### attempts. World Cup ref passes away

MOSCOW, Feb 18 (Reuters/ Internet): Nikolai Latyshev, the man who disclosed two jars of Russian caviar may have helped England win the 1966 World Cup, has died in Moscow aged 85.

A spokesman for the Russian Football Union said on Thursday the Soviet-era World Cup referee had died in hospital late on Wednesday after being taken ill that evening.

Latyshev is best remembered for refereeing the 1962 World Cup final in Chile and for his recollections of the 1966 World Cup in England.

Last month in an interview with Reuters Latyshev revealed how caviar may have changed the outcome of the 1966 final in which England beat the former

West Germany 4-2. In that game, Soviet linesman Tofik Bakhramov convinced Swiss referee Gottfried Dienst that Geoff Hurst's controversial third goal, which crashed down off the bar, had crossed the goal line before

bouncing out. The arguments have raged ever since and followed Bakhramov, who died in 1993, and Dienst, who died last June,

to their graves. Latyshev recalled how Bakhramov lobbied to get the job on the line with the help of two jars of caviar, a great deli-

"He wanted very much to officiate in a World Cup final and came to me for help," said Latyshev, who was on the 1966 referee selection panel.

# S Africa hope for the best



CAPE TOWN, Feb 18 (Reuters/ Internet): South Africa is confident it will emerge as the sole African

bidder to host the 2006 soccer World Cup, a move that would greatly boost its hopes of staging soccer's showcase, bid chief Danny Jordaan said on Thurs-

"My feeling is that we may only have Morocco around by April 30, and we are on our way to talk to them," he told a news conference.

Nigeria, Ghana and Egypt have also indicated a wish to host the 2006 event but Jordaan said he expected all three to withdraw by the April 30 deadline set by CAF, the African Football Confederation, which wants a single bidder.

"We will talk to Morocco to try to settle the African question. My feeling is CAF will support us and we will get the votes of the four others," Jordaan said.

If South Africa did become the sole bidder, it should logically then get to host the World

Cup because even FIFA head Sepp Blatter had said it was the continent's turn, he added. Jordaan said South Africa

met or exceeded all the requirements laid down by FIFA for countries qualifying to enter the bidding process. It had the necessary sports stadiums with the appropriate



# Keegan for the time being



(AP): They say the two "e's' in Keegan stand for energy and enthusiasm. After the post World Cup slump under Glenn Hoddle, that's just what England needs if it is to reach

the finals of the 2000 European Championship and restore lost pride by winning the next four games under interim coach A standout striker for Liver-

pool and Hamburg, Keegan became one of soccer's biggest names in the 1970s. He then dropped out of the game, only to reemerge as a popular and successful manager of Newcastle.

Keegan's appointment as England coach until June to cover the Euro qualifying games against Poland, Sweden and Bulgaria and a friendly against Hungary will be welcomed by the fans as well as the media because he always has a positive approach.

He was a committed and eyecatching player and his Newcastle lineup was full of ballplaying stars with the emphasis on goal-scoring rather than goal-saving.

Playing for Liverpool, Keegan helped the club win three league championships and, in 1977, the first of its four European Cups. He moved to Hamburg, led the club to the Bundesliga title in '78 and was voted European-player-of-the-year two seasons in a row.

As a manager, Keegan paid a then world record 15 million pounds (25 million dollars) for England captain Alan Shearer in 1996 and bought international stars such as Colombian striker Faustino Asprilla and French forward David Ginola.

His best two league wins were 5-0 over Manchester United and 7-1 over Tottenham. Keegan led the Magpies to promotion to the Premier League in his first season, and the club finished second in the Premier League be-

As a player, Keegan was a small, fast and busy striker who created his own goals as well as feeding off co-strikers such as Liverpool's John Toshack. Because of his speed and athleticism, defenders found the player known as "Mighty Mouse" very tough to keep under control.

Keegari's curly hairstyle became famous in the '70s and was copied by fans who gave him pop-star adulation. A big hit with the business world. Keegan gained huge commercial deals to become a millionaire at

While at Hamburg, Keegan turned down offers to join Real Madrid and the New York Cosmos. Instead he returned to English soccer with modest Southampton in 1980.

Keegan played the last of his 63 games for England at the 1982 World Cup in Spain. He retired from the game at age 32 two years later after a short spell with Newcastle.

One of the most famous personalities in sport. Keegan dropped out of the spotlight altogether.

He moved to Spain, left soccer behind and played golf instead, occasionally visiting England to see his racehorses in action. On one return to southern England in 1991, he was resting in his Range Rover in a country lane when he was attacked by robbers wielding baseball bats and left dazed and

bleeding. In 1992, Keegan was tempted back to soccer by Newcastle owner Sir John Hall and handed millions to rebuild a struggling team which was close

to relegation to Division Two. He completely turned things around and the team was promoted to the top flight as Division One champions. Three years later, Newcastle were runners-up in the Premier League. By then, Newcastle fans referred to him as "The
