Baby strangled to death

SYLHET, Feb 26: A 21-day-old child was strangled to death allegedly by a step-mother at village Dhalur Par under Jakigantha thana last night. Police arrested the step mother on charge of killing the baby.

Police said Sohana, the second wife of one Haris Ali, sent Begum, the first wife of Haris out of the house and took the boy from her at about 8 pm yesterday.

After some time, she strangled the child to instantaneous death. Later, Begum filed a case with the Jakigantha thana accusing Sohana of the planned murder.

The body was sent to the Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital for post-mortem.

Father kills daughter in Feni

FENI, Feb 26: A father has killed his three-year-old daughter at Tulatuli village under Sonagazi thana of the district, reports APB.

Fakir Ahmed took sleeping Marjina Begum, daughter from his first wife, to a solitary place at nearby Satbaria village at dawn on Monday and killed her, police said.

Villagers caught him as he was leaving the body on a road and handed him over to local police.

Police recovered the body and sent it to Sadar hospital for autopsy. The motive behind the killing could not be ascertained.

China threatens to share missile technology with third countries

HONG KONG, Feb 26: China has made a "veiled threat" to share missile technology with third countries if the United States builds a missile defence shield for its Asian allies, including Taiwan, the Financial Times reported today, reports AFP.

A senior Chinese official said the installation of a US-backed Theatre Missile Defence (TMD) system in Asia would be a violation of the Missile Technology Control Regime (MTCR), which is intended to limit the spread of missile technology, the British newspaper reported.

"Since the US can lead the way in breaking this regime other countries have an absolute right not to follow the rules of this regime and undertake cooperation on missiles and missile technology with third countries," the unnamed official was quoted as saying.

China fears as that a proposed TMD shield for Japan and

South Korea could also help Taiwan which it claims as a renegade province and has in the past threatened to invade if the nationalist government makes a formal declaration of independence.

The threat comes at a time of increasing friction between Beijing and Washington.

China reacted angrily this week to a US decision to block the sale of a hi-tech satellite to a Chinese-led consortium because of security fears, it warned this could effect trade and economic cooperation.

The United States has expressed concerns that China could supply missile technology to Pakistan, which is locked in a nuclear arms race with India. Reports have also linked China with missile sales to Iran.

US Secretary of State Madeleine Albright starts a visit to Beijing on Monday with security matters high on the list of topics to be discussed.

Jordanians pledge loyalty to new king, pray for Hussein

AMMAN, Feb 26: About 1,000 Jordanians carrying candles walked slowly through Amman at nightfall Thursday to pay their respects at the hill-top tomb of King Hussein, reports AP.

Meanwhile, representatives of Jordan's one million labour unionists pledged allegiance to Hussein's eldest son, King Abdullah, in a move reflecting growing public confidence in the new monarch.

Hussein died of cancer on February 7.

The pledge of allegiance to Abdullah, 37, came in a letter issued Thursday at a meeting of 30 representatives of Jordan's 17 labour syndicates.

"On behalf of the one million labourers throughout the kingdom, I am honoured Your Majesty to pledge allegiance and sincere loyalty to your Hashemite throne," said the letter, signed by the syndicates' president Mazen Maaytah.

Such a call is crucial for Abdullah because it underlines

growing public confidence in the career soldier who has little political experience.

Abdullah spent the last 10 years as the commander of an elite army unit charged with internal security. He represented King Hussein in several state functions at home and abroad, but he had shown little ambition outside the army.

In the 5-km trek from Amman's Nuzha district to the royal compound, the candle marchers, mostly women and children in black, chanted: "There is no God, but one and Hussein is his loved one."

The march was organised by the Saudi-Jordanian Committee for Culture, but Jordanians from all walks of life joined it: Bedouin tribesmen in head-dresses and head-to-toe robes and others in jeans, T-shirts and baseball caps.

They marched across the black gates of the royal compound to the cemetery where loudspeakers broadcast verses from the Quran.

Health and Family Welfare Minister Tofail Ahmed has called upon guardians to take a firm stand against erosion of values among the younger generation, reports APB.

Citing some examples, he warned the parents that students of present day were very prone to violence, crimes and drug addiction which were eating into the vitality of the society.

Addressing the prize giving ceremony of annual sports competition at Uttara High School yesterday, Tofail said guardians must take the responsibility to rear their wards as honest and worthy citizens.

Presided over by Golam Sarwar, President of the Managing Committee of the school and the News Editor of Dainik Ittefaq, the function was addressed, among others, by Secretary General of the organization Ajmol Chowdhury and Resident Representative of JICA Bangladesh Yuji Okajaki.

Health Minister said the country's doctors trained by JICA on cancer treatment would be able to contribute to cancer operation and radiotherapy of the patients.

Recalling the glorious past of the student movements in the country, Tofail, who was a leading figure of the historic 11-point movement in 1969, urged the students to follow the footsteps of their predecessors.

Five killed in road accidents

Five people were killed and 17 others injured in separate road accidents in Narsingdi and Faridpur yesterday, report agencies.

APB reports: Three people were killed and 15 others injured in a bus-tempo collision on Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Narsingdi yesterday.

Police said a Bhairab-bound bus collided with a tempo at Shilmandi in Sadar thana, leaving the driver and two other unidentified passengers of the three-wheeler dead on the spot.

Police identified the tempo driver as Khorshed Alam, 32.

The injured passengers, 10 of the bus and five of the tempo, were admitted to Narsingdi Sadar Hospital.

The bodies were sent to the Sadar Hospital morgue for autopsy.

In Faridpur, two people were killed and two others injured when a truck smashed a rickshaw van at Munshibazar on Faridpur-Khulna highway yesterday, according to UNB.

Police said the rice-laden truck hit the van at about 6 pm killing Taibul Islam, 60, and Obaidul Islam, 25, on the spot.

Seriously injured Mohamad Rashid and Akbar Hossain, van driver, were admitted to Faridpur Medical Hospital.

Police seized the truck but the driver managed to escape.

'Govt planning to upgrade Cancer Institute to 300 beds'

Health and Family Welfare Minister Salauddin Yusuf yesterday said the government is actively considering a proposal for upgrading the Bangladesh Cancer Institute and Hospital to a 300-bed hospital, reports BSS.

Prevention of cancer is better than cure," he said while addressing a seminar organised by JICA Alumni Association, Bangladesh for creating awareness among the people to prevent cancer in Bangladesh at BIRDDEM auditorium here.

Presided over by president of JICA Alumni Association, Bangladesh Prof Dr Motiur Rahman, eminent cancer specialist Syed Fazlul Haq and Begum Tasmina Hossain, MP, presented the keynote papers.

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Later, they appointed thana coordinators from selected applicants against security money of Tk 5,000 per person. The NGO imposed a condition on the thana coordinators for collecting applications from at least 33 people for the posts of field workers at union level.

Accordingly, the field workers were appointed with a monthly salary of Tk 1,500 each against security money of Tk 3,000 to Tk 4,000.

After training, the field workers were sent to their respective areas in Noakhali, Feni and Laxmipur districts for selling health cards to poor families at a price of Tk 20 each.

The organisation promised to provide health services to the cardholders for a charge for a year.

However, the organisation closed its activities secretly in different thanas after selling hundreds of cards to the poor people.

The deceived people in their complaint sought redress for their losses due to the incident.

When contacted, a former employee of the NGO, Shaikh Ahmed of Feni, said that the organisation was not registered with the NGO Bureau or the Social Welfare Department.

He said it used a fake registration number as a joint stock company and collected lakhs of Taka from across the country.

He resigned from his post when he came to know of these facts, Shaikh said.

Complaint filed against fake NGO in Noakhali

NOAKHALI, Feb 26: Some 16 thanas in greater Noakhali have filed a complaint with the higher authorities against an NGO which cheated them in the name of providing jobs, reports UNB.

The written complaint was filed with the DG of Anti-Corruption Bureau, NGO Bureau and Social Welfare Department and the Home Minister against the 'Patriot Society' of 25 Shamshuza Market, Bangla Motor, Dhaka.

In the complaint said that the NGO advertised in the national dailies for appointments to a health project and collected money from the applicants as "interview fee."
