian and a rickshawpuller were injured in a gunbattle between pro and anti-hartal activists in the town today, police and witnesses said.

According to witnesses, the clash took place when a BNP procession in support of the 48-hour countrywide hartal came under attack at Mircha crossing in the evening.

The anti-hartal activists opened fire on the procession without any provocation. Shots were also fired from the pro-hartal procession. At least 50 shots were fired during the clash, witnesses said.

Police lobbed four rounds of tear gas shells to disperse the feuding groups. However, none was arrested in this connection till filing of this report.

Md Abdul Jalil, 27, a rickshawpuller, Hanif Ali, 25, a pedestrian received bullet wounds in the encounter. They were admitted to Natore Sadar Hospital.

The other injured included Mizanur Rahman Shaheen, a Juba Dal leader. The district BNP and Awami League blamed each other for the incident.

An uneasy calm is prevailing in the town following the incident. Additional police force has been deployed at different points of the town to avoid further clash.

## Appeal to rescue 50 Bangladeshis in Malaysian jails

An appeal has been made before relevant ministries to intervene immediately in efforts to back some 50 Bangladeshis jailed in Malaysia.

Christian Commission for Development in Bangladesh (CCDB), an NGO working on the issues relating to migrant workers, sent a letter to the labour and manpower minister yesterday, a copy of which was also faxed to The Daily Star.

Copies of the letter were also sent to the Prime Minister's Office, and the ministries of foreign and home affairs.

A vernacular daily reported earlier this month that some 50 Bangladeshis were leading a sub-human life in Malaysian jails and that despite repeated call for help, it was alleged that, they did not receive any cooperation from Bangladesh High Commission in Kuala Lumpur.

# Last respect to Hussein

AMMAN, Feb 8: King Hussein of Jordan was buried today to an emotional farewell from a nation steeped in grief and from a galaxy of world leaders who came to pay homage to a pivotal force for peace in the Middle East, reports Reuters.

Hussein's body, wrapped in a white shroud according to Islamic custom, was lifted from his coffin by army officers and lowered into a grave at the Hashemite family cemetery in the grounds of Amman's main compound of royal palaces.

Abdullah, sworn in as king on Sunday some three hours after Hussein's death, stood stiff and silent, head bowed, as flagstones were laid over the grave.

Three Jordanian Air Force jets roared overhead in a parting salute to the aviator king, buglers sounded the last post and Bedouin riflemen fired a 15-gun salute.

Enmities and divisions were momentarily put aside as dignitaries from around 75 countries, some of them still at war, joined in a poignant tribute to

one of the 20th century's best-known statesmen.

Among them were a large delegation from Israel, led by President Ezer Weizman, and a mourning party from the Jewish state's Arab foe Syria, headed by President Hafez Al-Assad.

Russian President Boris Yeltsin, recovering from a bleeding ulcer, defied his doc-

tors to attend the funeral, Iraq, Libya and Sudan, all at odds with the United States and with Hussein's policies of peace with Israel, also sent delegations.

It was the biggest congregation of kings, presidents and prime ministers since the funeral in 1995 of Israel's peace-making prime minister Itzhak Rabin.

Hussein, whose reign spanned 47 turbulent years, died on Sunday of lymphatic cancer at the age of 63. He was the Middle East's longest serving leader.

His coffin, draped in the Jordanian flag, was borne to his final resting place on a gun carriage from the throne hall of the Raghadan Palace, where US President Bill Clinton, three of his predecessors and a host of national leaders paid their last respects.

In a remarkable show of solidarity, most of them walked behind the flower-decked carriage, preceded by a military drum and pipe band and an honour guard of Bedouin soldiers.

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## Hamzah named Crown Prince

AMMAN, Feb 8: King Hussein's favourite son Prince Hamzah, half-brother of the new king Abdullah, was named as Jordan's Crown Prince in a royal decree issued yesterday, reports Reuters.

Hamzah, 18, is King Hussein's fourth son. His mother, Queen Noor, is King Hussein's widow.

The decree was read out on Jordan Radio, which said the decision was taken in accordance with the late king's wishes.

## US to help set up water treatment plants using solar energy

# Misuse of funds led to stalemate at ICMAB

Misuse of students' money by the authorities and spending more on miscellaneous heads than for academic purposes have contributed to the ongoing stalemate at the Institute of Cost and Management Accountants of Bangladesh (ICMAB).

The authorities had closed the institute since die from December 31 amidst students' agitation against alleged corruption including nepotism, mis-

management and raising of the tuition and other fees.

The students demanded that the institute be reopened and a sound policy be introduced to run it.

They alleged that Tk 12 lakh was spent instead of Tk three lakh as the authorities sent a 10-member delegation to the South Asian Finance Accounts (SAFA) conference in Sri Lanka in place of a three-member

team.

The government provided ICMAB Tk 2.5 crore in fiscal 1996-97 for various projects including setting up of a modern library on the fifth floor and a modern computer laboratory on the sixth floor of the institute building.

But after completion of the project, it was found that administrative offices were shifted to the fifth floor and the

office of the National Council to the sixth floor, the students claimed.

They also alleged that the authorities financed a four-member private delegation's participation in the silver jubilee festival of Chartered Accounts Institute in India.

Though the charges under various heads have been increased over the years, the authorities are yet to take any ef-

fective step for improving the standard of education.

The latest annual report of ICMAB shows that the lion's share of internal resources comes from the students' fees though the authorities spend only a little for them.

On the other hand, a major portion of the resources is spent for non-educational heads like furniture, conference, seminar and publication.

According to the report, students of the institute provided Tk 10,234,532 in the 1997-98 session. This was the highest ever, 82.09 per cent of the total income of Tk 12,466,959 in the session. But the expenditure for the students was only Tk 3,051,375, 18.05 per cent of the total expenditure of Tk 16,474,948.

The report also showed that

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
