

Denilson relieved to end drought

SEVILLE, Spain, Feb 18 (Reuters/Internet): Brazilian midfielder Denilson spoke on Wednesday of his relief after breaking his barren streak at Real Betis.

The world's most expensive footballer, who cost Real Betis \$35 million last summer, got his first goal in the Spanish first division in his club's 1-1 draw with Racing Santander on Sunday.

"Scoring that goal was very important, things have now become very different," Denilson said, breaking a three-day silence.

He added: "Thanks to God for that moment because I've been through some tough times. Now I am more relaxed."

In recent games Denilson has started to show more of the ability that prompted Real Betis to part with so much money.

His scintillating form at Sao Paulo in his native Brazil drew attention during for much of the first few months of the Spanish season, to the extent that he was even briefly dropped.

He also cut a miserable figure as he returned to Brazil for his Christmas holiday although he appeared to come back to Spain in a better frame of mind.

"It has taken me some time but now I feel I am adapting to Spanish football," he said.

Atletico aiming for Passarella

MADRID, Feb 18: Atletico Madrid want to sign up Argentina's World Cup coach Daniel Passarella, club president Jesus Gil said on Thursday, reports Reuters.

"He's our number one priority," Gil told Spanish television station Telemadrid.

Passarella, a World Cup winner as a player in 1978, resigned as Argentina's coach after last year's World Cup when his side reached only the quarter-finals.

Gil was speaking after Atletico Madrid beat Espanyol 2-1 in their Spanish Cup quarter-final first leg tie on Wednesday.

Passarella is expected to arrive in Madrid later today to discuss terms with Gil in the wake of Arrigo Sacchi's resignation on Monday.

Sacchi, the former Italian coach of AC Milan, who had taken over in the summer, stepped down after three successive losses in the league.

Reserve team coach Carlos Aguilar, acting in a caretaker capacity for the second time in his career, was in charge on Wednesday night.

If Passarella decides to accept, he will be the 23rd different man to coach Atletico Madrid during the 12 turbulent years since the controversial Gil became the club president.

Passarella has been linked with a number of clubs since his departure as Argentine coach but has turned down all offers so far to return to the game.

Seaman Arsenal's saviour

LONDON, Feb 18: Manchester United and Arsenal, the two form teams in the English Premier League, battled to a pulsating 1-1 draw at a muddy Old Trafford on Wednesday while drama abounded elsewhere, reports Reuters.

There was a penalty miss and two red cards at Stamford Bridge as Chelsea conceded a late equaliser to draw 1-1 with Blackburn Rovers while normally goal-shy Everton thumped Middlesbrough 5-0.

Aston Villa's title hopes look over after another home defeat, Leeds United the 2-1 victors, while Newcastle United thrashed Coventry City 4-1.

Leicester City booked a place in the League Cup final against Tottenham Hotspur, their 1-1 home draw with First Division Sunderland gave them a 3-2 aggregate victory and their sixth Wembley appearance in seven years.

United, on 51 points, maintain their four-point lead over Chelsea, with Arsenal a further point back on 46.

Villa are fourth on 43, with Leeds up to fifth on 39. United have played a game more than the chasing pack.

Something had to give at Old Trafford where United were seeking their ninth successive victory against a team yet to concede a league goal in 1999.

The match began at a frantic pace, with the hosts making the best of the running.

They should have gone ahead after 30 minutes when Ray Parlour fouled Ronny Johnsen in the box but Dwight Yorke sidefooted his penalty wide.

Arsenal took the lead in the 48th minute when Nwankwo Kanu drove into the box and, although he was tackled, the ball ran to Nicolas Anelka who drove in.

A rare defensive lapse left Andy Cole unmarked to head the equaliser after an hour and from then on it was all united.

England Keeper David Seaman made three great saves to keep it at 1-1 as Arsenal never looked like claiming a fourth successive win against Alex Ferguson's team.

Arsenal midfielder Patrick Vieira, who worked tirelessly in the absence of suspended fellow Frenchman Emmanuel Petit, was happy with the result. "It's very good to leave Manchester with a point," Vieira said.

Manager Arsene Wenger said: "When they equalised they had some very good chances. The last 25 minutes were difficult for us. It was a very competitive game."

"If we had lost it would have been difficult to catch United... now they are five points ahead but we have a game in hand to our advantage."

Haessler out with virus infection

BONN, Feb 18 (Reuters/Internet): Borussia Dortmund midfielder Thomas Haessler will be out of action for several weeks because of a virus infection, the German First Division club said on Thursday.

Like father, like daughter

BONN, Feb 18: The youngest daughter of boxing legend Muhammad Ali is to follow in his footsteps and enters the ring for her first professional fight next month, the German newspaper Bild reported on Wednesday, says AFP.

The fact that the 57-year-old Ali has been slowed by Parkinson's disease has not deterred 21-year-old Laila Ali from entering the ring in Las Vegas on March 19.

"He didn't take many punches when he was young," Laila told Bild. "It was never proven that the Parkinson's disease from which he suffers was caused by boxing."

Her legendary heavyweight champion father has not stepped into the ring in 18 years, but he has given his daughter several tips.

The youngest of Ali's seven children by three marriages, Laila has faith in her ability. "The world expects something from me. I want to achieve what my father did. I want to win titles, to shake up the world."

Her agent Tony Trudnick said, "You only have to see her to believe that she is capable of doing just what when she says. She flies like a butterfly and stings like a bee."

Collymore back in clinic

BIRMINGHAM, England, Feb 18 (Reuters/Internet): Aston Villa striker Stan Collymore is continuing his stress counselling despite making a surprise return to the team in Wednesday's 2-1 home defeat by Leeds United.

The England international was not expected back at Villa Park for at least another week following his treatment for depression.

But manager John Gregory included him among his substitutes against Leeds and sent him on in place of Dion Dublin for the last 20 minutes.

"I had a conversation with our physiotherapist Jim Walker during the afternoon when it became apparent that Stan was quite willing to sit on the bench," said Gregory.

"So we went for it. I just asked him to put aside all the rubbish that's been attached to him and get back to playing football."

"In my opinion that is also Stan's perfect role. If he's available for our game at Wimbledon on Sunday I will probably use him in the same way."

Until then, Collymore will continue to receive treatment at a private clinic. "He seems positive it is working and helping him, and if that is the case, then it's helping Aston Villa," added Gregory.

But I am still very sceptical about him receiving counselling and first it is difficult to understand. "But then I'm from the old school and I prefer to see players roll their sleeves up and get on with it."

Susie betters world mark

MALMO, Sweden, Feb 18: Susie O'Neill of Australia broke one of sport's oldest world records when she set a world mark of 2:05.37 for the women's 200m butterfly at the World Cup short-course meeting here on Wednesday, reports AFP.

Solid start for Steffi

HANOVER, Germany, Feb 18 (Reuters/Internet): Former world number one Steffi Graf defeated home fans by crushing France's Anne-Gaëlle Sidot on Wednesday to reach the third round of the Feber Grand Prix.

Third seed Graf, who had a bye and entered the 500,000 dollar tournament in the second round, looked impressive as she cruised to a 6-1, 6-3 victory over 19-year-old Sidot which took just 55 minutes.

"I have been able to train well over the last 10 days and I feel fit and confident," said the 29-year-old German, who was beaten in the second round here last year when she made her comeback after eight months out of the game because of injury worries.

The match was sold out for weeks but Graf, gave the 4,000 fans a taste to be excited about in a concentrated one-sided rout that ended with her blasting an ace.

But the workout showed how far the German, who dominated women's tennis for almost a decade, has come since her rusty insecure performances last year. She made few errors, whipping her famed forehand, and racing to 4-0 and 3-0 leads in both sets.

The most important thing to me is to play again with all the dedication that's necessary," said Graf who admitted she has gained perspective since her return after many had considered her career finished.

Graf, currently seventh in the WTA rankings, next meets Austrian Barbara Schett, who beat Spain's Virginia Ruano-Pascual 7-5, 6-2.

In another match, France's Sandrine Testud bounced German Anke Huber 6-3, 6-3. Top-seeded Jana Novotna plays later against Romania's Ruxandra Dragomir and No 2 Venus Williams plays Thursday.

Graf, who held the top ranking a record 377 weeks, has proven she can still beat the world's best while sweeping three titles since her return.

At the 1998 Philadelphia event, the German, became the first unseeded player in the Open era to beat the top two players at the same tournament, ousting Lindsay Davenport and Martina Hingis.

But Graf, who says her goal is winning Grand Slams and not regaining No 1, started 1999 disappointingly. Hingis beat her easily at both the Australian Open and last week's Tokyo event.

Courier upsets Chang

MEMPHIS, Tennessee, Feb 18 (Reuters/Internet): Unseeded Jim Courier upset fourth seed Michael Chang 6-4, 7-6 (10-8) in a hard-fought two-hour battle at the \$25,000 US dollar Kroger St. Jude tennis tournament on Wednesday.

Courier, ranked 69th in the world, walked off the court visibly bruised on a knee and bearing bloody scratches on the knuckles of his right hand following a match in which he threw himself around the court to play Chang evenly until the tiebreaker.

There, Courier was down 4-0 before he fought his way back. The players were knotted up at 8-8 in the tiebreaker until Chang hit two successive balls long to give Courier the win.

Courier, who won this tournament in 1993, will face Italy's Laurence Tierlemann in the quarter-finals Thursday.

In other action, defending champion Mark Philippoussis of Australia survived a challenge from crowd favourite Mark Woodruff 6-3, 7-6 (7-3).

Only title can please Hitzfeld

BONN, Feb 18 (Reuters/Internet): Nothing less than the German title will satisfy Bayern Munich coach Ottmar Hitzfeld.

"We have gone halfway and we have not won anything yet," said Hitzfeld, whose team took a healthy eight-point advantage into the 60-day winter break.

"We have played really well so far and the atmosphere in the team is great. It will be a disappointment if we don't win the title."

Bayern, who resume their campaign at MSV Duisburg on Saturday, were in a class of their own before the Bundesliga made its traditional halt.

They also avoided the squabbling and scandals for which they have been renowned over the years, earning them the nickname FC Hollywood.

Hitzfeld, who held club vice-president Karl-Heinz Rummenigge say this week that he would like him to stay for three or four more years, believes there is room for improvement.

"We can be more precise in our passing and more effective. I would say that we only played at 80 percent of our potential before the break."

Hitzfeld knows he is also expected to do well in the European Cup, which Bayern have not lifted since the last of three consecutive triumphs in 1976.

"The Champions League is a highlight in the season and it brings you fame worldwide," said Hitzfeld, ahead of next month's all-German quarter-final against Kaiserslautern.

"But there are teams in that competition who are stronger than we are, like Manchester United and Real Madrid."

For the game at Duisburg -- a re-match of last season's German Cup final won 2-1 by Bayern -- Hitzfeld can count on all his players.

Even Brazilian striker Elber, who has been nursing a broken hand, is fit and should start.

Bayern Leverkusen, at home to SC Freiburg on Saturday, are fighting for second place and a European Cup berth, said their coach Christoph Daum.

"Bayern are clearly the better team and can only beat themselves," he said. "We will try our best to make sure the Bundesliga remains exciting to follow but I don't believe anybody can stop Bayern."

Almost everyone agrees. A poll of 204 Bundesliga players by soccer magazine Kicker this week showed 91 per cent believed Bayern would win the title.

Conversely, more than 30 percent predicted Borussia Moenchengladbach would go down.

The winners of five German crowns and two UEFA cups are currently last, five points below 17th-placed Nuremberg.

Rosset, Korda bow out

ROTTERDAM, Netherlands, Feb 18: Former Wimbledon champion Richard Krajicek won his first round clash here Wednesday, beating Switzerland's Marc Rosset 6-3, 7-5, reports AFP.

Meanwhile, Swiss prodigy Roger Federer -- seen as the Roger Federer -- sent a message to Martina Hingis -- proved too hot for Czech Bohdan Ulihrach, winning 6-4, 7-5 in a second-round game.

British number three seed Tim Henman also prevailed in the second round match here, beating Czech Petr Korda 6-3, 6-4.

Henman was in command throughout and served eight aces against Korda.

Earlier his compatriot Greg Rusedski, seeded five, struggled to a 7-6, 4-6, 6-3 first-round win over Nicolas Kiefer of Germany in the Rotterdam ATP Tour event here on Wednesday.

The British number two took the opening set on the tiebreak but the German rallied to take the second and level the match.

Rusedski then regained his composure and brushed Kiefer aside in the final set to wrap up his victory.

In other first-round matches Wednesday, Dominik Hrbaty of the Czech Republic downed Dutchman Peter Wessels 6-3, 6-7 (5/7), 7-6 (7/2) and in-form Jerome Golmard of France ousted Spaniard Felix Mantilla 6-0, 6-4.

Portsmouth strapped for cash

LONDON, Feb 18 (Reuters/Internet): English first division Portsmouth want to save money by washing their own jockstraps.

Players at the club, which is seven million pounds (\$11.50 million) in debt, have been told by manager Alan Ball that 112 pounds (\$183.4) a week can be saved if jockstraps are washed rather than new ones bought every week.

"We have to explore every possible way of saving but this is an unusual route. The players thought I was joking when I first told them about the jockstraps," said Ball, a member of England's 1966 World Cup-winning team.

Ball has accepted a 15,000 pounds (\$24,560) annual pay cut as part of the savings drive. The entire playing staff have been ordered to return club cars and mobile phones.
