

Petr being philosophical

DUBAI, Feb 9: Petr Korda cast doubt on how much longer he would continue to play on the ATP Tour after admitting he had been changed by the drugs scandal which has dogged him incessantly since testing positive at Wimbledon in July, reports AFP.

Korda won comfortably by 6-2, 6-4 in the first round of the Dubai Open against Spaniard Alberto Martin on Monday and then spoke candidly about the controversy which contributed to his tumble from two in the world last April to number 76 this week.

The 31-year-old Czech volunteered he would be unlikely to play the US Open in August and September and would concentrate more on being with his daughter Jessie now she is about to start school in Prague. But Korda said he also felt different as a person.

"Obviously it has changed me a bit," nodded Korda, who also admitted that he had been upset by crowd reaction at the Australian Open in Melbourne. "I won't say (changed me) as a good boy or a bad boy. I can't say exactly how but I will always have my friends and family."

He later said, on the same subject: "I am going to need some years, and may be never, if I am to realise what has happened to me."

Korda then made it clear he would play less. "I am going to have to be more of a baddy in future and I am going to have to be around. I was away a lot because

tennis was more important. But right now my priorities are starting to change. I might have to change my schedule."

Korda added: "I believed 99 per cent of the time people are going to support me. But if people shout bad things I will be on the court to concentrate. I am not going to bother them unless they are insulting me or bothering my family."

Korda did get into a slanging match with spectators when he was last in the Middle East, a month ago in Doha, but today

(Monday) most of the crowd were encouraging him.

He acknowledged concern about possible school playground reaction to his six-year-old daughter. "Once this hits me I will say something to her. But to begin with I will have to ask my wife about it. Jessie is a little hyper like I am."

Korda also had an answer for the Czech Tennis Federation's decision to ban him from the Czech Championships and from playing Davis Cup for the Czech Republic.

"I was not invited to the meeting which decided this and I was not informed. I understand I am banned, but I have not played in the championships since 1987 and have not played Davis Cup since 1997."

"If they want to ban you, you have to be informed or invited so I don't know what it means, you will have to ask them."

Whether Korda merely cuts down on his schedule or decides to quit altogether will almost certainly depend on his performances in the next few weeks or months.

"My tennis is in my own hands, and it will be up to me whether I am capable of doing it now. Everything is new and I don't ask for anyone to be nice to me."

But to achieve further success on court Korda has to try to concentrate on his game while waiting for yet another move in the long-running saga of his positive drugs test and controversially lenient sentence, withholding only Wimbledon prize money and computer points.

Although his lawyers' high court action in London was successful in stopping the International Tennis Federation's appeal against the decision of its own appeals committee he now awaits the ITF's probable further attempts to get disciplinary procedures enacted.

Zenden gets Dutch call

AMSTERDAM, Feb 9 (Reuters/Internet): Dutch coach Frank Rijkaard has replaced sick left winger Marc Overmars with Boudewijn Zenden for Wednesday's friendly match against Portugal in Paris.

Arsenal's Overmars has been suffering from flu and with Glasgow Rangers' left-sided midfielder Giovanni van Bronckhorst injured, Zenden may get his first match with the Dutch since last summer's World Cup.

The 22-year-old has not been able to command a first team place at Barcelona this season, but Rijkaard said Zenden was one of a number of players he had been considering.

The Dutch were travelling to Paris on Tuesday after chaotic preparations on Monday. Many of the players arrived late in Amsterdam as heavy snow caused extended traffic jams, while the afternoon's training session was cancelled because the pitches were unfit for play.

The Dutch are hoping to improve their poor record against the Portuguese who have won three of the four previous internationals between the two.

They are also want to exorcise the memory of their 2-1 loss to Croatia in the World Cup third-placed playoff -- the last time the Dutch played in the Parc des Princes.

Portugal chose to play the game in Paris because of the city's large Portuguese population.

Hide pulls out

LONDON, Feb 9: Britain's Herbie Hide was withdrawn from his World Boxing Organisation (WBO) heavyweight title defence against American Orlin Norris in Newcastle on Saturday, reports AFP.

Promoter Frank Warren's Sports Network organisation said on Monday that Norwich fighter Hide was suffering from a skin allergy that has been plaguing him for several weeks.

It is the second time the fight has been through, with Norris pulling out of scheduled bouts last year due to knee injuries.

Hide's withdrawal is the second blow for the bill, with Briton Kevin Lueshing's WBO light-middleweight title challenge to Namibian Harry Simon called off last week.

Bielsa start with winning note

MARACAIBO, Venezuela, Feb 9: (Reuters/Internet): Argentina, fielding an experimental side and playing their first match under new coach Marcelo Bielsa, beat Venezuela 2-0 away in a friendly on Wednesday.

The two-time world champions, on their first outing since losing 2-1 to the Netherlands in the World Cup quarter-finals last year, survived first-half pressure from the South American minnows before pulling out the win.

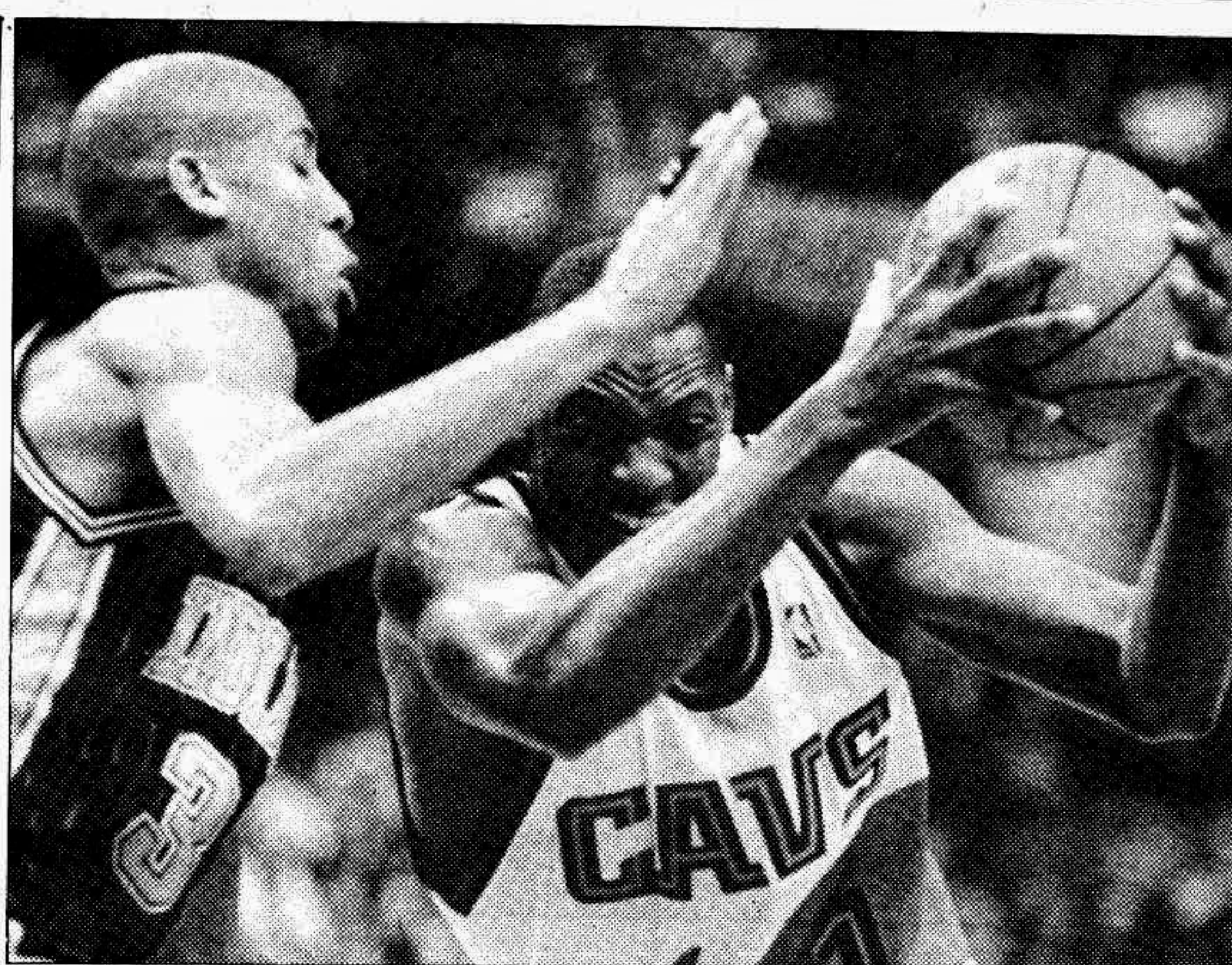
Defender Walter Samuel and midfielder Marcelo Gallardo scored after halftime for Argentina, who used only home-based players for the friendly.

Boca Juniors striker Martin Palermo, who scored 20 goals in 19 games to help his team win the Argentine championship last year, failed to get on the scoresheet.

Fernando Martinez and Jose Duno both missed good chances in the first half as the unsung Venezuelans, who come from a country where baseball far outstrips soccer in popularity, took control.

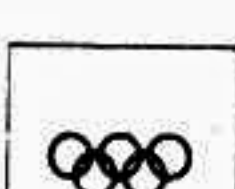
Gallardo, one of the few survivors from the World Cup in the Argentina team, orchestrated his side's best moves from then on and fittingly scored the second in the 68th minute with a left-foot shot.

Venezuela, playing their first match under Argentine coach Jose Omar Pastoriza, went down to their 10th defeat in as many internationals against Argentina but were never in any danger of repeating the 11-0 humiliation they suffered in 1975.

Salt Lake braces for local report



SALT LAKE CITY, Feb 9 (Reuters/Internet): An independent Ethics Committee on Tuesday was scheduled to release a report on how local Olympic organisers operated a cash-for-votes scandal that rocked the Olympic movement worldwide.

But local officials said that without subpoena power the committee's hands may have been tied from the very beginning.

"I hope it is an honest account and that it gives us a better understanding of what happened," Ken Bullock, a member of the Salt Lake City Organisation Committee (SLOC), said.

Members of the Bid Committee that won the right to host the 2002 Winter Games have been accused of lavishing expensive gifts, scholarships, medical care and cash worth more than \$600,000 on international Olympic Committee members in the city's successful bid to win the 2002 Winter Games.

But Bullock, who is also executive director of the Utah League of Cities and Towns, and Salt Lake City Council member Deeda Seed said they were concerned about how much teeth the committee's report will have.

"I'm hoping they do a thorough job. But they don't have subpoena power," he said.

"It's a good group of people," Seed said of the Ethics Committee members. "But even the wis-

est people on earth can not give a full accounting without complete information."

She's putting more faith in a Justice Department probe that is underway.

The work of the Bid Committee ended 3-1/2 years ago when Salt Lake City prevailed, but the allegations only surfaced recently and have now spawned several investigations.

For instance, Seed said, the Ethics Committee headed by former chief justice of the Utah Supreme Court Gordon H. Smith, a top official in the Bid Committee, had declined.

The Ethics Committee also includes a former U.S. Attorney for Utah, a philosophy professor, a former Olympic athlete and a certified public accountant.

Much of the attention has been on Tom Welch, who headed the Bid Committee.

His \$10,000 a month consulting contract with SLOC was terminated last month as part of a house cleaning following the bribery allegations.

Last week Welch said local organisers knew what he was doing when the Bid Committee was out campaigning for the Winter Games.

"I agree with that," Bullock said. "It's hard for me to believe that Welch and SLOC Senior Vice President Dave Johnson were the only two people who knew about this," he said.

"Other people had to have known," Seed said.

But after the report is re-

leased SLOC still has to grapple with other issues. Last week Utah Gov. Mike Leavitt and SLOC Chairman Robert Garff proposed increasing the board of directors from 33 to 50 or 51 and converting a 12-member Executive Committee into a 20-member Management Committee.

The new board members will be appointed by the governor and Salt Lake City Mayor Deedee Corradini.

Meanwhile the board was also trying to find a replacement for its president Frank Joklik, who said he did not know about the improprieties, but nevertheless said he will resign when a replacement is found.

Mitt Romney, a former Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate and the son of late Michigan Gov. George Romney, has become a leading candidate, although other applicants are still being interviewed, Garff said.

Bullock said he wants to see a greater representation on the board from non-business interests, but noted the bigger number could make it more difficult to make decisions and in the end "create more splintered factions."

"The first objective is putting the Games on and putting them on successfully," Bullock said.

He said instead of creating more seats on the board new blood could be added after current members who have conflicts of interest resign their positions.

Aussie boss under fire

SYDNEY, Feb 9: Australian International Olympic Committee member Phil Coles is under attack for claiming the Sydney 2000 organisers would prefer the New South Wales state government be returned at an election next month.

Conservative opposition leader Kerry Chikarovski says Coles had politicised the Olympics and should apologise, reports AP.

Coles told a current affairs television programme investigating the SOCOG hierarchy that the return of the incumbent Labour government on March 27 "would be the preference of everyone organising the Games."

Labour's Olympics Minister Michael Knight is also SOCOG's president. His dual positions are preferred by the Australian Olympic Committee and the IOC.

If the government is voted out, Chikarovski says the coalition Olympics spokesman Ron Phillips will not take the SOCOG role as well.

Chikarovski said the public would decide who should lead the state through the September 2000 Games.

"They won't be told by the AOC or the IOC who they should elect," Chikarovski said. "I certainly think Mr Coles comments were naive... I suspect he regrets what he said yesterday."

"I expect Mr Coles to apologise for his remarks. I'd hope that he would, and give a clear indication that he will happily work with the coalition delivering the Games."

AOC president John Coates, who said Chikarovski had no choice but to accept dual roles for the Olympics Minister should she lead the coalition to government, distanced the AOC from Coles' statements.

"Phillip Coles is one of the members of the IOC in Australia, by virtue of which he is on the AOC executive and the SOCOG board," Coates said in a statement Tuesday.

"The AOC is apolitical, and in the context of the forthcoming NSW election, does not promote one party or the other."

Coates secured an Australian 100 million dollar deal when the AOC sold the marketing rights of the Sydney Olympics to SOCOG.

State auditor general Tony Harris said Coles struck a better deal for the IOC than the state government of the time was able to forge for the taxpayers.

Coates, who recently admitted pledging funding to two IOC African delegates for sports programmes on the eve of the successful 1993 vote, was unapologetic about the deal he got for the AOC.

Chikarovski said the public was concerned the Games were being run behind closed doors and Coates' demeanor on the Four Corners television programme did little to change that view.

"I certainly think he was smug last night. I think that is a matter of concern. I think the people of this state want to know that the Games are for them and not for John Coates," Chikarovski said.

Agassi, Chang coast

SAN JOSE, California, Feb 9: Second seed Andre Agassi fine-tuned his game against doubles specialist Todd Woodbridge on Monday, rolling to a swift 6-2, 6-1 victory over the Australian in the opening round of the Sybase Open, reports Reuters.

"It was a good first match for me because Todd's weapons aren't going to blow you off the court," said Agassi, who improved to 6-0 against Woodbridge.

"He's going to work you left and right, to look to get in and hit a lot of creative shots. That allows me the freedom to work into my game," Agassi said.

Fourth seed Michael Chang also advanced easily with a 6-2, 6-2 drubbing of Brazilian Fernando Meligeni.

Two seeds were ousted with number five Mariano Puerta of Argentina falling 6-2, 4-6, 6-3 to Norway's Christian Ruud, while seventh seed Mariano Zabaleta of Argentina was crushed by Canada's Sebastien Lareau 6-2, 6-1.

Agassi, who was stunned in the fourth round of the Australian Open two weeks ago by unheralded compatriot Vince Spadea, said he was still depressed by the loss but plans to

continue his quest to return to the Grand Slam winner's circle. "You have to build up the momentum again," reflected Agassi, a four-time champion here.

"When I'm playing a big tournament and there's so much riding on every match, then you blow the steam with a loss you have to start again."

Agassi, 28, who hasn't reached a Grand Slam quarter-final since 1996, was at a loss to explain his recent struggles in the majors.

"I know I've got more room to improve. I find myself quite frequently being frustrated that I'm not playing better and that's kind of good in a strange, sick way," Agassi said.

Even after thumping Woodbridge, he didn't feel quite right. "I'm a step away from playing big time tennis against big time players in big time situations. I need to be a predator out there," said Agassi, who has been working on his physical conditioning.

Pete Sampras, who has been number one in the world for a total of 258 weeks, resumes his chase of Ivan Lendl's record of 270 weeks at the top this week.

Sampras, who passed up the Australian Open citing exhaustion, makes his 1999 debut here tonight, when he faces Spaniard Galo Blanco.
